

### 250 APPLICATIONS FOR BLIND PENSIONS RECEIVED SO FAR COLLECT CITY

Investigation Now Being Conducted Into Circumstances Of Applicants — Medical Examination Necesary Before Pension Is Granted

Approximately 250 applications for pensions in respect to blindness have been received so far by the Old Age Pensions Board, it was stated this morning by W. P. Jones, chairman of the board. At present government investigators are actively inquiring into all these applications with the view of paying the pensions as quickly as possible, he said.

"When we determine that the applicant is entitled to a pension as egards age, residence, nationality and income, we forward the name and address of the applicant to the Department of Pensions and National Health at Ottawa, which department is to advise us of the name and address of the occulist who will make medical test in order to determine the fact of blindness," Hon. "The applicant must pay his own expenses to attend the examination. This question came up at the recent conference at Ottawa," Hon. Mr. Jones pointed out, "and it was suggested that the Dominion Government provide for the transportation of the applicants to attend the physician. It was thought, however, that an applicant who is actually blind would have no difficulty, if he were not able himself, to obtain assistance from his friends for this purpose.

# TAX ARREARS

Housing Act Payments And Sidewalk Taxes Also Considered

Will Sell Properties

Eight Property Owners Still Owe Under 1922 Act

A concerted drive will be made by ne city for the collection of delinquent taxes, obligations to the city under the Housing Act of 1922, and taxes for concrete sidewalks as a result of a unanimous decision of the Finance Committee at the meeting held this morning, it was stated by Ald. Ray T. Forbes, chairman of the committee. The committee has made a most satisfactory showing in the collections in general, it was stated, but in the cases referred to it was decided that immediate action must

In the cases of taxes, those which are far in arrear and which all other efforts have failed to collect the properties will be sold, while in the cases under the Housing Act, instructions will be given to the city solicitor to foreclose the mortgages.

About eight property owners are still owing to the city under this Act, under which about fifty houses were built here. The money at the time was advanced by the Federal Govern ent, while the city was to assume all responsibility in the event of the failure of the property owner to meet payments. In these cases the eity has been forced to make tue payments to the Government Ald. Forbes stated that it was the opinion of the committee that the using of the taxpayers', money to pay off the debt of a few citizens was unfair and that some such drastic move had to be made.
