CHICAGO, Aug. 9—Lulu Belle and Skyland Scotty, who are Mr. and Mrs. Scott Wiseman in private life, have returned to Chicago and the Alka-Seltzer National Barn Dance after a vacation spent in their rustic cabin in the Blue Ridge Mountains of North Carolina. It's a long hop from North Carolina's mountains to the Wisemans' modernistic Chicago apartment, but the Wisemans are happy to be back. They have found several new mountain songs during their weeks in the hills and plan to present them on their Barn Dance broadcasts. The Alka-Seltzer National Barn Dance is heard at 9:00 and 11:00 p. m., EDT, over the NBC-Blue Network.

RADIO NOTES

Last year when Andre Kostelanetz conducted the Chicago Symphony Orchestra at the Windy City's famous Grant Park, a crowd of 110,000 braved the torrent of an unexpected down-pour of listen to the maestro's interpretation of the Gershwin "Rhapsody in Blue".

And they didn't forget! For at the concert program of Kostelanetz with coloratura Lily Pons as soloist Saturday evening, July 31, a record-breaking throng of nearly 175,000 music-lovers stormed the enormous outdoor arena.

The day following the concert, the orchestra leader left for the West Coast, where he and Miss Pons are to encore their last season's concert with an appearance at the Hollywood Bowl, Friday evening, August 13.

Kostelanetz will listen in Hollywood to the next broadcast of his orchestra, under the baton of violinist Harry Hoffman, appointed as substitute by the orchestra leader during his absence.

The two-finger classic of everyone's childhood—"Chopsticks"—will be given swing treatment on the Kostelanetz broadcast, Wednesday, August 11, at 9:00 P. M., EDT, over the WABC-CBS network.

Tenor soloist Frank Parker's contributions will include "Melancholy Baby" and "Teh Me Tonight".

Also given the spirit of swing will be the sailors' hornpipe, in an orchestral feature titled "Sailors' Swing". Other Kostelanetz selections will be "All God's Chillun got Rhythm" and "Sweet Lelani".

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 7—R. T. MICROPHONICS

Ned Wever, leading man for Irene Rich in the dramas heard every Friday night on the NBC-Blue Network, writes songs in his leisure. His latest opus, "Life Is Sweet Again," was sung by Miss Rich when interviewed recently by Nellie Revell on NBC. Wever started song-writing while a student at Princeton, contributing to Triangle Club productions. Since his graduation he has written "Trouble in Paradise," "Sing a New Song," "Ain't You Kinda Sorry Now," "My Heart Is the Garden and You Are the Rose" and other popular numbers.

Elinor Harriot, who supplies the feminine voices on the Amos 'n' Andy skits, has been a radio entertainer since 1932, mostly on programs originating in Chicago NBC studios. A native of Duluth, Minn., she began her career as a public entertainer at the tender age of four, giving impersonations. After training with Little Theater and stock companies she graduated to Broadway productions, appearing with Walter Hampden, Henry Hull and other stars.

Equally accomplished as author and actor, Joe Laurie, Jr., veteran vaudeville appearing on Rudy Vallee's Variety Hour on NBC, writes his own comedy. He has produced two books on vaudeville, two movie scripts and more than a hundred vaudeville acts. Laurie also has had considerable experience fashioning radio programs for other comedians. SOUND EFFECTS MAN HAS SNAP IN THIS SERIAL

CHICAGO, Aug. 9—The phone rings and the door slams, but that is about all that ever happens in the way of sound effects on the Vic and Sade program. It's a snap for the sound effects experts assigned to the show.

The reason for his paucity of illusory noises goes back five years when Vic and Sade were just getting their start. Sound effects then so crude that Paul Rhymmer, the author, decided to get along without them. He just simply wrote around them, dodging situations which would call for many effects. Now, having got out of the habit of using effects, he doesn't feel that he needs them, no matter how perfect they are today.

So Vic and Sade just get along with door slams and telephone tinklings. The telephone is almost indispensable to the program, because it is one of the few means by which neighbors of Vic and Sade come into the script from "off-stage". The neighbors, though they never appear, are important characters in the stories of the Gook folks household. No one, except Vic, Sade and Rush (Billy Idelson) has ever appeared in the show, but listeners to the program know half the town in which the Gooks live—by hearing about them in the conversations of Vic, Sade and Rush.

Vic and Sade, sponsored by Procter & Gamble in the interests of Crisco and Ivory Flakes, is broadcast at 11.30 a. m., EDT, over the NBC-Blue Network and at 3.30 p. m., EDT, over the NBC-Red Network, daily, except Saturday and Sunday, and at 10.45 p. m., EDT, Tuesdays over the NBC-Red Network.

or setting of controls. Enough current stays on to keep toast perfect until needed. Another model has even a crumb tray in the base. There are electric toasters and broilers that make cooking a positive delight. They have an automatic thermostatic control, a heat indicator to show the temperature at all times and a signal light to indicate when the desired temperature is reached. There are toasters with several compartments, meat in the centre space, potatoes on one side, vegetables in other compartments.

light and fluffy. Return to refrigerator and continue freezing.
Raspberry Ice
1 cup water
2 cups sugar
2 cups raspberry juice
Grated rind of one lemon
½ cup lemon juice
1-13 tablespoons gelatin dissolved in 2 tablespoons cold water
Make a syrup of sugar and water, boil together for 5 minutes, remove from fire, add gelatin in order to dissolve it. Add strained raspberry juice, lemon juice and lemon rind. Cool and freeze.
Buttermilk Sherbet
2 cups buttermilk
1 cup crushed pineapple
½ cup sugar
1 egg white
1½ teaspoons vanilla
Combine buttermilk, pineapple and sugar thoroughly. Place in a tray in the electric refrigerator and freeze to a mush. Remove from the tray to a bowl and add egg white and vanilla. Beat with electric beater until refrigerator and continue to freeze without stirring. If a plain water ice is desired, omit the cream.
fruit juices and whip with beater until mixture is dissolved. Return to the freezing.
Grape Ice
¾ cup sugar
1½ cup water
1 cup grape juice
1-8 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Boil sugar and water together on top of stove for five minutes. Add grape juice and salt and set in the refrigerator to cool. When cool, add lemon juice and turn into an electric refrigerator tray to freeze. This recipe is best if stirred once during the freezing.

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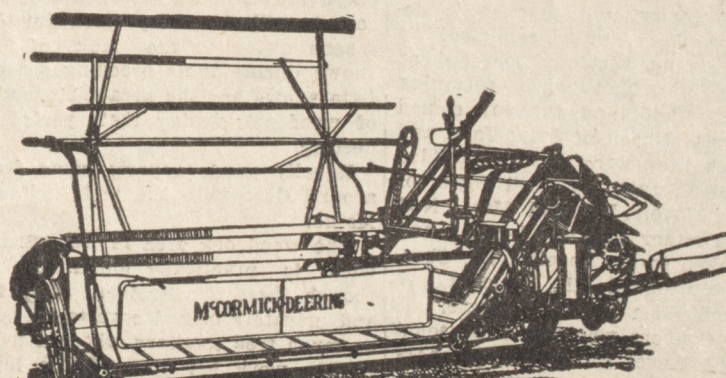
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
