SIX NEW CASES OF POLIOMYELITIS SINCE FRIDAY

Six additional cases of infantile paralysis, all of the mild type, have been reported from Saint John since press time yesterday, to Dr. William Warwick, chief medical health officer for New Brunswick. The total number of cases in New Brunswick is now 39, and in the City of Saint John 15, with four more cases in Saint John county outside the city, and five in Rothesay.

Although several persons in this district who have been suspected of contracting the disease have been visited by the District Medical Health Officer, Dr. J. M. Cameron, there have been no new cases in York County. Only one case has been reported here during the entire outbreak, that of a ten year old boy at Boiestown, who contracted the disease over a

week ago. Local church authorities will co-operate to the fullest extent with the provincial Department of Health in keeping children under sixteen from attending church and Sunday School. Plans are now underway to broadcast the Sunday School services through the facilities of the local radio

OF BIGAMY LAID **AGAINST PHILLIPS**

R.C.M.P. Claim Accused Was Not Divorced from First Wife--Committed To Trial On Two Charges.

Wilfred Phillips of Durham Bridge was committed to trail, at the sitting of the circuit court this month on two charges of bigamy, when his case was heard in Devon Magistrate's court yesterday. Five witnesses were called by the prosecution to testify against the accused on both charges, while no witnesses were called for the defence. Bail of two bonds of \$3000. cach was allowed

Hildred I. MacLean Phillips, first wife of the accused and Myrtle R. Phillips, second wife, were the chief witnesses for the prosecution. Each gave evidence of marriage to the accused, and claimed that the second marriage had taken place while he is still married to the first wife. Myrtle Phillips, the second wife, testified to the fact that she had never been divorced from Phillips, and is still his legal wife.

The first information was laid by the second wife, charging Phillips with committing bigamy when he married Mable K. MacDonald, being still married to Hildred MacLean. The second information was laid by Constable Lee Matchett, Fredericton De tachment, R.C.M.P., charging that the accused committed bigamy, when he married Myrtle R. Kelly, being al ready married to Hildred MacLean

Contradictory to former reports, it is now alleged that Phillips was nevor divorced from the first wife, Hildred MacLean Phillips, and out of this has arisen the second charge.
