ETHER, THE MOST SATISFACTORY ANESTHETIC

Just 95 years ago Dr. Crawford W. Long of Georgia, put James Venable to sleep by having him breathe some ether, so that the doctor could remove a tumor growth from Mr. Venable's body without pain.

Dr. Long had been graduated only three years previously from the Medical School of Pennsylvania University, the first medical school to be established in this country. This is the record of the first surgical operation ever done on a person put to sleep temporarily with ether or any other chemical substance.

Since that famous discovery of ether as an anesthetic, scientists have been trying other chemicals that might be better than ether. The first of these was chloroform. For years thereafter medical men spent many hours arguing which of the two was the better.

But today ether is accepted as the most dependable of all anesthetics. This was recently brought out in the Journal of Surgery by Dr. F. H. Lahey of Boston, and others, who discussed the subject of anesthetics. They seemed to agree that ether is the best material we know of to put people to sleep when they are to be operated on. Chloroform, they believe, is the most poisonous and dangerous.

We are told by Dr. Lahey of a new gas, called cyclopropane, that puts persons to sleep quickly. Its advantage is that only small quantities are necessary. However, it is difficult to handle and the doctor must be very careful in using it.

In many cases, ethylene gas is used satisfactorily and, when given in small doses, is not dangerous. It does not cause sickness in the stomach, as ether does. Furthermore, the patient wakes up quickly after he stops getting the anesthetic, while he remains under the effects of ether for an hour or more after it is given. Ethylene as an anesthetic was discovered by Dr. O. B. Luckhardt, of the University of Chicago.

Another anesthetic is nitrous oxide or laughing gas. It has been found that when too much of this is given there is danger of suffocation to the person who goes to sleep. Laughing gas is a good anesthetic but must be used with great caution.

There are certain substances which are used to deaden pain in only a part of the body, while the surgeon is working on it. They are called local anesthetics. Novocain is one of these. There are also anesthetics which are injected into the spinal column so as to make the nerves lose their feeling. The part of the body through which those nerves pass becomes numb and without feeling.

One of the first things that a doctor always finds out when he plans to use an anesthetic is whether the person's heart and lungs are healthy. He also considers the patient's age. When the heart has been damaged by some disease or the lungs are not normal, or when an individual has diabetes or chronic kidney disease, or a goiter, the body is weakened and may not be able to withstand the shock of an anesthetic as can the normal person. In such cases, if operations must be done, the doctor will try to use a local anesthetic.

The doctor knows best what anesthetic to use. He may decide to use a local anesthetic for a rather complicated operation. However, if the operation requires much time and the complete relaxation of the patient, he will try to use a general anesthetic, such as ether.

Today, we accept, as a matter of course, the use of anesthetics to relieve pain. We should remember however, that less than a hundred years ago all surgery was done while the patient was completely conscious, and death from shock was enormous.

REFURBISHING SUMMER HOME WITH ARTISTIC TRINKETS

Any week-end you'll be driving down to your summer home to look the ground over, outside and in, and make your plans for refurbishing and brightening a place that doesn't look quite as gay as you think it should.

Or perhaps you're one of the first favored week-end guests. What shall you take your hostess to show your appreciation?

There are scores of things from California that bring the dazzling colors, the cheer and personality of that sun-drenched state into a vacation home.

Redwood plaques made from Sequoia trees to remedy a wall with a blank expression. Vividly painted pictures of Mexican scenes and figures are raised above the natural rosy-beige background of the wood showing the ridges, each one of which marks a year's growth. You can trace the flood and drought years of long ago—an easy lesson in natural history for the children.

Corner shelves in cracked and antiqued white finish, with rope carving around the shelves, gay, painted figures and orange accents.

Guest books of antique white wood with hand-hammered, copper plaques on the covers showing cacti, dozing Mexicans and such typical far Western sights, if you can believe the pictures.

Scrapbooks for all those fine snapshots that will be taken, of wood with hinged covers decorated with raised figures painted in primary colors.

Painted steel silhouettes of pines, palms, horsemen and Spanish dancers act as bookends, or are attached to flower pot holders to hang against the wall. Smaller silhouettes are up-standing handles for match box holders.

From Mexico comes primitive, colorful and charming glassware for informal summer tables. Virgin of Guadalupe wine bottles are made of blue green glass, pale or deep, cloudy with tiny bubbles, irregularly shaped, some even leaning a tiny bit to one side. There are glasses of various sizes to match.

Brown glassware shades from clear amber to opaque dark brown in swirled patterns. The centres of the plates rise in rounded mounds, and the glasses are not just exactly alike, which is just the way the Mexicans think they should be.

Franciscan ovenproof pottery will find a useful place in anyone's summer home. Colors are beautiful, shapes simple and graceful, and the glaze is unusually high. Something new in pottery is the gunmetal black with yellow lining.

MINIATURE DAHLIAS FOR BEDDING

The Old Gardener says: Although the modern large-flowering dahlia is distinctly American in origin and development, European growers, particularly those in England, have accomplished much in making this flower versatile.

Attention has recently been given toward growing it downward in stature and size of bloom, the success of which has given us a flower suitable for bedding which has most of the brilliancy of its more pretentious relative, and has the added advantage of easy culture.

The Coltness hybrid was the forerunner of this series of miniature dahlias, and is now well known, and as easily grown in the amateur garden as the zinnia. It gives an early bloom even when planted as late as May 1.

Unwin dahlias, a further development of the bedding type, are taller than the Coltness, with a more varied color range, and semi-double flowers, about 3 inches in diameter, of soft pink, lavender, red, orange, yellow and maroon. They blossom until killing frosts arrive.

Bedding dahlias grown from seed are a valuable addition to any garden inasmuch as root slips of favorites in colors in a long range may be served, as with the larger types, and kept over winter to be planted again in the spring. Once started from seed they may always be saved for an all-summer display the following season. Their single blooms are from two to four inches in diameter, and with their good stems they make excellent subjects for cutting.

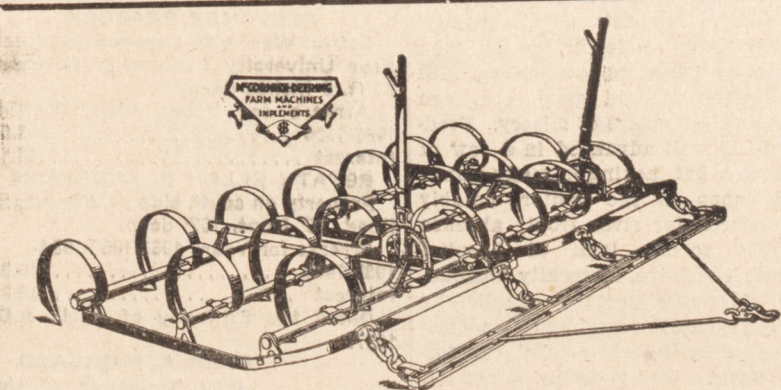
