Different Spanish Factions Are Having Dissention in Ranks

Government At Salamanca, Madrid Government and Catalan Faction All Having Trouble

REVOLTERS FACE FIRING SQUAD
Conflicting Reports Regarding the Bombing of Shipping Vessels

MADRID, Aug. 9.—The insurgent drive continues in the vital Teruel sector menacing the Loyalist lines of communications between Valencia and Madrid.

If reports are to be believed the Rebel government at Salamanca, the Madrid government and the Catalan Republic at Barcelona are all having serious trouble with their unruly followers.

The Madrid government claims a serious mutiny among Franco's soldiers at Toledo, where in the early months of the war the rebels gained a great moral success by their heroic and determined defense of the Alcázar.

Serious street fighting is reported in Barcelona head of the Catalonian government. The discontented Anarcho-Syndicalists are said to be in open revolt against the government in a war of sniping and street barricades which has assumed the proportions of a serious outbreak.

Franco's news services make counter claims of dissatisfaction within the government lines which are as stoutly denied by Madrid.

The claims of the various parties and nations concerned in the indiscriminate bombing of vessels near Spanish ports are just as conflicting. A British French, Italian and Greek vessel have given notice of bombing attacks from the air to their respective governments.

The British and French blame the rebel planes and are protesting to General Franco. In this of course the Madrid government agrees.

IS LINDBERGH ENGAGED IN A NEW INVENTION OF MILITARY NATURE?

CALAIS, France, Aug. 9.—Much comment is caused here by the arrival of Col. Charles Lindbergh on his third visit within five weeks to the distinguished French scientist Dr. Alexis Carel. It is recalled that Lindbergh used his technical skill some years ago in collaboration with Dr. Carel to invent a mechanical heart. It is believed that Dr. Carel and the distinguished American flyer are collaborating together on a new invention possibly of a military nature which may be of outstanding importance.

WHEN LABRADOR BUYS HALIFAX ICE, THAT'S NEWS!

BATTLE HARBOR, Labrador, Aug. 9.—People who think of Labrador as a land stern and forbidding with a grim rock-bound coast blanketed in perpetual ice and snow, will be surprised to hear that the mild weather there has caused a shortage of ice among the fish packers.

So serious was the problem that it was necessary to place an order in Halifax for ten tons of ice to save the situation.

This may be the start of a new Canadian aphorism. "He's only carrying ice to Labrador". By such paths mayhap we will progress to a more picturesque speech.

PASSENGER BOAT IN COLLISION OFF DUNKIRK

ANTWERP, Aug. 9.—The Belgian steamer Princess Marie Jose was in collision at sea with another steamer last night, and was so badly damaged that the 600 passengers and crew were forced to take to their lifeboats. Owing to the short distance of the Princess Marie Jose from shore there was no loss of life. The force of the collision as so great however that four passengers were injured at the time including three English girl tourists who were on a trip to the continent.

Norwegian Boat Wrecked But the Crew Rescued

SHETLAND ISLANDS, Aug. 9.—Sixteen shipwrecked Norwegian sailors were picked up by a Swedish fishing boat and taken to Shetland Island's port. Their vessel capsized during stormy weather and sank within twenty minutes. They were forced to take to their boats and spent fifteen hours in their life boats before being rescued.

CHINESE AND JAPS CLASH IN RIOT AT SHANGHAI

ABERHART GETS RESIGNATION OF HUGILL

EDMONTON, Aug. 9.—His resignation already submitted, Hon. John W. Hugill, K.C., tonight awaited word from Premier Aberhart as to when his services as attorney-general of Alberta would cease. After a government spokesman had disclosed Saturday that Premier Aberhart had asked Mr. Hugill for his resignation, Mr. Hugill issued a statement saying his resignation had been tendered.

It was understood Mr. Hugill's resignation would not become effective immediately and that Premier Aberhart might himself take over administration of the department temporarily.

Hon. Lucien Maynard, now minister of municipal affairs and a lawyer, it was expected, would be named to succeed Mr. Hugill who has held the portfolio since formation of the Social Credit government in 1935. Mr. Hugill was previously in the employment of the C.P.R. Legal Dept. at Calgary.

