UNITED STATES PRESIDENT WILL NOT CALL CONFERENCE OF NATIONS

Bitter Battles on Western Points Madrid Today

Artillery Thundering Night and Day Pounding Villages To Pieces

STEADY BOMBING BY BOTH SIDES

Scheme Studied By Four National Envoys --- Eden's Newest Plan

MADRID, July 14--Bitter fighting marked by intense aerial activity and stubborn attack and defense goes on today west of Madrid. It is unquestionable that the Government offensive is making gains, but whether the gains are vital enough to offset the heavy losses incurred is not yet known.

On the Basque front in Northern Spain the fliers attacked their foe's line from Somorostro west of Bilbao to the Valmaseda sector.

In the east, General Sebastian Pozas, commander of government forces in the Zagoza-Teruel sector, reported Albarracin "not only has been completely surrounded but also government troops now are fighting in the streets of the town."

The government offensive west of the capital, designed to break the insurgent siege, was stated by one eyewitness of the fighting to have opened up a new phase of the war in size and intensity.

"The government has been able to put into the field mechanical power to match, and perhaps more than match the rebel air force."

Day and night there is a steady bombing by both sides with government planes roaring over rebel positions.

GERMAN MOTHERS GIVEN A CHANCE TO HAVE COMPLETE REST AND RECREATION

Mother and Child Homes Prove a Success---More Are To Be Constructed

FUERSTENBERG, Mecklenburg, July 14--Germany has many recreation homes for children and mothers separately, but the National Socialist party has established here the only one where mother and child are to gether, yet separated.

At feeding time mothers are with their babies in the Fuerstenberg "Mother and Child," but the rest of the time the staff looks after the babies.

Three years at Fuerstenberg have convinced Frau Else Rasmussen, the director, that the Nazis should establish them all over the country to give impecunious mothers and their infants a month's rest. A second home is being built in the Erz mountains.

"The central idea," the director explains, "is that the young mothers shall not be deprived of recreation and rest until, say, the children are

WALTER J. TAYLOR APPOINTED AGENT C. N. R. EXPRESS

(Special to The Daily Mail) MONTREAL, July 14--The appointment of Walter J. Taylor as agent at Cornwall, Ont., was announced here yesterday by C. E. Bellerose, General Manager of the Canadian National Express. Mr. Taylor succeeds W. T. Ritchie recently transferred to the position of traffic supervisor at Montreal. DISTURBANCES MAR BASTILE DAY FETE IN GAY PARIS

(Special to The Daily Mail) PARIS, July 14--Sidewalk dancing torchlight processions and the usual Bastille day celebrations were interrupted by less peaceful diversions. 1500 Communists paid a visit to one of the French Rightist meetings, and were greeted by indignant Royalist sympathizers who poured from the building like a swarm of angry hornets. The efficient French gendarmes succeeded in dispersing the battling mob, not however before many had suffered minor injuries.

RUSSIAN FLIERS FLEW OVER OAKL'D, OFF TO SAN DIEGO

(Special to The Daily Mail) OAKLAND, Cal. July 14--The Russian aviators are now south of Oakland and headed for San Pedro. They are unofficially reported to have broken the non-stop long distance flight record.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14--It had been announced that the Russian fliers would stop at Oakland, California. However, the giant Russian plane passed over Oakland without stopping and is continuing to San Diego, Cal. The two Russian fliers had announced that should their gasoline hold out they would continue their flight in an effort to smash the previous non stop world's record held by two French army aviators.

A message from the Soviet trans-polar plane indicating it would attempt to fly as far as San Diego on its non-stop flight from Moscow was intercepted here last night by MacKay Radio.

The message relayed to army headquarters here for translation, said the plane's proposed route would be over Oakland and Los Angeles to San Diego, approximately 6,487 miles from the starting point in Moscow.

Blood Spattered Pavements

THE Provincial Government which is making every effort to promote safety and comfort on the highway for motor drivers and others, is making an effort to control the speed limit in and around cities and incorporated towns to thirty miles an hour. There has been altogether too much speeding, cutting-in, and careless driving and it is hoped that the Motor Vehicle Department in conjunction with the R.C.M.P., will pull up motor vehicle violators. Hon. A. A. Dysart, Premier and Minister of Public Works, is to be congratulated on giving further evidence in today's regulations that safety is to be desired--and ENFORCED.

Parents in this holiday season cannot be too particular about warning their children to avoid auto accidents. Every day we read in the newspapers reports of fatal accidents which have taken place and a large portion of these refer to CHILDREN WHO WERE STRUCK DOWN WHILE PLAYING ON THE STREETS OR ROADS. FULL OF LIFE ONE MOMENT, THEY WERE LYING DEAD ON THE STREET OR ROAD THE NEXT MOMENT. A number of these ACCIDENTS WERE CAUSED BY CHILDREN RUNNING IN FRONT OF CARS AND OTHERS WERE CAUSED BY DRIVERS WITH A TENDENCY TO CUT IN AND OUT OF MOTOR TRAFFIC AGAINST ALL TRAFFIC REGULATIONS. These drivers do not seem to appreciate the fact that the quickest passport to a hospital or a cemetery is to cut-in and out of motor traffic. ANOTHER SHORTCUT TO THE CEMETERY is the habit of drivers turning quickly into yardways and driveways without giving any warning to children playing on the streets or to those who may be behind the car.

