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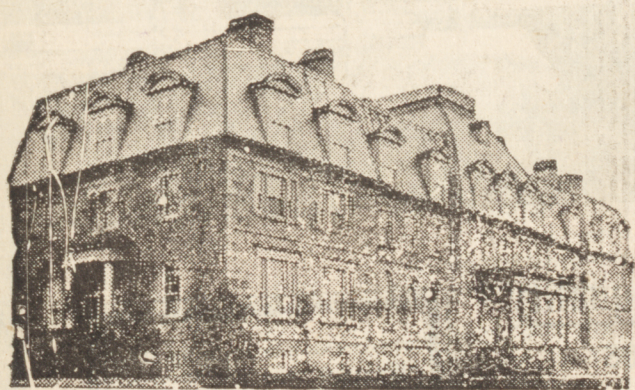

gram bearing the date of June 26th, 1877: "Convey to brothers of the Order our everlasting gratitude for their noble effort in our behalf. (Sgd.) Gilbert Murdock, D.D.G.M."

D. G. Whidden, P.G.M., G.R., a veteran Odd Fellow, with sixty-one years' experience in the Order, honored Victoria Lodge with a visit on December 6, 1886. He was met at the Depot by Past Grand Master John Richards and hospitably cared for at his home during his stay in the city. In the evening he paid an official visit to the Lodge, and later in the evening was the guest of honor at a banquet at the Barker House.

In a recent letter to a member of Victoria Lodge Mr. Whidden said: "Fifty years is a long time to carry in one's memory details of even so magnificent a reception as was given to me, but I have not only carried with me pleasant memories of the occasion but I have also preserved a program and menu of the banquet, which I have handed over to the program committee of the 1937 Grand Lodge meeting." The only names of members attending the banquet whom Mr. Whidden could recall, were those of John Richards, P.G.M., his son, J. Fred Richards, John S. Withrow, D.D.G.M., John B. Hawthorne and James D. Fowler, all of whom have since died.

Nashwaak Lodge No. 72

Nashwaak Lodge No. 72 of Marysville can very well be claimed as a child of Victoria Lodge. The membership of Victoria Lodge in its early days extended to the town of Marysville, and in 1894 twenty-five of the members withdrew and initiated by dispensation Nashwaak Lodge. The late W. S. Hooper and Alex. G. Robinson of Marysville had been appointed as a special deputy, both being active in founding the new Lodge. The charter members were A. Walter Reid, P.G., James Robinson, Prescott McDowell, S. J. Hallett, Thos. McDowell and Dr. I. C. Sharpe. The first Noble Grand was Geo. A. Tapley. In 1896 Nashwaak Lodge began the construction of a new hall, and with the generous assistance of the late Alexander Gibson, founder of the town, was able to complete the work within a short time without it being encumbered to any great extent by debt. The hall was formally dedicated in 1898 with the assistance of Grand Lodge officers.

Amethyst Rebekah Lodge of Marysville was instituted in 1896, with a large membership. It may be mentioned that in 1898 when Grand Lodge met in Fredericton in the building which is now the home of Victoria Lodge, the degrees were worked out nicely by a team from Amethyst Rebekah Lodge. On that occasion a team from Victoria Lodge headed by Brother J. M. Torrance, worked the first and second degrees for the Grand Master.

Lodge is Coronation Lodge No. 86, of Covered Bridge, York County. It was in 1902, the year of the Coronation of Their Majesties, King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra, that it was founded, and it adopted the title of 'Coronation' in commemoration of that event.
Coronation Lodge was instituted by the late Grand Master Charles A. Sampson, assisted by W. S. Hooper. The charter members were Robert Forbes, Angus Forbes, Warren Kelly, John MacNabb, Richard Richardson and Joshua C. MacNabb. The first noble Grand was Rev. J. C. Colquhoun, with John T. McBean as Vice-Grand and John MacNabb as Treasurer. During the summer of 1904 Coronation Lodge erected a hall, and the first meeting was held therein on November 15th of that year. It may be added that all the charter members of this Lodge are still living with the exception of Angus Forbes, P.G.

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