Wood-saw Mfg. Plant To Be Established Here

A new industry is to be established in this city in the near future, it was learned this morning. D. T. Derril, Bangor, Me., head of a wood-saw manufacturing concern, plans to establish a branch of his company in Fredericton next month.

Mr. Derril, who already has a Canadian branch at Pembroke, Ont., has long felt the need of a Maritime branch, and realizing that no site in these provinces could be better chosen for his business than this city, has taken steps to establish a small establishment in the Camp Building on York Street. Mr. Derril will arrive in Fredericton about September 1, and immediately set to work establishing his plant. Although it will necessarily be small at first it is expected to provide employment for some Fredericton men. Alderman W. R. Crewdson, chairman of the Industrial Committee of the Fredericton City Council, and former Mayor W. G. Clark, M.P., have assisted Mr. Derril in making his choice.

SEVEN TO RUN FOR COUNCILLOR IN DOUGLAS

Nominations Close Aug. 30th—Elections On Sept. 7th.

According to reports current seven candidates will seek nomination for County Councillors in the Parish of Douglas at the general meeting of the ratepayers which will take place within the next two weeks. This is one of the largest numbers ever seeking nomination in the parish, and it is expected that the prospective nominees will show a hard fought battle for the privilege of going before the people in election.

Councillors B. O. Waugh and A. N. Dunphy will again be running, while it is rumored that they will be opposed by Dell Pugh, Dawson Pugh, Maurice Tait, Alexander Smith and Spencer Brewer. Mr. Brewer is the son of the late Alexander Brewer, who represented the parish for many years.

Nominations will all be in the hands of the Secretary on Monday, August 30, and election will take place on the following Tuesday, September 7.

Reports have not been received from other parishes, but it is understood that in most of the others election of councillors will be by acclamation with no opposition from other parties.

Douglas is the only parish that uses a general meeting for the nomination of candidates. The system is the same as a political nomination meeting, excepting that politics do not enter into the affair.

R. B. BENNETT CONTINUE PARTY LEADER FOR TIME

Organization Work Is Planned—All Day Caucus At Capital

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, B. P. C., will continue to lead the Conservative party at least for the present. This was decided after an all-day caucus of the Conservative party which was held at Ottawa on Saturday. The members were called together by Mr. Bennett for an interchange of ideas and views concerning his continuance as leader of the Party.

Matters in regard to organization were also discussed. Matters of policy were not touched upon and it is given out that the meeting was harmonious and enthusiastic.

The only official statement from the meeting was the text of a resolution adopted unanimously which made no direct mention of the leadership or of party organization.

The resolution was: This meeting of Conservative members of the House of Commons, assembled to greet our chief, Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, on his return from Europe, records its profound pleasure to learn of his improved state of health and of his willingness to devote his remarkable ability, great experience and unequalled knowledge of public problems to the service of the Canadian people.

Organization matters were also discussed at length, according to R. S. White, veteran member for St. Antoine-Westmount, Montreal, who served as spokesman. Matters of policy were not touched upon, nor was the possible provincial election in Ontario mentioned. The meeting was harmonious and enthusiastic throughout.

The meeting appointed committees to get a nation-wide organization under way and start the work of preparing for the next general election. Committees will function in every province and eventually the organization will be centralized under a national office in Ottawa, although details of the latter phase of the matter were not settled.

Only two of the 39 Conservative members were absent. Mrs. George Black of the Yukon and Dr. S. F. Tolmie of Victoria. Dr. Tolmie has been ill for some time and Mrs. Black found the distance from her far northern constituency too great for a mid-summer trip.

Although the meeting settled one question concerning the party it left other outstanding questions still in the air. The one definite conclusion was that Mr. Bennett will remain leader for the time being and that organization work will proceed under his leadership.

There was no word as to whether Mr. Bennett is to continue indefinitely or whether he still contemplates the possibility of retiring in the middle.

FORMER KING, QUEEN RECONCILED

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Aug. 9.—Abbe Pierre D'Armailhaq announced Saturday he was authorized to state that former King Alfonso or Spain and former Queen Victoria Eugenia were "fully reconciled".

