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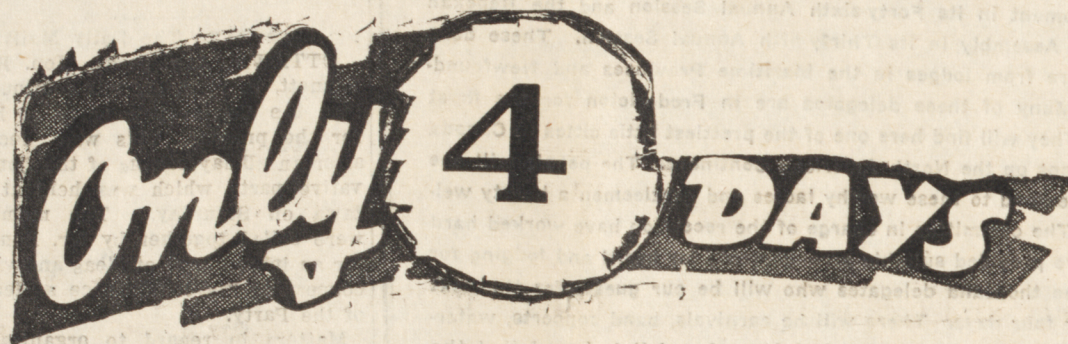

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LORD TWEEDSMUIR REACHES FORT NORMAN BY AIRPLANE

Governor-General on Side Trip Flies Over Herd
of Five Thousand Reindeer Which Bahr
Brought From Alaska

FORT NORMAN, N.W.T., Aug. 9.—The Governor General's party, returning eastward from the western Arctic, landed here from Aklavik, flying in Royal Canadian Air Force airplanes.

The planes were caught in a heavy fog soon after refuelling at Good Hope and the pilots were forced to follow the shoreline, flying close to the river for fear of being forced down.

Cameron Bay is the next stop and it was planned to leave here early Thursday if the fog lifts sufficiently for flight.

Lord Tweedsmuir was undismayed by the thick weather and the bumpy air conditions and the stop was called here when he decided he wanted to get a good view of Great Bear Lake, free from fog.

Enroute here, the vice-regal party's planes flew over a Mackenzie Air Service ship, carrying the pioneer northern pilot, Archie McMullen, of Edmonton, north of Good Hope. McMullen had landed on the river, apparently waiting for the weather to clear. Later, he landed in Fort Norman, waiting for favorable weather.

Before leaving Aklavik, the Governor-General was taken on a 200-mile flight, during which he visited an Eskimo village and for the first time saw a reindeer herd.

His Excellency was taken to Tuktoyaktuk, a Hudson's Bay Company post east of the Mackenzie Delta on the Beaufort Sea, 200 miles inside the Arctic Circle.

Natives and white men crowded the beach as the two R.C.A.F. planes carrying the party circled the little harbor, wherein lay 15 schooners and motorships. The Governor-General was greeted by Charles Rowan, post manager, and Right Rev. P. Falaize, Roman Catholic Bishop of the Mackenzie, whose mission ship Our Lady of Lourdes was in the harbor from Herschel Island.

During a tour of the village, His Excellency visited the Eskimo tent encampment and was struck with their cheerful, friendly appearance, energy and cleanliness. The Governor-General was shown several Eskimo graves, where piles of driftwood covered the bodies. Beneath one pile which had fallen to pieces, he saw a battered skeleton of an Eskimo who had died years ago and on another was an old bow with no string, given the dead man to help him into the next world.

Soon after tea at the Hudson's Bay Post, the party started the return flight to Aklavik, having cancelled the journey to Herschel Island because of unfavorable ice and fog conditions there.

A few minutes out of Tuktoyaktuk the planes flew over Richard's Island, the summer grazing ground of a great reindeer herd which stout-hearted Andy Bahr drove for five years from Alaska to form the nucleus of a walking storehouse for the Eskimos. The herd has increased from about 3,500 animals, when it arrived three years ago, to about 5,000

today. At the sound of the pianes, the reindeer fled, changing their direction as the machine circles them. The planes did not land at the reindeer camp but proceeded homeward, running into a stiff blow and low clouds, over numerous water courses of the Mackenzie Delta that give the land the appearance of a great green sponge.
