## VIEWS OF CANADIAN STATESMEN CONSIDERED EMPIRE DECISIONS

### Canada and Britain Consult Together On Empire Problems

This Country's Opinions Have Weight In Ultimate Decisions on Empire Problems

Ottawa Officials Silent

Official Ottawa Will Not Talk On Delicate European Situation

OTTAWA, September 27—In face of every effort on the part of everyone in authority in the Capital to remain incommunicado with respect to the role which Canada is playing on the international scene, it is obvious to the experienced and expert observer in Ottawa that this country's opinions have a great deal to do with the ultimate decisions and actions of Great Britain in the many grave European and Far Eastern problems.

For the past couple of months there has been many signs in Ottawa that the Canadian Government is in daily communication with the Home Government, particularly with the Foreign Office of the Hon. Anthony Eden and that of the Hon. Malcolm MacDonald, Dominions Secretary. Furthermore, it is known that the Hon. J. L. Isley, Canadian Minister of National Revenue, who is at present in Europe on his way to the League of Nations, has paid frequent visits to Whitehall to present this country's views, and this fact is significant.

The European situation is highly delicate, and officials in the Capital refuse to offer any information on the subject. However, through presumption it is possible to state that Canada has joined the rest of the Empire to form a solid and united front, and every pronouncement by the Chamberlain Government is really the absolute opinion of the whole Empire.

Here and there evidence appears in Ottawa that the Cabinet frequently considers certain international problems, reaches a decision and this is forwarded to Great Britain without much delay. The same procedure is followed throughout the Empire, and (Continued on Page Four)

### CHURCHES UNITED AGAINST NAZIS

BERLIN, Sept. 27—(C. P. Havas)—The German Catholic and Protestant Churches attacked Nazi racial and religious doctrines today, furnishing the only major note of internal discord during Italian Premier Mussolini's visit to Germany.

Mgr. Konrad von Preysing, Catholic bishop of Berlin, issued a pastoral letter, read in all the capital's Catholic churches, exhorting the faithful not to read "anti-Christian" German literature.

In the Church of St. Anne in suburban Dahlem Pastor Messow of the German Confessional (Protestant) Church assailed Nazi doctrines expounded by Alfred Rosenberg, Nazi ideologist, that the race of men are good in themselves.

### P. E. I. Convention To Hear Bennett

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Sept. 27—Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, leader of the Conservative party in Canada, will address a provincial party convention here Oct. 5, it was announced. The convention is being held for the purpose of choosing a new provincial leader. Conservatives were led by Premier J. P. MacMillan in Prince Edward Island until the provincial election in 1935 when Liberals swept every seat in the House.

### An Appreciation

A FEW DAYS AGO The Daily Mail had occasion to refer to a disgraceful show put on by a number of stark naked women as one of the Midway "Attractions" at the Fredericton Exhibition. At the time that we published the article we well knew that such disgraceful exhibitions were condemned by a large majority of the citizens of Fredericton. We believe that the matter of allowing such shows to continue night after night in this city was a challenge to the churches, to the police force of the City of Fredericton, and to the better thinking public. It shows how far we allow things to go without being checked up.

That our position in regard to this disgraceful show was generally endorsed was evidenced by the fact that we received from Clergymen and others many expressions of congratulations.

The following letter from the Ministerial Association of St. Stephen and vicinity speaks for itself, and it is only one of several which we have received in regard to this disgraceful show.

It is to be hoped that arrangements will be made with the police by the Exhibition authorities so that all midway attractions at future exhibitions will be inspected and guaranteed as respectable before being presented to the public. This should be the duty of those who control the police force and who are supposed to uphold decency.

The Ministerial Association of St. Stephen and vicinity, wishes to convey to you the hearty thanks and appreciation of its members for your recent services on behalf of public morality.

In an article on the last page of your issue of September 15th and again on the front page on Saturday, September 18th, you condemned in no uncertain terms the shameful side-show spectacle permitted in the Fredericton Exhibition and a few days earlier in St. Stephen, a performance too vile for description.

We wish to join with you in your vigorous protest against the insult offered to the public sense of decency by the managing boards of exhibitions who permit such disgraceful shows to be carried on under their sanction, for the sake of the few paltry dollars in license fees.

It is sincerely hoped that such a storm of public indignation will be aroused as will prevent these shows ever again appearing in an exhibition in this province. And to the securing of this end we request the official attention of the Attorney-General of New Brunswick to this important matter.

Mrs. Cortlandt A. Robinson, Saint John, was appointed deputy provincial commissioner of the Girl Guides, to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Miss Barbara Miles, at the semi-annual meeting of the New Brunswick Council of the Canadian Girl Guides which was held in the council chamber of the City Hall on Saturday afternoon.

The decision was made to postpone Guide's Day, which had been set for Oct. 9, because of the infantile paralysis outbreaks. Mrs. R. W. L. Earle, Perth, accepted the office of district commissioner for Plaster Rock and Perth.

