Music of the popular type will predominate - arrangements will be in the highly individual Janssen style. Soloists will be presented on the broadcasts when the music requires them, but the emphasis will be on orchestral music.

Werner Janssen was the first American born conductor to be invited to direct the New York Philharmonic Symphony orchestra and his concerts with this group established him as the foremost young American conductor. The new Fleischmann programs will be the first radio series with his music as the main feature of the program.

As far back as his Dartmouth days Janssen was known as a song writer and later, on Broadway, he became identified with popular music of the day as a composer, pianist and director. His piano solos will also be a feature of the new programs.


