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## STANLEY FAIR OPENED THIS MORNING

Promises to be the Most Successful Ever Held In Three Quarters of a Century

(Special to The Daily Mail)

Stanley, N. B., Sept. 21.—The Stanley Fair opened here this morning. Long before the opening hour crowds began to flock in from the surrounding districts and before noon today the fair promised to have the largest number of people present at any first day gathering in years.

The exhibits and the attractions on the Midway are all in place. Tomorrow and Thursday promise to be the big days of the fair. On these days many are expected to be present from Fredericton, Devon and Marysville.

The judge's dinner, an annual popular event will be held on Thursday evening and it is expected that it will be addressed by leading speakers including public men and others. This dinner which extends back as an annual fixture for the last seventy-nine years is as old as the fair itself and was started to entertain the officers, judges members of the press and other gentlemen who had helped to make the fair a success. When the Stanley Fair was a branch of the York County Agriculture Association many of the executive went up from Fredericton and they have continued to patronize it ever since.

Alderman Fred S. Mundle of Fredericton has donated a twenty five dollar prize for the best letter on how the Stanley Fair should be conducted. The letter should show in detail what the writer would like to see at the fair and suggest anything which he or she thinks would improve or increase the popularity of the fair. All letters must be in the hands of the secretary, Councillor T. Allan Best of Stanley, not later than October 15. This year shows special attractions and improvements in all departments. These departments include agriculture, industry, education and recreation. In order to interest the boys and girls and to encourage practical agriculture in the county the fair is making a specialty of calf, swine, poultry and garden clubs. The judging competition is always an interesting feature of the fair and the hauling matches have been popular for years. Substantial prizes are given in all these events. Band concerts, entertainments and dances will be held each evening. Meals are served at the Aberdeen building on the Exhibition grounds and to those who know what splendid cooks and servers the ladies of the Stanley district are there is nothing more to be said. The ladies of Stanley see that all who patronize the diningroom are amply provided for. On a recent occasion a representative of The Daily Mail noticed a man from Devon polish off a full course dinner and wind up his performance by eating seven slices of pie.

but no chances can be taken even yet. For this reason it is thought that unless the situation rapidly becomes much better during the remainder of the week, the children will be kept for a longer period in the disorganized state caused by the closing of all places to them where crowds are likely to be formed.
