## Killing By Automobile

In Canada in 1935 one thousand two hundred and twenty four human beings were killed outright, or fatally injured in motor vehicle accidents according to the chairman of the executive committee of the Royal Automobile Club of Canada. The figures for 1936 are not yet completed. Early indications however show that there were more killings than in 1935 just as 1935 showed an increase in motor deaths over 1934. In one city alone-Montreal, 22 motor vehicle accidents occured in one day.

During the past thirty years everything connected with motoring has progressed, the car designs, the engines, the brakes, the tires. But the nut at the wheel remains the same. Despite the fact that the highways are wider, are better built, and well maintained the automobile killings still go on.

The gentleman referred to, points out in the current issue of MacLean's Magazine that about 15 per cent of the drivers are responsible for almost one hundred per cent of the accidents. This feature of the automobile problem must be corrected and it must be done quickly. It can only be done through a public opinion thoroughly aroused over the unnecessary killing and the waste of hu-

It is up to the authorities to take some practical action to preserve human life. Something else will have to be done besides issuing warnings regarding careful driving and safety regulations. The nut behind the wheel who pays no attention to these warnings should be dealt with in a practical way. The courts have the authority if they will enforce it to remedy these killings.

In many cases the public in Canada assumes a lax attitude in regard to the enforcement of the laws in this regard. We do not need more laws, we need an enforcement of the laws which we already have on our statute books. There is no excuse at all for allowing a man to drive a car while he is under the influence of liquor. Imagine a railway driver on a locomotive trying to pilot his car along the rails while he is half full of booze. Incidentally no man should be allowed on any job while he is half full of liquor. He can not do his work when he is full half of the time and half full all of the time. This especially applies to a man behind the wheel

As has been pointed out the law enforcement in regard to traffic violations is enforced strictly in the United States. Not only does this apply to the drunken driver but to the fool who tries to break the speed limit.

It is to be hoped that with the season which is now upon us that not only the city police, but the motorcycle police patrols of the R. C. M. P. out in the country, will do their part to check the violations of the motor vehicle act not only in regard to the drunken driver but also in regard to the reckless driver.
