Bus Men's

After completion of the night's res ular runs the bus men declared they owuld operate no more buses unless emergencies produced a call for special services, such as ambulance work.

By morning the strike was certain to disrupt the normal habits of more than 5,000,000 bus-using Londoners and throw a severe strain on other traffic arteries, such as subways and trams, already glutted with throngs definitely as a promotional feature onpouring into the city for today's Football Association cup final at Wembley Stadium and the early celebrations in conneccion with the corona-

Tram workers announced they would not stop work unless the bus companies tried to hire non-union workers to continue the service.

Meanwhile the possibility remained hat some solution would be found within the 12 days before the coronation ceremony. Most of the bus workers appeared disposed to accept a temporary improvement in working conditions under which their demand for a 71-2 hour day would be submitted to negotiation.

Union circles suggested the possibility that the state would grant the bus company a temporary subsidy if it were established they could not afford a reduced work week for their employees.

The bus companies, through the London Passenger Transport Board. declare they cannot afford to meet the cost involved in the shorter day. See Long Struggle

Others of the men believed it would be a long struggle. Pickets were stationed in front of all bus garages to see that no vehicles start their regular trips, normally beginning about \$ a.m. As the buses reached their terminals they were washed as ususal, then parked in long lines.
