## FACILITIES AT N. B. HOSPITAL ARE IMPROVED

### Government Purchases Additional Lots

A further extension in the facilities at the Provincial Hospital in Saint John has been made possible through the purchase of additional adjoining property according to an announcement made today by Hon. J. B. McNair Attorney General and Acting Premier.

A few weeks ago the Government announced the purchase of the Simms residential property directly adjoining the Hospital. The further extensions embrace three other adjacent properties acquired at an approximate cost of \$11,000.

For some time past both the executives at the Hospital and the members of the Government have realized that these extensions were necessary. Hon. Mr. McNair said today, "The Hospital must be suitably fitted to cope with the important services required of it; these expenditures are advisable in that they will provide a definite need."

The purchase just now concluded comprises:

1. A lot extending from Lancaster Avenue to the bank of the St. John River and the dwelling located thereon, purchased from Mrs. Louise Duncanson.

2. Two lots facing on Riverview Avenue purchased from Captain W. R. Bennett.

3. One lot extending from Riverview Avenue to the St. John River and a house from Alice M. Harned.

This action on the part of the government will provide for enlarged grounds attached to the Hospital plant and for additional housing as well. It is understood that the dwellings purchased will not be removed but will be repaired and used in the operation of the Hospital. At present the intention is to use these buildings as dwelling for some members of the staff and as quarters for improved patients.

## ROTARIANS HEAR INTERESTING TALK BY PROF. STRANGE

The importance of phrenology in character analysis was stressed by Professor James Strange in his lecture given to members of the Rotary Club at the regular luncheon meeting held yesterday afternoon. He discussed the history of the science, showing that the formation of the human head is an index to character. Professor Strange pointed out that phrenology is becoming recognized as a scientific method of character analysis, asserting that it is employed by many organizations to determine the character of applicants for positions.

The speaker also dealt with palmistry and its relation to phrenology, pointing out that the lines in the human hand also have much significance in character analysis.

Professor Strange demonstrated his work on a few subjects chosen at random from the large number of members present. His "readings" were very interesting, and revealed him as a remarkable student of human nature.

The noted phrenologist arrived in Fredericton a few weeks ago and has been practising his profession here. He is well known throughout the Maritimes, and is also recognized throughout Canada as one of the outstanding masters of the phrenological science. He has made a thorough study of the science and ranks foremost among the exponents of phrenology on the continent.

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## DELEGATES MEET DEPARTMENT HEADS HERE

### Unemployment Situation and Relief Under Discussion

#### Early Decision

### Paterson Assures That Representations Will Be Considered

A delegation representing the Saint John County Council met with the Hon. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations, this morning and discussed various aspects of the unemployment situation in the municipality and reports prepared recently by a special committee named by the Municipal Council and A. B. McKinnon, Municipal Inspector, who had been loaned by the department were presented.

Hon. Mr. Paterson gave the delegation assurance that the representations of the delegation would be considered immediately and that they would be advised promptly of the decision.

The delegation from Saint John was composed of George H. Simpson, Warden, D. L. MacLaren, Mayor of Saint John, W. A. Ross, County Secretary and E. Claude Seeley, Councillor.

Others attending the conference were James H. Conlon, Director of Federal and Municipal Relations and A. W. Barbour, Deputy Minister of Public Works.

## ESTEEMED LADY PASSED AWAY THIS MORNING

### Mrs. F. W. Hill, Wife of General Hill, Died After Short Illness

General regret was felt by the citizens today when it was learned that Mrs. Henrietta Hill, wife of Brig-General F. W. Hill had passed away this morning at her home on Waterloo Row. While Mrs. Hill has not been in the best of health for some weeks, she has only been seriously ill since Sunday last and her death was entirely unexpected.

Mrs. Hill was born at Belleville, Ontario, and later resided at Kingston. In 1928 in company with General Hill and her daughter Miss Louise Hill she removed to Saint John. The family came to Fredericton to reside in 1930. Since coming here Mrs. Hill has made and retained a large circle of friends who will learn of her death with feelings of sincere regret. She was actively identified with the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire and with the Girl Guides organization and her work in connection with these organizations was greatly appreciated. Mrs. Hill was also a devoted member of the congregation of Christchurch Cathedral and was associated with many good works in the community in which she has made her home for the past seven years.

While arrangements have not been completed owing to the absence in the city of Very Rev. Dean W. H. Moorhead, it is understood that the funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon with service at Christchurch Cathedral. Interment will be made at Niagara Falls, Ontario, the remains will be taken to that city by tomorrow afternoon's train.

