WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 18-Opposing tennis forces of Germany and the United States rested today after splitting even in the first two singles matches Saturday of the Davis Cup interzone tennis finals.

Playing for the right to face the British team in the challenge round next week and, the United States Gottfried Von Cramm thrashed Bryan M.