The former King now is in Lausanne for the wedding Aug. 16 of Princess Lolores of the Bourbon House and Prince Auguste Czartoryski of the Lithuanian House.

It was stated the former Queen will not attend. The royal couple has been estranged since shortly after the Spanish monarchy fell in 1931.

The Abbe made his announcement in connection with a discussion of the plans for the wedding which he will perform.

German Authorities Lodge Protest Today Against British Order

Protest Concerned Expulsion of Three German Journalists From England

NO REASON IS GIVEN

It Is Understood That the Protest Is Restricted In Zone

NEW RECORD FROM WEST TO EAST MADE ACROSS OCEAN

FOYNES Ireland, Aug. 9.—A new record airline crossing was made today when the Imperial Airways flying boat "Cambria" made the trip from west to east in eleven hours and fifty-seven minutes. This crossing was the fastest made by any type of flying craft up to the present time. It shows the possibility of maintaining a regular passenger service giving fast crossings to business men and others provided adequate preparations are taken, experienced pilots fly the planes and a proper weather service is maintained, to avoid the storms of unusual intensity.

The crossing was made from Botswood, Nfld., to Foynes in Ireland. The Cambria left Newfoundland last night and arrived at Foynes at ten o'clock today, and after a short stop proceeded to Southampton, England.

TRAMP STEAMER WRECKED OFF VANCOUVER ID.

VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 9.—The crew of 26 men of the British tramp steamer were rescued from their vessel by lifeboats yesterday. The Neruus was pounding to pieces in a heavy sea, having run aground on a rocky ledge near the entrance to Victoria Harbor.

BAN ON EXAMINATIONS PLANNED FOR SCHOOLS

TORONTO, Aug. 9.—The Department of Education prepared to issue every certificate from the kindergarten to the university without any special written examination on the part of the pupil, Dr. Duncan McArthur, Deputy Minister of Education, told the teachers who have been taking the summer course in education at the Toronto Normal School, at a dinner in Easton's Round Room last night.

But, added Dr. McArthur, the department could not proceed to take action beyond public opinion. The greatest stumbling block to the removal of external examinations was the parents, he pointed out. "It is your important task as teachers to convince the parents in your community that your judgment without a written examination whether William or Mary should be promoted to the next grade. There are trustees who come to us year after year objecting because children are not permitted to write the entrance examination.

"This Province is grossly examination-ridden at the present time.

BERLIN, Aug. 9.—A protest by the German authorities was lodged today with the British Government. It concerned the expulsion order given against three German journalists by the British to put their affairs in order before leaving England. No reason was furnished by the English for the expulsion. It is understood that the German protest is restricted in zone.

LONDON, Aug. 9.—The British Home Office's order compelling three German newspaper correspondents to leave England appears likely to open a prolonged Anglo-German controversy. Two of the three already have left for Germany.

As Berlin dispatches told of German official threats of retaliation there were indications the German embassy here was preparing for some action in the matter.

Two members of the embassy staff traveled by airplane to Renfrew, Scotland, where the ambassador, Joachim von Ribbentrop, is on vacation. The correspondents' plight was understood to be the subject of a conference, and it was indicated when the two embassy members returned to London the embassy would at least "ask for further information" concerning the Home Office order.

The Home Office declined, without explanation, to renew the labor permit of the German writers and they were given two weeks to wind up their personal affairs and leave the country.

CAIRO Aug. 9.—A military mission of Egyptian officers will sail for London, England, shortly. It is the intention to modernize the Egyptian wireless and signalling service. The officers will study wireless in England under British experts for two years and will then return to Egypt as experts to organize a modern military wireless service for the new Egyptian army.

FRENCH SPEED QUEEN NOW HOLDS ALL RECORDS

NEW YORK, Aug. 9.—The French ocean greyhound, the Normandie, claims to have gained the palm of victory from her British rival, the Queen Mary. In her last crossing from Ambrose Light to Bishop's Rock the Normandie made the extremely fast time of three days, twenty three hours and two minutes, snatching the record from the Queen Mary.
