Work on the subway project here is progressing rapidly. It is expected that the pouring of concrete into the forms will begin immediately. Pile driving is being carried on at the west abutment of the bridge proper, while this work on the subway site is about completed.

At the present time between 50 and 60 men are employed on the projects. The number will be increased as the work progresses.

The financial statement for the Municipality of York, for the period from November, 30 1936 to June 20, 1937, was released today by the secretary-treasurer. The cash book accounts audited by H. G. Hoben, C.A., revealed the receipts totalled \$45,235, plus a bank loan of \$7,000 making a total of \$52,235.

The statement continued as follows: Disbursements for the county and parish purposes and schools, \$45,711.15; Bank loans at June 30, 1937, totalled \$27,000; Sinking fund investments, \$11,-228.89; Municipal Home trust fund at June 30th, totalled \$187 .-31; Road tax account, \$2,658.08.
