DIRECTIONS FOR  
PREPARING ARMY  
WORM "POISON"

Poison bait to curb the inroads of army worms, which are causing damage to crops in the southern portion of the province, is a bran mash mixture, recommended by the Dominion Entomological Bureau. Bran, Paris green, molasses, oranges or lemons and water are used in the mixture of poison, blended together to form a rather granular mix that is best worked into the mash in a dry tub with the aid of a common garden hoe.

To mix: 20 pounds of bran are needed, one pound of Paris green, two quarts of molasses, three oranges or lemons and three and one-half gallons of water. The bran and the Paris green are mixed together thoroughly in a dry washtub and then the juice of the three oranges or lemons is squeezed into the water, and the peelings chopped fine and added; then the molasses is dumped into the liquid. After the two preparations are made, they are mixed together. The mash should not be made wet, but mixed enough to become more or less granular. This amount will cover three acres.

## Is Fundamental

"Fair wages for workers is fundamental to our economic and social advancement. In the first session of the Legislature following the last election, Fair Wage legislation was adopted and subsequently a Fair Wage Officer was appointed. That legislation was amended in 1937 to provide for the present Fair Wage Board. While many may have felt impatient at the apparent delay, it should be borne in mind that there was little foundation upon which to work. We felt it necessary that when a definite policy was formulated it should be designed and executed to meet the circumstances and needs of the community as fully and effectively as humanly possible.

## The Board

A. B. McKinnon, the Chairman of the Board, following long and diversified commercial experience, was appointed Municipal Inspector for Northumberland a few years ago, and more recently he has acted for the Department of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations in conducting important investigations and making surveys in various parts of the Province.

He is recognized as a serious-minded student of labour problems. He is an officer of the International Brotherhood of Paper Makers.

C. Allan Beatey, Manager of Snowflake Lime Limited, Saint John is well known in the industrial life of New Brunswick and is recognized as one of the outstanding younger business leaders.

Roy W. Cameron, having started life in the drug business later entered the manufacturing field. For the past seventeen years he has been connected with the lumber business and in recent years has operated extensively in pulp wood in the partnership of Clark & Cameron.

John S. MacKinnon is widely known through his lifelong association with organized labour. For many years he has acted as Legislative representative of the New Brunswick Federation of Labour and, in addition, he has served for a long period as president of local 273 International Longshoremen's Association, Saint John, and as an officer of the Trades and Labor Council, Saint John.
