stated the petitioner on taking the stand in the case of Ethel May Buchanan vs. Herbert Vaughan Buchanan, an action set over from earlier in the week. She left him last winter, according to her testimony, but returned to him in March. They have not lived together since May because her husband told her that he loved Gertrude Lane and would not give her up, she said. On being questioned by Mr. Justice Grimmer, she denied any collusion for a divorce between her and the respondent.

### In Bed Together

Paul Buchanan, 20 year old brother of the respondent, stated that he saw him in bed with the co-respondent, and that his brother was undressed at the time.

Mr. Justice Grimmer allowed the decree with costs and gave the custody of the three children to the mother, subject, however, to further order of the court on possible application by the father. In doing this, he stated that it is not the well being of either parent that is primarily to be considered, but the well being of the children.

Five decrees were awarded yesterday afternoon by Mr. Justice Grimmer, which, with the one granted yesterday morning, makes a total of six for the day. All the cases were undefended, two originating in Albert Co., two in Moncton, and one in Woodstock.

A decree was granted to Charles Allan Brown, Coverdale, Albert County, from Hazel Margaret Brown, Boston. Petition, naming Herbert Blakney, Coverdale, was presented by W. H. Goodwin of Moncton. Maxwell Duff, Sinton, Albert County, and the petitioner gave evidence.

Ernest Peter Leaman, Moncton, was given a divorce from Irene Cora Leaman, Moncton, following the evidence of Elmer Steeves, police officer in Moncton, and the petitioner, H. W. Goodwin filed the petition, which named John Thatcher, Moncton.

Jean Hamilton, Woodstock, was awarded a decree from William Hamilton, Woodstock, in which Ruby Drost of the parish of Woodstock was named. Ruby Thornton and the petitioner were called as witnesses by Hon. F. C. Squires, who filed the petition.

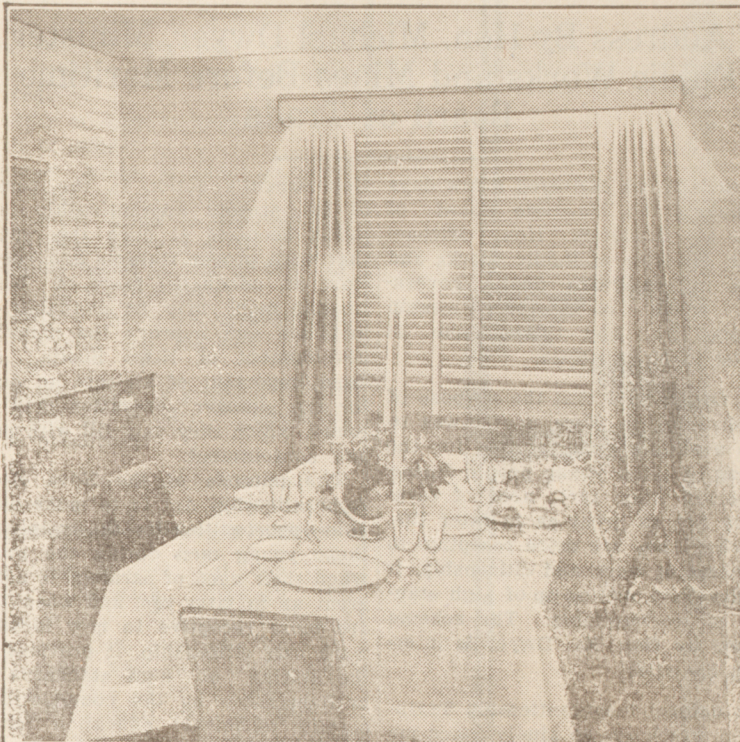

Here's a New Way to Have Candlelight  
Without Gloom or Glare

Candlelight gives a pleasing effect, but often is tiring to the eye. Concealed light coming from behind a drapery lambrequin, as shown here, softens the brilliance of the candles and enhances the general scheme.

THE dining room in the average home has come to be the "coat of many colors." Sometimes it must be the efficient study or game room, or even the sewing room, for often the table is the only area in the house big enough for cutting. ### Lighting Can Be Flexible

One ceiling lighting fixture—even one of those fine modern ones—is scarcely resourceful enough to serve all these varying demands equally well.

The latter method is the newest, and is becoming extremely popular. It employs a concealed metal trough equipped with several of the new luminaire lamps, and sheds a soft radiance that is really a joy to behold. Any good electrician can install it for you in very little time, and the cost is quite moderate.

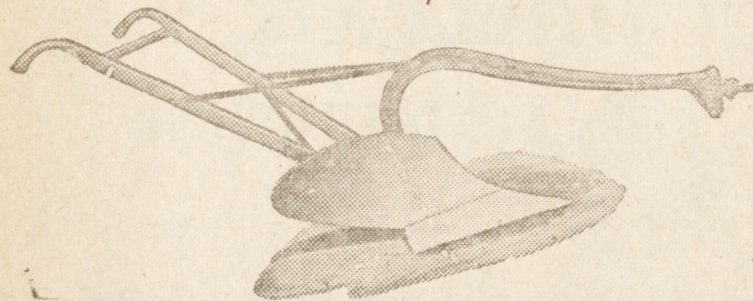
