

New Brunswick Annual Golf Tournament Opens At Moncton July 12th

Champion to Defend Titles Captured in '36

A Large Entry List Is Expected From N. B. and P.E.I. Clubs

MONCTON, July 9—The New Brunswick Golf Association's fourth annual tournament will get under way on the links of the Riverside Golf Club here, Monday morning of next week, July 12 and continue through July 13 and 14. Play will be conducted on Atlantic Daylight Time.

The two championships, New Brunswick-P. E. I. amateur, and the New Brunswick-P. E. I. open, will be staged with the former open to amateurs only who are members of the parent body and the latter open to amateurs and pros of any of the clubs affiliated with the N.B.G.A.

A record entry list is expected and the competitors will register at Moncton over the week-end. Frank N. Robertson, secretary treasurer of the New Brunswick Golf Association will leave for the Hub tomorrow afternoon to take care of final preparations.

Rev. J. Walter Holland of Saint John, honorary member of the Algonquin Golf Club, St. Andrews, and a member of the Riverside Golf and Country Club, will defend his titles won last year in both the amateur and open. He will play in this year's tournament for the Riverside Club.

It was announced also that Pete Kelly of the Charlottetown Club will be on hand. Pete was runner-up last year in the Maritime to Joe Lamb, making that affair an N.H.L. final. Both former Maritimers play for teams in the big time, Kelly for Detroit Red Wings, and Lamb for New York Americans.

Aubrey Steeves, amateur champ at Riverdale, Moncton, is expected to make a good showing on his home course, as is Larry Thornton, pro of the Moncton Club. Both Riverdale and Lakeside clubs at Moncton will be represented in the meet. River-

side will have at least two teams in the meet and possibly a third, while Westfield will have a strong team of youthful shotmakers.

The annual dinner will be held at 7 p.m. Monday, and the annual meeting of the N.B. Golf Association, including the election of officers, will take place.

The prize list for the annual is a lengthy one and includes the Lieutenant-Governor's medal and Mr. Justice Tilley's cup for the amateur champion, the N.B. Golf Association silver trophy for the N.B.-P.E.I. open champion, Toronto Star Weekly trophy for the best net score of the meet, prizes for best gross and runner-up, and best net and runners-up in each division, prize donated by Norman Wilson of St. Andrews, N. B. for special 36-hole competition, Johnson and Ward trophy for the N. B.G.A. team making the best gross score, The Telegraph-Journal trophy for the N.B.G.A. team making the best net score, individual prizes for members of the winning teams and cash prizes for the N.B.-P.E.I. professionals.

LARGE NUMBER ENTRIES FOR TRACK AND FIELD MEET

SAINT JOHN, July 8—It was announced last night by J. Harold Chown, secretary of the Saint John Olympic Club that over fifty separate entries had been received from all parts of the Maritimes for the Maritime Track and Field Championships for Men and the Maritime British Empire Games Trials for Women to be held at the K-Club grounds on July 9 and 10 as the list of competitors was released.

Among the many stars of the game entered is a strong team of twelve members from Halifax, N.S., who in their elimination trials last Saturday on the Wanderers' Grounds, succeeded in setting six new Maritime records for women.

Miss May Blakeney set new Junior records in the 60 yd. dash; broad jump; and helped her team set a new 440 yd. relay record.

M. Collier set a new record in the Jr. jump, and Miss Kay Parris one in the Junior Baseball Throw. Miss M. Taylor set a new mark in the Senior Shot-put.

Among the other stars coming from Halifax are Aileen Meagher, Olympic and Canadian champion; Evelyn Jemmot, who holds the Senior Maritime Javelin record and is co-holder of the Canadian 60-metre dash record, Teresa Jemmot, Vivian Graham, Betty Robinson, Joyce Lockwood and others.

These girls will offer our local girl athletes plenty of competition, but it is expected that the Saint John group including Helen Chestnut, Marjorie and Rhena Buckley and others will be able to hold their own, if not take some of the events.

Miss Chestnut of the Y.W.C.A. is a bright young star and should go places in the hurdles and high jump. Kay Trainor is an old hand at the game and expects to be up at the top when the events are over.

For the Men's Events there is Don Smith of Havelock Station, who won the 220; 400 yd. dashes and set a new record in the recent N. B. Inter-scholastic meet; Eric Forbes, Halifax, who won the broad jump at the Maritime Track Meet last year and hopes to be able to get a new record this year; Alvin Thompson, Pictou, who won the pole vault event at the recent Intercollegiate meet here and who should set a new Maritime senior record in the event.

Ambrose Day, Milltown, who set the N. B. Inter-scholastic record for the pole vault last year should offer Thompson plenty of competition.

SAINT JOHN, July 9—Champions and near champions, the cream of track and field athletes in the Maritimes, assembled in Saint John last night for the biggest event ever staged in this city of champions. Tonight at 6.30 o'clock on the K-Club Recreational Centre these athletes will vie for honors in the two-day program of sports, in the men's Maritime track and field championships, the Maritime zone trials for the women's British Empire games to be held in Australia next February and the junior boys' and girls' events also being staged in conjunction with these two big events.

The track on the K-Club Centre is in excellent shape and, with the promise of fine weather, all is in readiness for the initial crack of the starter's gun. A. W. Corey, president of the Saint John Olympic Club, sponsor of the meet, released the list of entries yesterday. All officials are requested to be at the track at 6.15 o'clock. The meet is under the distinguished patronage of Lieutenant-Governor Murray MacLaren, Mayor MacLellan and the City Council all of whom will be present at the meet tonight and tomorrow.

MAX SCHMELING IS BEING GIVEN RUN AROUND

NEW YORK, July 8—In all gravity, the New York Boxing Commission, which all along had been telling Max Schmeling that he would be taken care of, proceeded Tuesday to show him exactly what it meant. It sanctioned a world's heavyweight championship fight between Joe Louis and Tommy Farr, of England, for the Yankee Stadium on September 13, and at the same time, announced that Schmeling no longer rated consideration as the No. 1 challenger.

The next step, of course, is clear. Schmeling must meet Big Boy Peterson in order to prove himself, and, after that, there's W. C. Fields and Father Divine.

In other words, Schmeling is getting quite a nudging around, but I'm beginning to wonder whether he has anybody but himself to blame. He still holds the winning hand—Farr isn't out of England yet—but the way he's been going for the last month, I think he must be playing the cards by the bicycles on the backs.

As his manager might and probably would and will say: 'he shoulda stood in America,' making himself available for September fight that was promised him by all parties. Instead, when he was given the old gimlet on the Braddock-Louis business in Chicago, he said he'd never return here. Then he said he couldn't, because he and Farr had signed to meet in London, September 1. This latter was the commission's 'out' yesterday.

Briefly, the Louis people now have Schmeling in a position where he seems to be avoiding their man.

They're not especially interested in Farr, except as a means of blocking Schmeling's counter plans. Farr, as a matter of fact, won't draw caricatures at the Yankee Stadium and
