LEVIES ABOLISHED DECORATION OF ON CROWN TITLES N.B. GOVERNMENT

Those Receiving Honors Will Not Have to Pay Fees in Future

LONDON, May 6-Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced today that legislation was coming to abolish the payment of fees and stamp duties by the recipients of honors and dignities conferred by the crown.

A clause to be included in the 1937 finance bill will be effective immediately. Fee's at present payabale on the granting of letters patent are: Duke £350 (\$1,727), marquess £300, earl £250, viscount £200, baron £150 and baronet £100 and others £30.
