

Mount Allison Squad Forge Ahead in N. B. Intercollegiate League

Dickie Gains Shut-out As Team-Mates Drive Five Goals Past Wilson

Small Crowd See Home Collegians Defeated--Goalies Outstanding

The Mount Allison hockey team forged ahead in the Intercollegiate League by defeating the U.N.B. sextet 5-0, on fast ice before a fair sized crowd at the Arctic rink here last evening. Bill Dickie gave an artistic display of net minding for the visitors, and his classy show saved his mates from a possible defeat, as U.N.B. redmen swarmed all around him on numerous occasions. "Hep" Wilson in the U.N.B. net also gave an outstanding performance, and except for one long drive from centre ice, the shots that beat him were from close in.

Russ Johnston and Copp were the pick of the visiting forwards, each scoring two goals. Burgess, former Truro Bearcat junior, McInnis and Palmer, shone on the attack for the U. N. B. team.

First Period

Play opened fast, after Referee Cy Taylor from Saint John, dropped the puck at the opening whistle, and Burgess drove a long shot at Dickie. Palmer and McKinnon combined, but the shot went to the side. Lines changed and Copp was penalized for charging McGibbon. The U. N. B. squad turned on the heat, but were not clicking on their passing plays. Young broke loose but Wilson saved. MacGibbon was close on a solo dash but Dickie blocked neatly. Cunningham, husky Mt. A. rear-guard, lifted a long shot from center ice that fooled Wilson in the U. N. B. cage, and Mt. A. took the lead. Russ Johnston and MacKay carried through after the face off but "Hep" held the disc out. U. N. B. were playing a snappy passing game but were unfinished when in close.

R. Johnston and V. Johnston paired and made Wilson kick-out a hard drive. Bartlett and McKinnon returned with the disc, but Dickie was unbeatable. Palmer carried down and split the Allison defence, and Sleep and Burgess ganged the visitor's cage and again Dickie saved two hard shots. Young fished by Palmer and Wilson did the "split." On a break-away at the 17:16 mark in the period, R. Johnston put the garnet and gold squad two up on a pretty passing bout, which brought Wilson from the cage.

Second Period

In the middle stanza both teams showed more pep, and play opened up with Burgess and Ritchie missing out at one end, and R. Johnston and Copp at the other. R. Johnston again walked through the entire team as Wilson rose to dizzy heights. Brown, Burley U. N. B. rear-guard, took the nod for tripping MacCullum, and Mt. A. ganged Wilson's stronghold. R. Johnston hanging in goal number three at the half way mark in the period. Burgess worked in close but was tripped by Crowe, who was penalized and U. N. B. awarded a penalty shot. Palmer took the shot and failed to hit the net.

Young and Russ Johnston streaked in on Wilson but the little fellow held the rubber out. Burgess, who shone on the attack for the Hillmen, tested Dickie with several close-in drives and McInnis and Sleep failed to beat the cool Bill in the Mounties citadel. Crowe took a trip to the timers for tripping Sleep, and U. N. B. applied the pressure. Burgess missed an open net as McKinnon worked the disc in scoring position. Dickie again saved two drives as Ritchie and Burgess worked past the enemy blue-line.

Third Period

The U. N. B. "kid line" of Burgess, McKinnon and Ritchie, pegged away at Dickie but just couldn't score. Palmer, who led many dangerous rushes throughout the battle, had Dickie down. Brown was chased for a trip, and Copp followed for a knee check, and each team played four a side. Mt. A. ganged the U. N. B. fortress and McInnis acted as a second goal keeper. The Varsity gang milled around Dickie with no avail.

Copp, smart centre for the Mounties, made the score board read 4-0 at the 11:15 mark, when he banged in his own rebound, after "Shorty" Young had worked the disc in close. McGibbon, Sleep and McInnis, sped in close but failed to register. Referee Taylor warned the Mt. A. players to stop their razzing tactics from the bench. THREE WORLD RECORDS BROKEN IN BOSTON MEET

Don Lash Covers Two Miles in 8:58, Shattering Nurmi's Mark--Pole Vault Height Bettered

BOSTON, Feb. 17.—Three world indoor records crashed while the star studded international track and field forces thrilled a packed crowd of 13,682 at the 48th annual Boston A. A. games at the Boston Garden Saturday night.

Cracks Nurmi's Mark

Time was bested by Don Lash, Indiana star, when he gained a smashing two-miles victory in 8:58 flat, 1-5 second under the mark set by Paavo Nurmi 12 years ago, and also by Sam Allen of Bristow, Okla., the United States A.A.U. indoor hurdles champion, who turned in a 5.7 seconds heat in the 45-yard tall timber event, only to be nosed out in the final by Dartmouth's Johnny Donovan, intercollegiate champion.

Allen's time was 1-10th second better than the 5.8 record established by Monty Wells back in 1937. That old mark has been equalled many times since, the last time by Donovan when he broke the tape an inch or so ahead of Allen in the final.

Height was conquered by George Varoff, the University of Oregon star

and he added the world's indoor pole vault record to his outdoor mark, when, on his second try, he cleared 14 feet 4-8 inches. That mighty flight was 7-8 inches higher than the previous best vault, made by Keith Brown, former Yale star, three years ago.

