JANSSEN ON OWN PROGRAM JULY 4

HOLLYWOOD, June 29 — Werner Janssen, outstanding American conductor, will be starred in his own radio program beginning Sunday, July 4. Janssen will direct a program of popular music to be sponsored by Fleischmann's yeast and broadcast over the NEC Blue network every Sunday from 7:30 to 8 p.m., EDT.

Since May 9, Janssen has been the musical director of the Chase and Sanborn Hour, his first American radio series. He left this program after the broadcast of June 27 to launch the new series.

In the new show, Janssen will use the same orchestra of 35 men which he has conducted on the Chase and Sanborn Hour and it will be further augmented for the Fleischmann programs.



Music of the popular type will predominate — arrangements will be in the highly individual Janssen style. Soloists will be presented on the broadcasts when the music requires them, but the emphasis will be on orchestral music.

Werner Janssen was the first American born conductor to be invited to direct the New York Philharmonic Symphony orchestra and his concerts with this group established him as the foremost young American conductor. The new Fleischmann programs will be the first radio series with his music as the main feature of the program.

As far back as his Dartmouth days, Janssen was known as a song writer and later, on Broadway, he became identified with popular music of the day as a composer, pianist and director. His piano solos will also be a feature of the new programs.

Winning the Prix de Rome several years ago for his composition "New Year's Eve in New York," he went abroad to study, and there acquired a reputation as a conductor. His greatest triumphs were in Helsinki, Finland, where he conducted several concerts of Sibelius' music with the composer present.

Recently he has been concentrating on popular music and in the new series plans to try experiments with effects never before attempted on the air.

HOLLYWOOD, June 29 — Gladys George, the glamorous actress who stood Broadway on its ears two seasons ago with her imitation of glamorous actress in "Personal Appearance," makes a personal appearance on the Chase and Sanborn Hour on Sunday, July 11.

Miss George plays opposite Don Ameche in a dramatic sketch as the highlight of the broadcast over the NBC-Red network at 8 p.m., EDT.

The personal appearance of Gladys George is welcomed also by Charlie (Dummy) McCarthy, Hollywood's newest expert on glamour, the man who . . . well, you can depend on Charlie to tell Gladys George all about herself.

W. C. Fields, Dorothy Lamour, and Edgar Bergen, the man behind Charlie, will all be on hand.

DOTTED NOTES

Duke Ellington was named as the greatest living American by several enthusiasts in a student's poll recently at the University of Iowa. . . . Cab Calloway's phonograph records, with a tone range from minus ten decibels to plus 22, are the most difficult of all to broadcast, according to radio engineers. . . . Irving Mills managing director of Master Records, Inc., sailed on the Rex, Saturday, June 26, to establish distribution for his Master and Variety labels in Europe. . . . Clyde Lucas and his orchestra, now at the Paramount theatre in New York, play the Metropolitan in Boston, starting July 16, both engagements booked by Mills Artists.

Everyone who speaks about or writes about that perennial, "Stardust," mentions Hoagy Carmichael, who devised the melody, but forgets Mitchell Parrish, his collaborator, who penned a beautiful lyric. . . . Shuberts have signed Irv. S. Brecher, Milton Berle's author, to write the next "Ziegfeld Follies." . . . Ina Ray Hutton and Her Melodears play the Steel Pier in Atlantic City for the week starting July 2. . . . Joe Louis trained to the rhythm of Cab Calloway's latest phonograph records, which may or may not be responsible for the result of the fight. . . . Duke Ellington's two new numbers, "Caravan" and "Skatkin" at the Kit Kat, are ridin' high. Walter Winchell was so thrilled by "Caravan" that he plugged it on the air, as well as in his column. . . . Jimmy Campbell, British music magnate, and Jack Mills, of Mills Music, consummated a deal whereby for the first time all production music from England, including songs from British Gaumont pictures, will be concentrated in one publishing house in America. Campbell represents Cinephonic Music Publishing Co., of Great Britain.

Wily Hudson, of the Hudson-DeLange orchestra, which apparently is set for the rest of the summer at the Playland Casino in Rye, N. Y., has two new potential song hits to follow "Moonglow" and "Organ Grinder's Swing." They are "Pop Corn Man" and "You're My Desire." The band, with its pretty vocalist, Nan Wynn, is featuring the numbers on their twice weekly broadcasts over WEAF and the Red network, Tuesdays from 11 to 11:30 and Saturdays from 12 to 12:30, both EDT.

Lombardo to Play On Magic Key Hour

NEW YORK, June 29 — Guy Lombardo and his famous dance orchestra will be among the top attractions on the Magic Key of RCA program to be broadcast from Radio City studios over the NBC-Blue network on Sunday, July 11, at 2 p.m., EDT.

Jean Sablon, French song virtuoso, who recently was signed for a limited engagement on the Magic Key program, will make his second appearance during the July 11 broadcast. Other guests will be announced later.

Dr. Frank Black and the NBC Symphony Orchestra will be heard as usual.

C. B. C. NOTES

Nellie Smith, contralto, will be heard in a brief program of specially arranged songs on Wednesday, June 30, at 5:45 p.m., EST. The program will originate in the Toronto studios of the CBC and will be presented for eastern network listeners. Miss Smith will sing "Take Me In Your Arms," followed by "Homing," by Theresa del Riego; "Speak To Me of Love," by Lucienne Boyer, and "Nursery Rhymes," by Pearl Curran.