## HON. C. D. HOWE TO VISIT HERE

### Will Meet Board of Trade Committee

W. G. Clark, M.P., of this city was present at the meeting of the Transportation Committee of the Board of Trade held yesterday afternoon to further discuss plans relative to the proposed trans-Canada air service. The local board are endeavoring to have Fredericton included on the eastern route and every effort is being made to impress this fact upon the federal officials. Mr. Clark announced that Hon. C. D. Howe minister of transport, would visit Fredericton in the next few weeks. (The local federal representative was asked by the committee to arrange that Hon. Mr. Howe meet the committee of the Board of Trade. The co-operation of the city council in connection with the efforts being made will be also sought by the transportation group.)

According to the latest information relative to the air service, Hon. Mr. Howe stated in Ottawa that he expected the trans-continental service would start next fall, depending on the delivery of planes and the construction of emergency landing fields particularly in the West.

Tentative plans call for an overnight jump from Montreal to Vancouver, leaving the East at 8 p.m. and arriving on the west coast at 2 p.m. the following day. A connecting link will be flown from Montreal to Halifax making a trans-Canada flight of 21 or 22 hours.

Parliament passed legislation last session to set up the \$5,000,000 corporation to control the air line, 51 per cent. of the stock being retained by the C.N.R. The minority stock will be held by air companies operating the service.

## DR. W. W. WHITE OFFICER ORDER ST. JOHN JERUSALEM

A former valued member of the provincial legislature Dr. W. W. White, Saint John, was among those who attended at Rideau Hall in Ottawa yesterday and at the hands of His Excellency, Lord Tweedsmuir, the Governor-General of Canada, as the representative of His Majesty, King George VI, was invested with the beautiful emblem of his new rank as an Officer of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem.

The rank has been bestowed in recognition of valued services to the St. John Ambulance Association of which Dr. White is New Brunswick president. The investiture was a formal and impressive occasion and a luncheon was held in connection with it at which Dr. White was accompanied by his daughter, Mrs. H. Atwood Bridges of Ottawa.

Dr. White will be remaining in Ottawa to attend the banquet of the Dominion Boy Scout Association, of which organization also he has served as provincial president, receiving the Scouts appreciative recognition of work in the presentation of a much coveted and well honored badge.

"Advice to Teachers" was the subject of an address given to the students of the Provincial Normal School this morning by Dr. A. S. McFarlane, chief superintendent of education. In his remarks, the speaker gave much helpful advice to prospective teachers in connection with their profession.

## COMMITTEEMEN MEET YESTERDAY IN SPECIAL SESSION

### Discuss Further Plans Relating to May 12th Celebration

#### Twenty Floats

### Not Known Whether Local Militia Will Take Part

Chairmen of the different committees in charge of the proposed programme in connection with the observance of Coronation Day convened in special session in the city hall yesterday afternoon to further consider plans for the event. Alderman F. S. Mundle, chairman of the general committee, presided and the meeting was largely attended.

The report of the committee in charge of floats showed that at the present time 12 local organizations have already signified intentions of entering floats in the parade. It is expected that this number will increase to 20 within the next couple of weeks. The parade has every indication that it will be one of the most impressive processions ever to be held in the city, and the citizens generally are taking a keen interest in the proposed programme of celebration.

It was pointed out yesterday that there is but slight possibility that a pyrotechnic display will be held. However, the idea has not been entirely abandoned and it is still possible that fireworks will form a major part of the celebration on the evening of Coronation Day.

The \$250 to be advanced by the city council in connection with the observance will be used chiefly to provide prizes. Donations will be also received from service clubs and other organizations in the city. Prizes will be given for the most colorful and original floats, while prizes will also be awarded to citizens whose homes are the most attractively decorated. It is expected that most of the prize money to be donated by the clubs and societies will be awarded to the school children.

### No Announcements

Although Devon and Marysville will join with the city in the observance of the auspicious occasion, their plans have not yet been announced. However, it is likely that definite arrangements are about completed and will be made known within a short time.

Whether or not the local militia will take an active part in the celebration is not yet known. The committees expressed the opinion that the militia should take a major part in the observance, particularly in view of the fact that the new armory building has been erected. It is hoped that something will be done in that regard, but no definite announcement will be made for a few days.

The names of the firms sponsoring floats will not be announced until next week.

The local I.O.D.E. chapters are planning to donate prizes, including cups, medals, emblems, etc., to the different schools in the city and suburbs for the most original floats depicting historical events, etc. The prizes will be given to the different schools and will serve as memorials of the coronation of His Majesty King George VI.

The general committee will meet the chairman of the different committees next Monday or Tuesday. At that time the committees will report on the progress being made.
