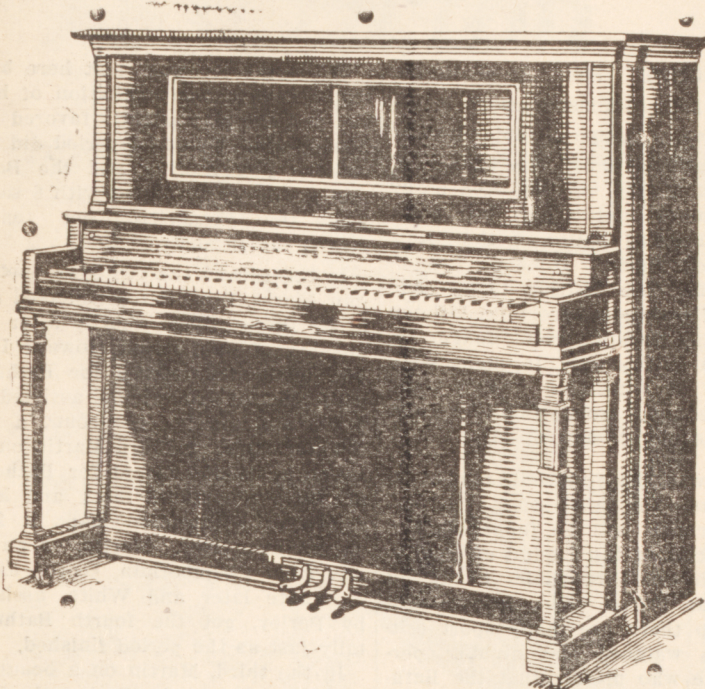


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# "SALADA" TEA

DR. THEODORE G. ROBERTS

Dr. Theodore Goodridge Roberts, novelist and writer, formerly of this city who is now located in Toronto, is about to write an indefinite number of Volumes, dealing with those Loyalists who adhered to the Unity of the Empire and joined the Royal Standard before the Treaty of Separation in the year 1783, and their descendants.

In this work he shall make no attempt at chronological order from volume to volume, but shall deal with individuals, families and groups of these people and their descendants through the generations as information concerning them comes to my hand.

By stressing the influence of heredity and environment upon the characters, actions and manners of individuals, families and communities, he hopes to produce something more than, and very different from, the usual history of political events.

His plan of issuing the work in parts of 32 pages each, as it progresses, gives a flexibility of design intended to enable him to make the most of all material, historical, biographical and genealogical, as he comes by it. For this material—the stuff to make "Loyalists" a unique work among histories and a record worthy of its great subject he looks to those of United Empire Loyalist ancestry, to furnish him with matter from family archives and legends.

Adding to the play's humor were the important roles of Bud Simpson (Bruce Bird), a lively youngster working for Dan; Mollie Fielding (Mrs. Dunphy), Dan's comical aunt; and Joanna (Miss Greta Cresswell), Dan's snappy young sister. The audience was most appreciative of the comedy and the capable cast proved fully their successful stage ability.
