Provincial Egg-Laying Contest

The 35th week of the 17th New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest, conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, was concluded on July 3, with a production of 1,209 eggs and 1,260.5 points. This is an average production of 63.9 p. c.

The Single Comb White Leghorns owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, led in production for the week with 52 eggs and 62.4 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by John Woods, Bloomfield Station, were in second position for the week with 55 eggs and 60.7 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Mrs. W. H. Venning, R. R. No. 2, Sussex, were in third position with 56 eggs and 57.9 points.

The Single Comb White Leghorns owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, are leading to date with 1,545 eggs and 1,776.9 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Karl W. Smith, Prince William, are in second position to date with 1,327 eggs and 1,461.3 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Mrs. O. A. Mitton, Riverside, are in third position to date with 1,301 eggs and 1,406.3 points.

Single Comb White Leghorn hen No. 7 owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, is the leading hen to date with a production of 206 eggs and 240.9 points.

Single Comb White Leghorn hen No. 10 owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, is in second position to date with a production of 188 eggs and 213.9 points.

Barred Rock hen No. 7 owned by the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, is in third position to date with a production of 169 eggs and 197.7 points.

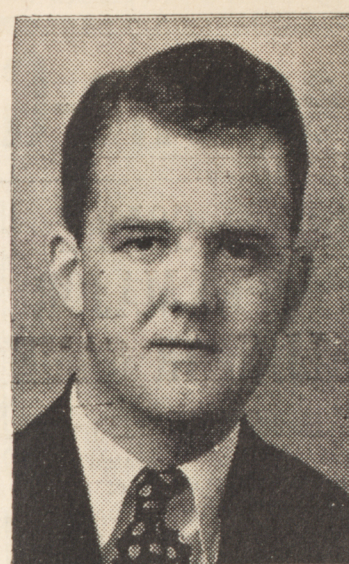

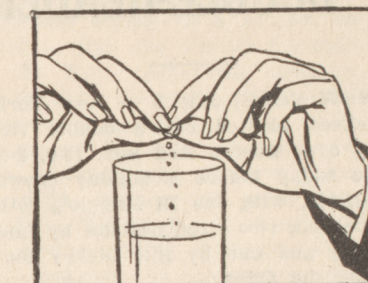