Lash broke the tape at least 100 yards ahead of Norman Bright of the San Francisco Olympic Club. Wayne Rideout, the other Texas twin, struggled over the finish line in third place followed at regular intervals by his brother and the veteran Joe McCluskey.

When Lash reached the mile and three-quarters mark in 7:52.2 he also wrecked the 7:55.2 indoor record for that distance which Nurmi established in Buffalo back in 1925.

Lash had previously won from the Hunter Mile which was won easily by Glenn Cunningham with Gene Venzke second. Cunningham's time was 4:12.3.

ESKIMOS HUMBLE ST. CROIX 8 TO 2 IN SECOND GAME

Gulliver Back in Lineup And Plays Standout Game

EDMUNDSTON, N. B., Feb. 17.—Contrary to reports that the St. Stephen St. Croix won from Edmundston Eskimos here twice on the week-end the Eskimos took the second game 8-2 after St. Croix had trimmed them 7-2 on Saturday night. With Bill Gulliver back and the team at full strength apart from the goalie they put on plenty of pressure and humbled the second place finishers in the Southern New Brunswick League.

As was stated here by the St. Croix management that the class of hockey played by Edmundston didn't compare with that played in the Southern League such is not the case as shown by the Eskimos in the second game. They outplayed the St. Croix team in all three periods and had the border players completely disorganized with their rapid-fire attacks.

The game was rough from the start. Tripping, checking on the boards and knee-checks on the part of the defence brought many penalties to the Saints.

The first period opened with Rousseau scoring two fast ones on assists from Gulliver and Dickie. Both scores were registered in the first two minutes of play and the fans were instantly on their feet. The ice was in worse condition than Saturday night and the puck refused to behave but nevertheless both teams seemed anxious for a victory and play was surprisingly fast. Lowe succeeded in scoring for the Saints, shooting from the Eskimo blue-line, but Gulliver retaliated on a pass from Dickie and Rousseau. Penalties then rained on both teams but both failed to score until the last few minutes of play, when Gulliver made a solo to bring the score 4-1 in favor of the Eskimos.

Eskimos played one man short most of the time in the second stanza. Penalties simply rained on them from the Saints referee, Prilutsky, who had to keep away from the sides as more than one took swings at his head with their fists. Eskimos were hard pressed for a while when with two men in the pen, they had Saints rushing five men up the ice. MacIntyre succeeded in sending a stray shot past Harris and the score stood 4-2 at the end of the second.

The third period saw the Eskimos advance four points with Rousseau, Bourgeois, Dickie and Gulliver scoring on able assists from teammates. Saints were completely disorganized and Coffey stopped an avalanche of shots aimed at his nets before the final bell brought the game to an end. Boxing Champion On Present Day Crop

Joe Uvanni, one-time middleweight boxing champion of Canada, casts a critical eye on the present crop of fighters and suggested most of them needed a thorough course of instruction in the fundamentals of the sport.

Uvanni, who won his crown from Clove Hawkins at Calgary in 1912, said "most modern day ringmen are fighting with their fists instead of their heads."

"Too often," he charged, "young fighters are pushed ahead by money hungry managers to tackle more experienced men long before they are ready."

"In my day fighters often spent years under the tutelage of a finished boxing master before attempting any actual ring work, but once we were pronounced ready we fought as frequently as twice a month."

Joe was born in Dugenta, Italy, in 1884. His family moved to the United States when he was 11 and by the time he was in his late teens he was in the amateur ring. He turned professional in 1903 after training under Jim Dalley, the Philadelphia who also tutored "Gentleman Jim" Corbett.

Uvanni smacked the Canadian crown off Hawkin's head in Tommy Burns' Manchester arena. Burns, the only Canadian to rule the heavyweight roost, refereed the match. It was staged in the ring where Luther McCarthy died in the historic fight with Art Pelky. Joe held the championship until July 1, 1914, when Billy Weeks defeated him at Fernie, B.C.

Altogether, Joe fought 217 battles. He was knocked out only three times earned 13 draws and lost ten bouts. Following his retirement in 1919, he became physical director at the Policeman's Athletic Club in Sydney, N. S. He moved back to Rome, N. Y. in 1924.

Despite his 52 years and the fact 2,000 ring battles are behind him, Uvanni's muscles are tough and his step as quick as when he scrapped the best men in his division. He is sure he could give the current mitt slingers in the scientific art of planting cauliflower ears and recently offered his services to two of his favorite ringsters, lightweight champion Lou Ambers and Harry Balsamo, New York middleweight who has a devastating punch but little else.

Attendance at N.H.L. Games This Season

NEW YORK, Feb. 17.—Attendance at National Hockey League matches so far this season indicate club owners will enjoy one of the best financial years in the league's history, President Frank Calder said today.

Here on a "routine inspection trip" the league head said he believed, if the present average attendance holds to the end of the schedule, some 200,000 more persons will have seen major league puckchasing than last season when close to 2,000,000 attended.

New York Americans, stepchild of the N. H. L., promises to finish with a substantial profit despite the club's position at the bottom of the Canadian group, he said.

Calder added that interest was high in amateur hockey in Canada as well as in the United States and this, he believed, augured well for the game as a whole.
