In constitutional and diplomatic history. In 1924 he returned to China and was professor for four years in the National University of Peking. In 1928 he resigned to do research work in connection with Chinese Agrarian problems. He was acting chairman of the Institute of Social Sciences of the Academic Sinica and later chief of the Research Division of the Sun Yat Institute in Nanking.

Owing to his knowledge of Russian, Japanese, French, English and other languages, Dr. Chen has been in a position to consult all standard authorities on the problems of Sino-Japanese relations and other problems connected with the Pacific.

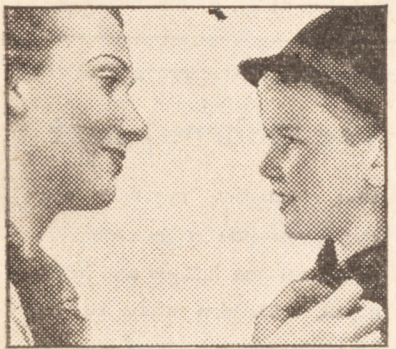
His publications include "Landlord and Peasant in China," "Present Agrarian Problems in China," as well as frequent magazine articles on Pacific affairs.

Dr. Chen will proceed from here to Halifax where he will speak before Halifax audiences.

## DUTY ON CORN AGAIN IN FORCE

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—The duty on importations of corn into Canada became automatically restored on New Year's Day, it was learned from National Revenue officials today. The tariff was suspended some months ago when Canada faced a shortage in domestic supplies.

The tariff is three cents a bushel under the British preference, twenty cents intermediate and twenty-five cents general. In the case of South Africa free entry of corn from that Dominion is guaranteed as a special preference and when the general suspension of the tariff was made, South Africa's consent had to be obtained. This was secured by reason of the fact that the Union was itself short of supplies.

Most of the corn imported during the suspension of the impost was obtained from the Argentine.

## LONDON PAPER QUESTIONS VALUE OF BIG LINERS

LONDON, Jan. 8.—The Daily Express today questioned whether superliners could ride heavy seas as successfully as somewhat smaller ships.

"Big ships can get across the Atlantic in five days," the paper said, "but in practice five-day ships are getting across in six days because they roll so heavily that they have to slow down or smash all they have got. Six-day ships just take six days, too."

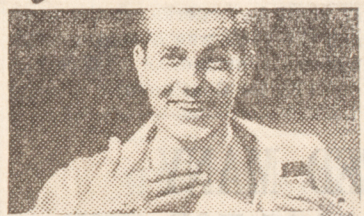

## York County Pupils

(Continued from Page Eight)

Coun. Barry was glad the matter had been brought up for discussion. He said that the delinquent list in St. Mary's Parish if collected would practically wipe out the indebtedness. He favored the appointment of a collecting justice to deal with delinquent taxpayers, and hoped one would be named for the parish of St. Mary's. He would like to see the delinquents compelled to pay up.

Coun. Wetmore said that tax collectors had all the power of collecting justices, but often fell down on his duties.

Coun. Barry said a collector had to consult a lawyer before taking action and that meant more costs.

Coun. Cameron said that delinquent taxpayers should be made to pay up. He thought that one or two collecting justices for the county could handle the situation.

Coun. Norrad said that the plan proposed by Coun. Cameron had been tried in Northumberland county and proved a failure. He held that the appointment of a county collector was not in keeping with responsible government. He (Norrad) was for the County of York and he was also for the Parish of Stanley. He was opposed to a one man collector. There was no relief now in his section and he believed that next year there would be no trouble to collect the taxes.

Coun. Barry said it was up to the Board of Assessors to enforce the collection of taxes.

Coun. Manuel said that he was opposed to the appointment of a one man collector for the County. Carleton had tried it but went back to the old system.

Coun. Wright believed that the old mode of collecting was the most popular with the people and the most satisfactory.

Acting Solicitor Morrison being asked for an opinion stated that all tax levies must be included in the County assessment.

Coun. Dunphy thought that the discussion was getting the Council no where. He believed that individual collectors in the parishes would do just as good work as a one man collector.

### Hospital Trustees Heard

Luke S. Morrison and Dr. A. F. Vanwart, representing the Victoria Hospital Trustee Board, were given permission to address the Council. Mr. Morrison, who spoke first, said increased accommodation was necessary and that meant a new building. He had no concrete proposal to submit, but would ask that the hospital committee of the Council be continued. All information in possession of the trustees would be furnished to the Council. He hoped the Council would between now and next July pay a visit to the hospital and familiarize themselves with the situation. If the new building was erected it would mean a large expenditure and the County of York would be invited to assist.

Dr. VanWart said that on a previous occasion he had told the Council about conditions at the hospital, and since that time conditions had become worse. In a hospital building, erected in 1887 there were now quartered fifty patients and the accommodation was entirely inadequate. Over one thousand patients had received treatment during the year, coming chiefly from Fredericton and the County of York. The patients demanded up to date service, such as X-ray treatment, and there was not the accommodation a modern hospital should furnish. He hoped that the Council would visit the hospital and study conditions for themselves.

Warden Coburn assured the delegation that the Council would keep in touch with the situation at the hospital.

Coun. Manuel announced a meeting of the Municipal Home Committee for Friday evening.

On motion of Coun. Morrison the Council adjourned until three o'clock to allow committees to meet.