Jack Slatter, who has been called the "Wayne King of Canada" in recognition of his unusual waltz arrangements and the presentation of dance tempos in concert atmosphere, will direct the CBC presentation, "In a Romantic Mood," to be heard over the national network on Wednesday, June 30, at 10:30 p.m., EST. As a feature for this date the orchestra will play the director's arrangement in waltz time of "Angel Serenade," by Braga. The brand new number, "On a Little Ship Sailing the Sea," with Gordon McIntyre, the CBC "discovery," doing the vocal honors, also will be heard.

"River Shadows," an atmospheric program featuring three violins and piano, under the direction of Albert Pratz, will be heard on Thursday, July 1, at 6 p.m., EST, over the CBC eastern network. "River Shadows" will be presented with "Moonlight and Shadows" as its theme music, and among the delightful compositions which will be specially arranged for this date are: "Romance," by Donaldson; "Elgie," by Massenet; "I Hear You Calling Me," by Marshall, and Kreisler's arrangement of "Nina."

Exchange Greetings On Dominion Day

OTTAWA, June 29—The voices of His Excellency, Lord Tweedsmuir, Governor General of Canada and Franklin Delano Roosevelt, President of the United States, will be heard by an international radio audience on July 1, between 7:30 and 8:00 p.m., EST in an exchange of greetings arranged by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation to celebrate Dominion Day, Canada's national holiday. This Dominion Day broadcast, which will commemorate also the 70th anniversary of Confederation, will be heard in Canada over the national network and in the United States over networks of the National Broadcasting Company, the Columbia Broadcasting System and the Mutual Broadcasting System. His Excellency will speak from Ottawa and President Roosevelt will speak from his home at Hyde Park, New York.

This "good neighbour" exchange of felicitations, which will be preceded and followed by special choral music to originate in the Montreal and Toronto studios, will be the first of a number of broadcasts to be presented over the national network during evening hours as the United States and England join Canada in friendly congratulation.

At 8:00 p.m., Gregori Garbovitsky will conduct the Calgary String Orchestra in a half hour program of special music, and at 8:30 p.m., the famous Boston Symphony Pop Concert, conducted by Arthur Fiedler, will deviate from its program routine with special music in recognition of Canada's celebrations. The program will originate in Boston.

Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner to London, will be heard in a rebroadcast address from London at 9:00 p.m., and at 9:10 p.m., a special program by the BBC Military Band, conducted by Walter O'Donnell, MVO, will be rebroadcast to the national network. At 9:30 p.m., Dan McCowan, famous

Banff naturalist and author, will be heard in a special address entitled "Canada Before the White Man," and at 9:45 p.m., the CBC's Canadian Press news bulletins will give a resume of happenings throughout the Dominion during the day of celebration.

Two musical programs will follow at 10:00 and 10:30 p.m., EST, when the Corporation presents from Winnipeg, "Music for Music's Sake," featuring a soloist with orchestra under the direction of Isaac Mamott, and "Soliloquy" from the Montreal studios, featuring an orchestra under the direction of Leon Kofman. The national network will close down at 11:00 p.m., with its western network remaining in operation until 2 a.m., the following morning.

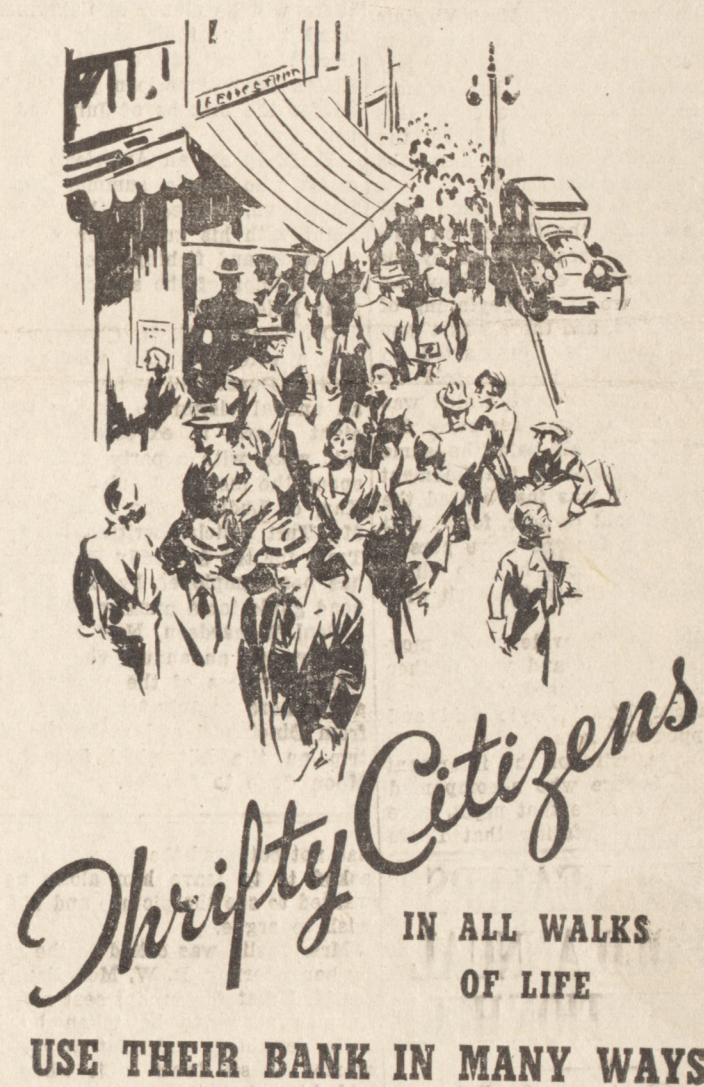
Notice of Assessment
