
berries shipped to Upper Canadian markets by the newly organized Grand Lake Strawberry Growers Association. The organization exported about nine carloads of berries to Montreal. The average load consisted of about 300 cases, making a total of 2,700 cases. The approximate number of boxes shipped by the association was 86,400.

Last year's strawberry production in New Brunswick totalled 1,700,000 boxes. Although it is generally believed that the production this season will be considerably lower, no official figures are yet available.
