SPAN. GOVT. DRIVEMADRID, July 9—Official comin-
ques from Government and rebel
headquarters in Spain give widely
different versions of the success of
the great Government drive against
rebel positions near Madrid.In an official statement from In-
surgent headquarters General Franco
dismissed the matter in a few words
saying that"The Government offensive has
been repulsed with great loss."The Minister of Defense for the
Loyalist Government however, claims
the capture of a strategically impor-
tant town west of Madrid and sub-
stantial progress at other points to
the east and south.MADRID, July 9—Thirty thousand
loyalists under the strong General
Miaza savior of Madrid, hammer
fiercely at insurgent lines near No-
val Carnero, the main rebel base
in the Madrid area. Success or fail-
ure may change the fortune of the
whole war.Insurgent headquarters state that
the attack is being carried out in
greater force than any Loyalist ef-
fort of the whole war. They admit
that it may be necessary to discon-
tinue operations on the Basque front
against Santander to cope with it.Encouraged by the diversion, the
defenders of Santander are offering
a more stubborn resistance to the
rebel advance on the Basque city.The object of the Madrid Loyalist
operations is a determined attempt
to force a rebel retreat and raise the
siege of Madrid which has contin-
ued nearly ten months.British Capital
Heavily Invested In
Basque Country

(Special to The Daily Mail)

LONDON, July 9—Great Britain
has at last laid aside her attitude of
an uninterested spectator and has
been following events in Spain with
the keenest interest since the capture
of Bilbao by the rebels. British cap-
ital is heavily invested in the Basque
mines about Bilbao and Santander.
England last year drew about one
fifth of her iron ore from this area.
The Germans have intimated to
France that they expect the iron ore
of the Basque mines as their reward
for their support.Great diplomatic activity is the re-
sult with a steady stiffening of the
British and French attitude toward
German and Italian rearmament. It
hardly appeals to the British business
instincts that British controlled
mines should furnish gratis the iron
ore needed so desperately for Ger-
man rearmament.

Marie Crawford.

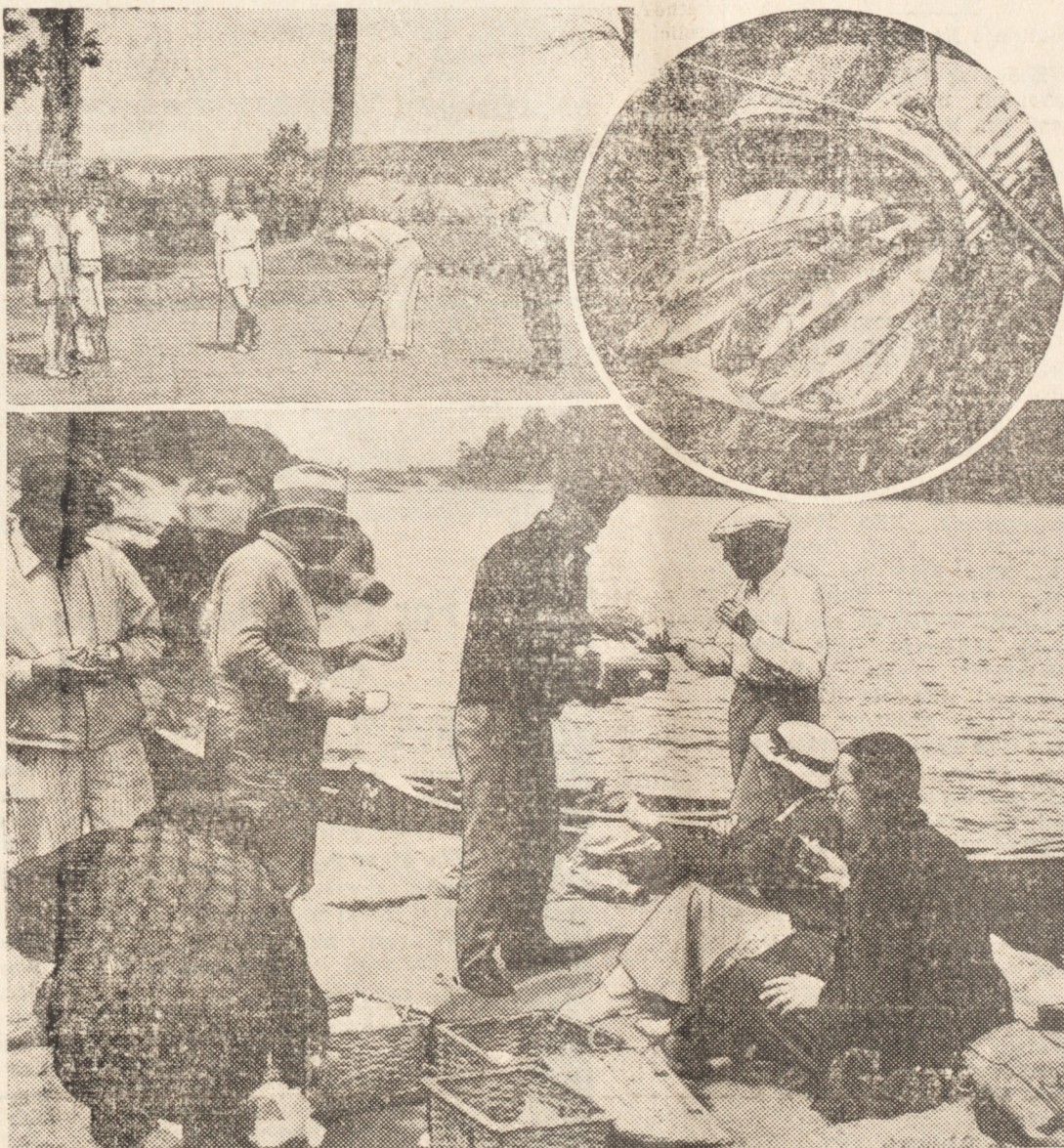
MY GARDEN
