Women Quit Picketing

Although the mine of the Miramichi Lumber Co. Ltd., continued to be picketed today, very few of the picketers are women, in direct antithesis of the situation yesterday, when approximately 100 women picketed the mine.

In presenting the efforts of the S. C. M. to provide for the families of the strikers, Minto public opinion feels that the Minto Women's Institute and the Ladies' Aid societies of the various churches of the town are quite capable of handling the situation. However, whatever public opinion at the mining town may say, it is a fact that merchants of this city are today receiving letters from an organization in the strike town calling itself the "Citizens Welfare Committee," in which communications the merchants are asked for pecuniary contributions to provide medical assistance for the families of the strikers. The letters are signed by Thos. Crawford, president, and John Patterson, secretary.

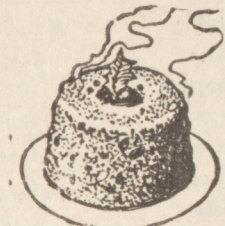
