Fredericton Student Wins Scholarship

Wilfrid Raymond Foster, Fredericton, is the recipient of a Knights of Columbus fellowship in geology and Walter James Gallagher, Bath, the recipient of one of sociology for the academic year 1937-38 at the Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C., as announced by the rector, Rt. Rev. Joseph M. Corrigan.

The Knights of Columbus fellowship is a grant of tuition, board and room, open to graduate students in any department. There are 25 of these fellowships which are granted to men only.

Foster won a four-year scholarship at the Catholic University on his graduation from the University of New Brunswick at Fredericton with a degree of bachelor of science with honors in 1934. That was the first instance of a Knights of Columbus scholarship to the Catholic University being won by a graduate of U. N. B.

HARTT'S POOL IS ATTRACTING MANY U. S. SPORTSMEN

Several Fine Catches Reported --- Hooks 15-Pounder

The Hartt's Island salmon pool on the Saint John river near here is off to an early start this season as a resort for anglers. While there is a fair run of salmon on at the present time and many are being taken by net fishermen, they do not seem to be keen on rising to a fly. Six non-residents spent part of last week at the pool, but had rather indifferent success. Only a few fish were taken by fly fishermen. Forham Hubbard of LaPlata, Md., being one of the lucky ones. Just before setting out for his summer home at Campobello, he landed a 13-pounder.

A party of six, including two ladies, arrived at the pool yesterday and are now comfortably housed at Roland Wheeler's camp. This party, which arrived by car, is composed of Mr. and Mrs. H. O. Cook, Mrs. Cook's mother and Walter Hagerman of Providence, R. I. They plan to stay the remainder of the week.

Another party which arrived by train yesterday to fish with Guide Wheeler, is composed of George W. Freeman and Solomon Lyas of Worcester, Mass. Mr. Freeman is an annual visitor to the pool, and has many friends here, who are always pleased to welcome him. He is an optometrist by profession, and when at home often gladdens the optics of his clients with moving pictures of angling scenes at the Hartt's Pool, which he filmed himself. Mr. Freeman is a skillful and successful angler, and greatly enjoys the sport. A few years ago, while fishing at the Chokey pool, near Hartt's Island, he contacted a 24-pound salmon, which he brought to the gaff after a stubborn battle of over two hours. Mr. Freeman will remain until the last of the week when he will be joined by H. H. Forbes of Worcester, Mass., and the two will proceed by car to the Restigouche, where they will whip the open waters of that famous river.

Fishing from a canoe this morning Mr. Lyas hooked and landed a 15-pounder and Mr. Freeman, not to be outdone, brought a nice 14-pounder to the gaff. Both were delighted with their success.

It is likely that His Excellency the Governor General will try his hand at salmon fishing at the Hartt's Pool on Thursday afternoon.

FREDERICTON STUDENTS WIN FELLOWSHIP FURTHER STUDY

The following fellowships to Canadian and American Universities have been announced.

H. D. Woods, B.A. (New Brunswick) M.A. (McGill), has been awarded the Maurice Cody research fellowship, a University of Toronto announcement said today. Worth \$1,200, the fellowship was founded by friends of the late Henry Maurice Cody for the encouragement of the study of Canadian economic conditions. Mr. Woods held the fellowship during the past session and intends to continue research during the present session on conservation of raw materials.

N.B.W.I. Opened Its 25th Annual Meeting To-day

PRESIDENTIAL REPORT AND CIVIC ADDRESS OF WELCOME FEATURES THE OPENING SESSION THIS MORNING

Mayor G. W. Kitchen Pays High Tribute to the Work of the Province-Wide Organization -- Hon. A. C. Taylor to Address Delegates

THE splendid contributions to the welfare of the province made by the New Brunswick Women's Institute were extolled in the civic address of welcome to the delegates attending the 25th annual conference of the provincial organization which opened here this morning. The address, delivered by His Worship Mayor G. W. Kitchen, together with the presidential report given by the president, Mrs. A. D. McCain, Florenceville, were the highlights of the opening session which convened in the legislative chambers of the Parliament Building.

In his remarks, the chief magistrate expressed the pleasure it afforded him to welcome the delegates on behalf of the citizens of Fredericton. He referred to the fact that it was the third occasion on which he was privileged to extend welcome to Institute members. Referring to the outstanding accomplishments made to the province by the organization, Mayor Kitchen paid high tribute to the members for their work in connection with relief and other social problems.

