Former Fredericton Resident Opposes President DeValera

Dr. W. F. P. Stockley, Former U.N.B. Professor,
Out With Manifesto Against President

Says DeValera a Traitor

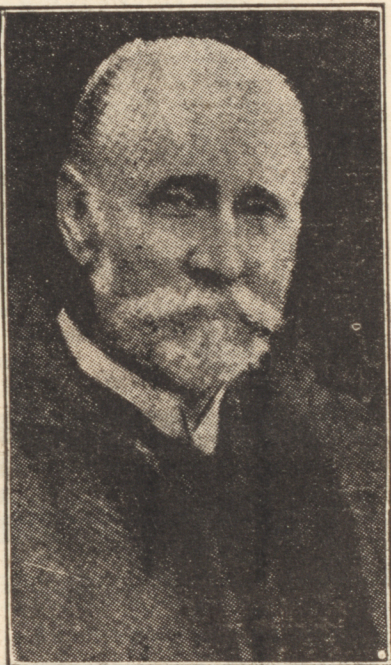
Dr. Stockley is Former Member of DeValera's Cabinet

A former Fredericton resident is taking a leading part in the general elections which are now on in the Irish Free State. Professor W. F. P. Stockley, a former professor of modern languages at the University of New Brunswick, is one hundred per cent, strong in opposition to President DeValera. Professor Stockley in conjunction with several of his colleagues has issued a manifesto against the DeValera government and the proposed new Free State Constitution. In the signed manifesto Dr. Stockley and his colleagues claim that those who support DeValera's new constitution are guilty of treason.

Professor Stockley and five colleagues who signed the manifesto were all former members of DeValera Cabinet which constituted the first executive of the Dail Eireann (Parliament of Ireland). These gentlemen state that they represent what should be the lawful government of Ireland and that DeValera's Government is illegal.

Professor Stockley, who has many friends in Fredericton is an Irishman and a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin. He first came to the University of New Brunswick in 1885 as professor of modern languages. He remained connected with the University here until 1898. After being on the faculty of different universities at Ottawa and Halifax he returned to Ireland and was a member of the faculty of Queens University at Cork. He is widely known as an author, lecturer and distinguished scholar.

Professor Stockley who is a thorough Irishman has always been interested in Irish politics. He became actively identified with DeValera and was one of his strongest supporters. When DeValera first came into power in Ireland Dr. Stockley was a member of his first Cabinet. He later left the Cabinet and has for some (Continued on Page Four)

An Interesting Ruling

A JUDGE'S order made this week at Winnipeg by Hon. Mr. Justice A. K. Dysart of the King's Bench on Manitoba, and a brother of Hon. A. A. Dysart, Premier of this Province, should be of interest to barristers and others concerned in the city of Fredericton.

The judge's order prohibited Magistrate W. B. Graham of Winnipeg from trying Mervin Nichols, Winnipeg grocer, on a charge of breach of the Lord's Day Act.

BECAUSE OF HIS MEMBERSHIP ON WINNIPEG BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS, MAGISTRATE GRAHAM MAY HAVE PRECONCEIVED OPINIONS AND THE LAW WAS CLEAR THAT NO PERSON SHOULD ACT AS JUDGE WHERE HE IS LIKELY TO HAVE HIS BIAS, MR. JUSTICE DYSART RULED.

This decision of Mr. Justice Dysart of a Supreme Court of Manitoba and a former Acting Justice of The Supreme Court of Canada should have an important bearing on certain local conditions as they exist in this city at the present time. It has been contended that where a Magistrate is a member of the Police Commission, the same magistrate should not act as a trial judge in cases with which the Police Commission may have had a connection.

This matter was discussed last winter in connection with the campaign against our local Police Commission. It would be well for local barristers or the Attorney-General's Department to have a ruling on the matter insofar as our local conditions are concerned. There may be no occasion to bring the matter up here, and then again there may be. As Judge Dysart has ruled, "No person should act as judge where he is liable to have bias."

Winnipeg is one of the few places in Canada where the Police Magistrate is also a member of the Police Commission, and the matter has many times been the subject of discussion by the different Winnipeg papers. In Winnipeg it is necessary to have a Police Commission to handle the police force, which consists of several hundred men. The police department of that city is an organization as large as some of our Provincial departments in New Brunswick. The Police Commission there is subject to certain control by the duly elected aldermen.

ABERHART AND THE PRESS IS DISCUSSED

Charge of Subservience Laid on Premier's Own Doorstep

WINNIPEG, June 17—Criticism of Canadian newspapers by Premier William Aberhart of Alberta were answered Saturday night by W. L. McTavish, vice-president and editor-in-chief of the Winnipeg Tribune, in an address on "Our Heritage of Liberty" over the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation System.

Only one newspaper in Canada came under Mr. Aberhart's charge that "most newspapers are subservient to local political machines and color their news items," said Mr. McTavish. That newspaper, he said, was in Alberta. "under what may be described as the quasi-ownership of (Continued on Page Four)

QUEBEC SAID FOR HEPBURN

TORONTO, June 17—Quebec completely supported Premier Mitchell Hepburn in his attitude toward and his action against invasion of the C.I.O. into Canadian affairs. Hon. Frank Carrel, for 56 years publisher of an English paper in Quebec City, told a reporter in the Royal York Hotel last night.

He made it clear, however, that he felt the split between Mr. Hepburn and Prime Minister Mackenzie King was ill-advised. The proprietor of the Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph for many years, and member of the Legislative Council of the Province of Quebec, added: "There was never a time in the history of Canada when we required more sane, solid men."

