ably the district around Sackville
and Moncton, considerable progress
has been made in pheasant breeding
but the attention of the breeders has
for the most part been confined to
the English ringneck. At Sackville E.
A. Dixon has liberated about 35 ring
necks during the past thirteen
months, and there is good evidence
that at least a reasonable number of
them have survived the winter. This
year he has over 100 in captivity.
The ringnecks have proven satis-
factory for the marshy Petitcodiac
district, but are entirely unsuited for
the highlands of this section. Pheasant
breeding has become increasing-
ly important both in Nova Scotia
and the western provinces, and a
great number of birds have been li-
berated in those places. J. F. Donly,
Mill Village, Queens County, N. S.,
is probably the largest producer of
pheasants in the Maritimes, having
raised them by the hundreds.

MOSCOW July 14—Sixty-one Rus-