THE MOTOR VEHICLE DEPARTMENT OF THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT AND THE R.C.M.P. ARE EACH DOING THEIR PARTS TO PREVENT BLOOD-SPATTERED PAVEMENTS--and it is up to the motor car drivers to do their part. The enforcement of the Motor Vehicle Act is one of the major duties of the R.C.M.P., and they have instructions to carry out to the fullest extent of the law. The Mounted Police would do well to keep an eye on the drivers who make a practice of cutting-in on the roads, as several accidents have already occurred this year; fortunately few of them have been fatal.

Thousands of word pictures of fatalities have been written in accident reports pertaining to automobile wrecks caused by reckless drivers. Many of these "cutters-in" on the road complain that the other fellow is driving too slowly. Stepping on the gas, the "cutter-in" speeds his car ahead of the first car, then passes the second. But--he did not see the car coming towards him on the right side of the road. He was on the wrong side of the road and with hasty anxiety he tried to wiggle his car back into line between the second and third car. But he misjudged the distance and could not make it and with a terrific crash his car and two others were instantly turned into a junk pile on the side of the road. The next act in this driver's chapter was a slowly driven car . . . IT WAS A HEARSE DRIVING AT A SLOW PACE TO THE CEMETERY.

MAX IGNORED FOR SYNTHETIC LOUIS-FARR BOUT

(Special to The Daily Mail) NEW YORK, July 14--Max Schmeling will not get a shot at Louis' title this year said Jacobs. Plans for the Louis-Farr battle are under way for September.

In a statement to the press Jacobs announced this body blow for the boxing game as he intimated that it would be a Farr cry to a title match for the German. Once more Schmeling loses out, the fans lose out and the noble art of self-defense is placed neatly behind the eight ball.

Schmeling is being penalized according to Jacobs for having tried to "out-smart him." Boxing fans accustomed by now to being out-smarted will listen to this statement with very mixed feelings, Jacobs said.

WESTERN TERROIR MENU FOR LORD, LADY TWEEDSMUIR

"Punk," "Axle Grease," "Red Paint" On Western List

CALGARY, July 14 -- Lord and Lady Tweedsmuir Saturday answered the cook's call to "come and get it or we'll throw it out," and sat down under a canvas shelter to a chuck-wagon dinner at the Calgary Stampede Grounds.

Their Excellencies and their touring party took their noonday meal with Calgary stampede directors after the Governor-General had visited the Indian village and accepted from Chief Joe Calf Child of the Stoney tribe a pipe of peace.

The Indians, eager to give tangible evidence of their loyalty to the King's personal representative, attempted to shower Lord Tweedsmuir with an assortment of gifts. They sought to give him a long hunting spear, a tom-tom, a knife, and a hunting bag.

For himself his Excellency took only the peace pipe, remarking:

"You are very kind, but I don't think I can carry any more." But for Lady Tweedsmuir he accepted the hunting bag.

Later the Governor-General, his wife and other members of the party ate most of this menu: Radishes, berries (boiled beans), sow belly (boiled fat porkside), antelope, spuds (potatoes), punk (bread), axle grease (gravy), plenty of red paint (catsup), C. P. R. strawberries (prunes), spotted calf pudding (rice and raisins), pie (any kind so long as it's apple), and Java (coffee) with sand and cow or black.

Will Use North China By Force If Demands Not Met By Chinese

LARGE SCALE OPERATIONS FEARED

Chinese Will Not See Another Large Slice Of Territory Taken Away

700 PILGRIMS TO STE. ANNE DE BEAUPRE TUES.

(Special to The Daily Mail) MONCTON, N. B., July 14--The annual pilgrimage from the Maritime Provinces to Ste. Anne de Beaupre, Que., left here this afternoon over the Canadian National railways in two trains, one train bearing pilgrims from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island and the other with those from Nova Scotia. There were a total of seven hundred passengers. The pilgrimage which is being accompanied by J. S. Corcoran, district passenger agent of the railways at Moncton will return from Ste. Anne de Beaupre on Thursday.

WINDSOR, Ont., July 14--Ontario Court of Appeal has dismissed an application made by non-assenting holders of Walkerville bond issues for permission to appeal from the June 15, 1937, order of the Ontario municipal board approving the refunding and amalgamation of the municipalities of East Windsor, Walkerville, Windsor and Sandwich.

Chinese reports said, forced a heavily supported detachment of Japanese troops to retreat toward their Fengtai base after being driven back on Peking's southern wall in hand-to-hand fighting.

Tientsin reports said the Japanese attacked Chinese defenders of the four eastern and southern gates of this ancient capital and cut off two Chinese brigades at Nanyuan barracks from other units of the 29th Route Army.

Chinese troops succeeded in removing sections of railway track skirting the southern and eastern walls of Peking to prevent the approach of Japanese armored trains.

Chinese reports charged that the Japanese bombed the barracks and airbase in the Nanyuan district which is the nerve centre of the 29th Route Army.

Japanese military leaders, however, denied the bombing and said that their planes which might have dropped leaflets, had been fired upon by Chinese troops.

The Japanese North China command issued a communique in Tientsin.

BUSH NEGROES ARE REPORTED SEIZING BRIT. GOLD FIELDS

(Special to The Daily Mail) GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, July 14--Several hundred bush negroes led by escaped French convicts from the French penal settlements in French Guiana have made an attack on British gold fields in the interior of British Guiana, occupying the gold fields and driving the miners into the bush.

State militia has been called out to deal with these modern buccaners who are reported to be well armed.
