

## LEVIES ABOLISHED ON CROWN TITLES

Those Receiving Honors  
Will Not Have to Pay  
Fees in Future

LONDON, May 6—Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced today that legislation was coming to abolish the payment of fees and stamp duties by the recipients of honors and dignities conferred by the crown.

A clause to be included in the 1937 finance bill will be effective immediately. Fees at present payable on the granting of letters patent are: Duke £350 (\$1,727), marquess £300, earl £250, viscount £200, baron £150 and baronet £100 and others £30.

When Lord Byng on his retirement as Governor-General of Canada, was raised from baron to viscount in 1926, he refused to pay the fee. The levy eventually was foregone, but the honor was not gazetted until 1928. Fees also were remitted for Viscount Snowden and for Lord Sankey when he was raised from baron to viscount.

Lord Snowden, Chancellor of the Exchequer in two Labor Governments and also for a few months during the financial crisis of 1931, commenting today on the decision to abolish the tax, said that it was "eminently reasonable."

"The loss to the public funds is comparatively small," Lord Snowden said. "If a man is honored, I see no reason why he should be asked to pay for it."

## DECORATION OF N.B. GOVERNMENT BLDG. COMPLETED

Scheme Designed by a  
Well Known Saint  
John Artist

The colorful decorations on the legislative building is attracting considerable interest. The decorations, designed and carried out under the supervision of P. W. Woodley, prominent commercial artist of Saint John, who is in charge of the decorative work on provincial and federal buildings throughout the province in connection with the coronation celebration, are particularly well arranged and the whole scene presents an attractively colorful setting.

The entire plan is of a definite design. Its composition leads to the central arch on which reposes the three portraits of their Majesties, King George VI and Queen Elizabeth and the heir presumptive, Princess Elizabeth. The three figures are surmounted by a crown and will be lighted in the coronation colors of purple and gold. The paintings are transparent and will be illuminated from the back.

On the pillars are shields of Great Britain, Ireland, Scotland and New Brunswick, while at the base of the entrance arch are two lions. The bunting arranged on the front of the building is of imported material, British made, and the colors red, white and blue are represented.

The whole front of the building presents a colorful spectacle, all the various flags, streamers and bunting of variegated colors lead the portraits of the King and Queen. Instead of the usual motto, "God Save the King," Mr. Woodley has chosen the motto, "God Bless Their Majesties."

The front of the building will be "flood-lighted" during Coronation Week. The lights were kindly loaned by the Fredericton Exhibition Company. According to present plans the decorations will remain in place until May 18.

Mr. Woodley is in charge of arranging decorations on other public buildings here including the customs house, post office and normal school building. These will have been completed by tomorrow.

## PREMIER LOSES DOCUMENT CASE, LINER UPSET

LONDON, May 6—A gossip writer in the Daily Telegraph today told a story about confusion aboard the liner Empress of Australia, which brought the Canadian Coronation delegation to England.

Several passengers arrived in their cabins to find officials busily searching their belongings. Soon it was apparent that the whole ship was being ransacked.

Premier Mackenzie King had mislaid a case of documents. A few of the passengers were fearful, a few affronted, but most were amused. Finally the case was found in the ship's hold.

Mr. King was received in audience by the King at Buckingham Palace today. The audience lasted for half an hour. His Majesty later received Premier Joseph Lyons of Australia.

LONDON, May 7—Sixty-five Canadian women were presented to Their Majesties tonight in the second court reception of their reign.

Mrs. Ronald Mears, presented by her mother, Mrs. Leonard Tilley, wife of Mr. Justice Tilley, former premier of New Brunswick, wore a wedding dress of ivory moire with silver embroidery and train and carried a bouquet of pink roses. Mrs. Tilley's dress was of white chiffon with a train embroidered with silver. She carried an emerald fan.

Mrs. Vincent Massey, who presented the remaining Canadian women to their Majesties, wore gold brocade with a train of amber velvet and a diamond tiara.

Mrs. Allison Dysart, wife of the premier of New Brunswick, who was presented with her daughter, Miss Mary Dysart, and her niece, Miss Mary McDougall, wore silver lame with a train lined with pink chiffon and pearls. 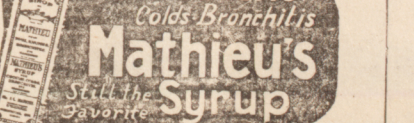

cost of \$100,000, raised mainly by public subscription. Some parts of the former instrument, which go back for at least a couple of centuries, will be incorporated.

Musical arrangements are in the hands of Sir Walford Davies, who three years ago succeeded the late Sir Edward Elgar as Master of the King's music, and Dr. Ernest Bullock, organist and master of the choir of Westminster Abbey.

Sir Walford Davies, in one way at least, can claim distinction of being the best-known musician in the United Kingdom. For several years his clear, mellow voice was heard by millions of listeners in frequent broadcasts about musical matters.

Sir Walford, now 67 years old, possesses an extraordinary gift of conveying to the general hearer a store of knowledge, put into the most attractive sentences, about the intricacies of melody and harmony. He was for some years organist of St. George's Chapel, Windsor, and previously organist of the Temple Church, London. Both these churches have a musical tradition hardly less renowned than that of Westminster Abbey or St. Paul's Cathedral.

Dr. Ernest Bullock has been at the Abbey since 1923, when he succeeded Dr. Sydney Nicholson, now head of the English School of Church Music, Chiselmurst. He was previously for some years organist of Exeter Cathedral. The long line of his successors at the Abbey console include such eminent musicians and composers as Orlando Gibbons, Henry Purcell, John Blow, James Turle and Sir Frederick Bridge.

It is not perhaps generally known that the first Handel Festival—an event which in pre-war days drew thousands of singers to the Crystal Palace, recently destroyed by fire, was held in Westminster Abbey. That happened in 1784, when the nave was filled with boxes and high-priced seats which the great world of London from George III downwards was only too eager to purchase. It was in the Abbey, too, that the first performance of Bach's immortal passion music was given.

LONDON, May 7—Twenty-four Canadian singers are among representatives from overseas Dominions in the great choir of 400 voices for the Coronation in Westminster Abbey. The Canadian contingent, drawn from each of the provinces, is made up of eight sopranos, six altos, four tenors and six basses. The personnel:

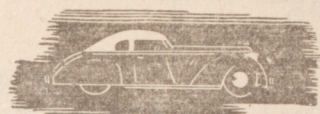