Satisfactory reports were read from the Lone Company, as well as from C.W.L. and I.O.E. representatives. The First Doaktown Company, Girl Guides, won the Lady Bessborough shield for the best collection of winter twigs.

About 200 Guides were in camps in different sections during the summer it was revealed, and have been prominent in other activities, including the Coronation celebration.

Miss Kathleen McMahon, Dominion field secretary is expected to make a tour of the province this month, meeting the guides in different districts.

### THREE PARTY CONFERENCE SEEKS TO SOLVE ISSUES

PARIS, Sept. 27—Officials confirmed today that Great Britain and France have taken preliminary steps to bring Italy into a tripartite conference to seek solution of the most dangerous international issues arising from the Spanish civil war.

A joint note by Great Britain and France, suggesting such a conference, has been sent to Rome, it was stated, and the Italian government has been notified that this note would be followed shortly by another proposing that representatives of the three nations meet at the French Foreign Office.

Although spokesmen declined to discuss propositions to be made to the conference, it was generally understood France and Great Britain would try to bring about withdrawal of foreign volunteers from Spain.

### HUGILL WOULD HAVE ABERHART EXAMINED

Former Attorney-General Broadcasts Suggestion  
That Aberhart Is Victim of Megalomania

EDMONTON, Alta., Sept. 27—Hon. J. W. Hugill, K.C., former Attorney-General of Alberta, speaking over Calgary's most powerful radio station last night, denounced Premier William Aberhart in these words in a half-hour broadcast, which he plans to repeat for Northern Alberta listeners tonight:

"Mr. Premier, I hope you are listening. Your mentality, bespeaking and exhibiting at every turn, as it does, the insanity of self-exaltation, totally unfitting you to be the Leader of any Government. Your treatment of at least three of your former colleagues (Ross, Cockcroft and Chant), members of the Executive Council and of so many members of the Civil Service, is of itself evidence of a sadistic mind incapable of appreciating the fundamental amenities upon which alone our social order can hope to maintain."

"Your worst enemy or your dearest friend could say nothing kinder but assure you that the dread malady, megalomania, will effect the complete aberration of the strongest mind unless checked by removal from all opportunity to demonstrate itself."

### MUSSOLINI'S SON OFF TO HOLLYWOOD CAREER

So Closely Guarded Is 20-Year-Old Vittorio, He  
Sees Little of Manhattan

NEW YORK, Sept. 27—Flanked by diplomats and guarded by Secret Service men and members of the police alien squad, Vittorio Mussolini, 20-year-old son of the Italian Premier, took a hasty peek at New York City today, prior to leaving for Hollywood and a brief career in the movie studios.

An Anti-Fascist demonstration on his arrival was frustrated when the blond, husky son of Il Duce was spirited aboard a cutter while the liner Rex was still in Quarantine and hustled into Manhattan secretly under heavy guard. The time of his projected departure tomorrow from Newark Airport was kept secret.

Members of the Communist Party, who had voiced demands that the United States deport him, sailed down the harbor early in a launch equipped with a loudspeaker and began booming "Deport Mussolini's son" at the incoming liner. He was already off, and the only response came from other passengers, irate at being awakened early.

The Italian leader's son took a quick automobile tour of Manhattan Island, but at a press conference refused to say anything except some pretty words about Greta Garbo.

He would not discuss politics.

"I am going to spend twenty days in Hollywood studying American picture methods," he said, in fair English, although he had occasionally to ask aid from an interpreter.

"Then I am returning directly to Rome with Producer Hal Roach to make a picture of the opera 'Rigoletto'."

He is President of the R.A.M. Production Company, a private company with no American connections, although Roach is one of its officers.

Plenty of Home Talent  
Asked if he planned to take any American actors or actresses back to Italy to appear in his productions, he said, "No, I do not. Italy is already well supplied with beautiful and talented actresses."

Young Mussolini, who holds the rank of Second Lieutenant in the Italian air corps, also refused to discuss threats of war in Europe or his own experiences as a war flier in the Italo-Ethiopian conflict.

While Mussolini was talking to reporters, a lone male picket marched outside the hotel carrying a sign reading "Vittorio Mussolini — How many innocent were murdered in Ethiopia, Spain and Italy by Italian Fascists?"

### MINISTER SAYS JESUS HEALED AS TECHNICIAN

MONTREAL, Sept. 27—When Jesus healed, he healed as a technician, and not as a magician, Rev. Leslie D. Weatherhead of London, England, today told a gathering in connection with the three day celebration of the silver jubilee of co-operation between McGill University's theological colleges. Jesus always was interested in healing as well as preaching, Mr. Weatherhead said, and now it was time for the Church to resume its part in healing the sick, for disease was outside the intention of God. He called a belief that illness had spiritual value "heresy."

Many illnesses had their origin in spiritual, as well as psychological reasons, said the preacher. Physicians regarded it essential to restore peace of mind and confidence of soul to their patients and part of the Christian minister's duty was to aid in this restoration, he declared.
