NBC WILL INAUGURATE TEN **NEW STATIONS IN BLUE NETWORK**

NEW YORK, July 9-The coast-to-coast Blue Network of the National Broadcasting Company takes another step forward in its plans to expand its service to the nation with the announcement by Lenox R. Lohr, president of NBC, that ten stations, located in some of the richest and most populous sections of the South, will become Blue affiliates on Sunday, August 1st.

The addition of these stations, Mr. Lohr said, will provide listeners in the South with a choice of two full-time NBC services over separate Blue and Red chains of stations. Previously in most Southern cities there has been only one NEC station, and thus listeners were deprived of either the Blue or Red network programmes.