Canada required a type of statesmanship in its administration such as that at Westminster—she required men of the calibre of Baldwin and others who had directed the British Empire out of war and disension, he emphasized.

Mr. Carrel came to Toronto for a meeting of the directors of the Twin City Rapid Transit Company (Minneapolis and St. Paul.)

French Gov't Made No Bargain With Communist Party

PARIS, June 17—No "bargain" between the Communists and the government was involved in the 11th hour about-face by which the Communist deputies today rallied to the support of the Popular Front in its demand for sweeping financial powers, Premier Leon Blum told Havas news agency tonight.

MONTREAL, June 17—Overtures aimed at bringing Presbyterian Theological College back into the Co-operative Theological Colleges in Montreal are announced by United Church College. NAZIS AND ITALY REJOINING PATROL

Britain Hopes to Stop All Outside War Aid -- Basques Divided -- Anarchists Insist on Burning Bilbao Before Evacuation.

LONDON, June 17—Great Britain hopes to obtain an agreement for withdrawal of all foreign volunteers from Spain. Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the House of Commons today in announcing that Germany and Italy had consented to rejoin the non-intervention agreement and the four-power naval control of Spanish waters.

"His Majesty's Government proposes further measures to prevent foreign combatants or war supplies from reaching Spain," Eden said. He revealed also that there would be no further shelling of the Spanish coast by foreign warships in reprisal, such as the shelling of Almeria on May 31 by the Germans after a loyalist plane had bombed the battleship Deutschland.

"The proposals contained in the agreement reached in London on Saturday will prevent any further landing of foreign troops or shelling by foreign battleships," Eden said.

His remarks indicated that Britain, France, Germany and Italy were finally in agreement and that there was hope that foreign interference will cease, leaving the two Spanish factions to fight the civil war out to its logical conclusion victory of the dominant side by its strength in Spain alone.

BRAZIL GRANTED LOWER TARIFFS

Canada Extends Most Favored Nation Treatment

OTTAWA, June 17—Brazil has been accorded most favored nation tariff treatment by Canada under an order-in-council announced today.

Previously goods from the Brazilian American republic entered Canada at the intermediate tariff rates. They will now enter at the lowest tariff rate accorded any foreign country by treaty. Brazil will thus receive the rates prescribed in the trade agreements with France, the United States and Poland.

No change has been made in the tariff rates application to Canadian goods entering Brazil. For some time Brazil has accorded Canada most favored nation treatment in exchange for the Canadian intermediate tariff rates. But with four other South American countries, Uruguay, Argentina, Venezuela and Colombia already on the most-favored nation treatment the Canadian government considered it desirable to place Brazil on the same basis.

The change will take effect June 21 and to enjoy the most favored nation rates goods must be shipped direct from a port of Brazil or a port (Continued from Page Four)

MOSCOW, June 17—One of the greatest political upheavals in this history of Soviet Russia is going on at the present time. During the past week several army officers and others in high places have been executed and today it is charged a huge conspiracy is afoot to upset the present condition in Russia. The President of the White Russian Soviet has committed suicide, hundreds of arrests have been made and hundreds of thousands of names are being removed from the Communist pay roll by the Government. A regular upheaval is taking place in this unhappy country.

The government said Alexander G. Cherviakoff, 45-year-old head of the westernmost of the Soviet Union's 11 republics, killed himself for family reasons. But his death followed closely his denunciation in Communist party meeting, the arrest of 45 of his colleagues for treason and the execution of the former commander of the White Russian garrison.

The continued denunciation of thousands of men, including many who have stood near the very top of the state and party organization, gave the Soviet Union the appearance of being engaged in a gigantic, nationwide "witch hunt."

Foreign observers still were bewildered by the storm of charges in full, but most agreed they were evidence of chaotic dissension within the Soviet regime and showed that many persons desired, if they were not actually plotting, the downfall of Joseph Stalin.

The latest flood of charges of "treason," "wrecking" and "diversion," centring in White Russia, alleged a huge conspiracy against Soviet agriculture.

HITLER'S ACTRESS PAL IS DENOUNCED AS A JEWESS

Her Public Humiliation at Berlin Social Event by Goebbels is Followed by Ouster From Apartment

PARIS, June 17—Leni Riefenstahl, red-haired German actress, who for two years has been going about with Adolf Hitler, has been publicly denounced as a Jewess by der Fuehrer's Propaganda Minister, Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, the Paris Soir said tonight.

Goebbels, fiery Jew-baiter of the Nazi regime, was said by the newspaper to have announced during a social event at the home of Minister of Interior Wilhelm Frick that he had documentary proof of Miss Riefenstahl's Jewish blood.

"I am leaving," Goebbels announced in a loud voice to the guests, "because there is a person here who is not Aryan."

The guests were stupefied, the Paris Soir said, when Goebbels continued: "I have with me documents showing that Leni Riefenstahl had Semitic grandparents."

Leni was said to have been in the room and to have been asked by Frick to leave.

When the 29 year old actress, daughter of a Berlin plumber, reached her apartment she found, according to the newspaper, that the entire denunciation had been carefully arranged in advance.

Outside, her home she found Nazi storm troopers waiting in a truck in which was piled all her furniture, the newspaper said. They told her she was no longer able to occupy her apartment. Longer prostrate at the sudden turn of events, she was taken to a nearby hotel.