Relief Problem

Dealing with the problem of relief, Mayor Kitchen spoke of the detrimental effects which resulted in many cases. Many people receiving relief, the mayor contended, are satisfied to permit the municipalities to contribute toward their support and will not make any effort themselves to help the situation. The speaker cited instances where people of relief were content to remain idle and, in many cases, refused to work. The mayor described such conditions as one of the biggest problems facing the various municipalities throughout the province, stating that something must be done to bring about a solution. In the latter connection, he suggested that the convention submit a resolution to the government asking that legislation be passed forcing people to go to work who refused to do so.

The mayor pointed out that the Institute as well as the various social organizations which are represented in its membership could do much to solve existing problems. He urged that the members render every assistance in bringing about a satisfactory solution of the pressing problem. In closing, he extended a hearty welcome to the delegates, asserting

that the city was honored by the presence of the delegates.

Fitting Reply

Replying on behalf of the delegates, numbering about 200, Mrs. W. H. Prescott, Baie Verte, referred to the hospitality and kindness with which the institute members were always accorded when they visited the Capital City. She briefly dealt with the colorful history of Fredericton, describing it as one of the most beautiful centres in the Dominion. She then thanked the mayor for his splendid address.

The opening session commenced with the singing of "O Canada" by the entire gathering. A brief period of silence was then observed in memory of all institute members who passed away during the year. This was followed by the singing of the hymn "Nearer My God To Thee."

Following the remarks of Mayor Kitchen and Mrs. Prescott, greetings from the Fredericton Branch were extended by Mrs. G. I. Nugent, president of the local group. Greetings from the Provincial Chapter, I.O.D.E., were brought by the president of the organization, Mrs. A. T. McMurray of this city.

President's Address

A review of activities during the past year was given in the report of the president, Mrs. McCain. She referred to the significance of 1937, describing it as one of the most important years in the history of the

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OWENS TO SERVE THREE YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

Pleaded Guilty to Assault Charge --- Others Freed

Pleading guilty to a charge of assaulting a Royal Canadian Mounted Police officer and occasioning grievous bodily harm, Frank Owens was sentenced to serve three years in the Maritime Penitentiary at Dorchester when he was brought before His Honor Arthur L. Slipp, judge of York County court this morning. The companions of the accused, Richard Atherton and John Eatman pleaded not guilty to similar charges and were discharged. The three men recently elected to be tried under the Speedy Trials Act when they were arraigned before Police Magistrate Limerick in police court here. The latter two pleaded not guilty in court today.

The arrest of the trio followed a complaint that Constable deMiffonis, Fredericton detachment, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, was assaulted and injured by the three young men. They were brought before Magistrate Limerick and were committed to stand trial. Constable deMiffonis was severely injured in the assault made by Owens.

Other cases on the docket this morning included the cases of John Welsh and Robert Laking, both of McAdam. They faced charges of obstructing property of the Canadian Pacific Railway at McAdam Junction. No plea was taken and the pair were remanded until Monday.

Derby Guide Reports May Best Angling Month in Years

David A. Manderville, a noted guide of Derby, Northumberland county, who was a visitor to the city today, says that the month of May was the best for non-resident anglers which he ever experienced. At one time he had fourteen non-residents out fishing, at the White Rapids and at the mouth of the Renous. Paul Starret, who was the contractor for the erection of the famous Empire State Building in New York, was among the number. The party remained on the river for ten days and had excellent sport. More recently, Mr. Manderville had three Boston parties out on the Renous and Little Southwest Miramichi Rivers, and they contacted some schools of sea trout, landing a number which ran up to five pounds in weight. They declared that it was the best trout fishing that they had ever experienced.

Local Woman Bruised In Auto Accident

Mrs. Harry Walker of this city was badly bruised and shaken up when the car she was driving collided with a vehicle coming out a side road near Saint John. Neither of the cars were badly damaged. Mrs. Walker's car was driven back to Fredericton under its own power.

Mrs. Walker is resting comfortably at her home, and it is expected that she will be able to be out within a short time.

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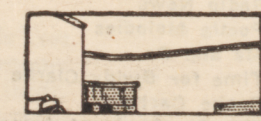
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
