## SIGNS FOR SERIES



Tyrone Power, Hollywood's latest sensation, will be starred in a new weekly series of dramatizations beginning Sunday, October 3, over the NBC-Blue Network at 9:00 p.m., EST. He's shown signing his contract at NEC Hollywood studios.

HOLLYWOOD, Sept. 17—A new weekly series of dramatic presentations starring Tyrone Power, latest Hollywood sensation, will be inaugurated Sunday, October 3, at 9:00 p. m., EST, over the NBC-Blue Network. The program, to be sponsored by John H. Woodbury, Inc., will replace the Rippling Rhythm Revue.

The new series will consist of half-hour dramatization of outstanding stories and radio version of Broadway successes. Several recent Broadway hits are being prepared for the Power series and many current short story successes and novels are under consideration for dramatization.

Power's leading lady, to be chosen for each performance, will be chosen from the list of famous screen stars. The supporting cast will likewise vary according to the type of characters required for the minor roles. An orchestra yet to be selected will provide background music for the dramatic series.

As leading man of the series, Power will enact not only the fresh, youthful type that has made him one of the top ranking actors in Hollywood, but will also demonstrate the dramatic talent that has made the name Power distinguished in the American theater for two generations.

Son of a distinguished actor of the same name, Tyrone Power skyrocketed to movie fame in a few pictures. He received scant consideration because of his name, however, and for several years existed on minor roles in Broadway plays.

He also had small parts with Fritz Leiber's Shakespearean company with which the elder Power was then engaged. After his father's death, he went to Chicago, where he appeared with the Circuit Theater Unit at the Century of Progress exposition. Finally Darryl F. Zanuck, Twentieth Century-Fox production chief, gave him a small part in "Girls Dormitory", a larger one in "Ladies in Love", and then the male lead in a million-dollar production, "Lloyds of London." He has since starred in "Love Is News" and his latest picture is "Thin Ice."

## Bing'll Be Delighted

With the announcement that he has been engaged by Savington W. Crampton to write original songs for the new Oakie College broadcast, which debuts on the Columbia network, Harry Barris will get his second chance at radio fame. Together with Joe McCarthy, he will write new compositions to be introduced on the Tuesday night spot.

Barris is a veteran of radio. He was the star of the original Rhythm boys, Paul Whitemen's stellar trio, which was composed of Barris, Al Rinker, and Harry Lillis Crosby. Harris Lillis is now Bing Crosby. Al Rinker, who is Mildred Bailey's brother, heads Kay Thompson's radio chorus.

Barris however chose the more difficult road of composition. His son "Lies" became an outstanding success. Then he organized an orchestra—in fact did everything but the 'hot' singing for which he had become famous as the star of the Rhythm Boys.

But now he's back on the air and is going to reintroduce his singing style, with its piano top banging and sibilant razzmatazzes. And what's more he'll be singing his own songs—and so will the rest of the Oakie College cast.

The new Oakie show will debut September 28, at 9:30 P. M., EST, over the WABC-CBS network.

## ON THE C.B.C.

### "Music For Music's Sake"

Gertrude Newton, soprano, will make another appearance on the national network program, "Music for Music's Sake," to originate in the Winnipeg studios of the CBC on Thursday, September 23, at 10:00 p. m. EST.

Miss Newton will sing two songs, first the work of the contemporary English composer, Sir Landon Ronald—"Pluck This Little Flower", and the other, "Dedication", by the German romantic composer, Schumann.

The concert orchestra, directed by Isaac Mamott, will present the ballet music from Meyerbeer's operas, arranged by W. F. Kretschmer; the Valse from "Scene de Ballet", by Glazunov, and the overture to the "Bartered Bride" by Smetana, founder of the National School of Modern Czech Music.

"Nature Has A Story" is the intriguing title of the next in the series of "Nature Has A Story" talks given by Dan McCowan, famous Canadian naturalist and author, who usually sneaks from Banff every Thursday night over the NBC coast-to-coast network, but for this period will speak from Vancouver.

During his winter sleep, the Canadian grizzly likes an upper berth, while the hoary marmot prefers a lower. In his fascinating manner, Mr. McCowan will describe fully the hibernating habits of Canadian animals.

### "The Children's Album"

Another interesting animal story for juvenile listeners of the CBC will be featured during "The Children's Album" to be broadcast on Monday, September 20, at 5:45 p. m. EST. "The Story Book Lady" has chosen for this date "The Story of the Buffalo", one of Canada's oldest known residents.

"The Story Book Lady" will present this broadcast from the Windsor studios to the eastern network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

## DR. DAFOE RETURNS

Dr. Allan Roy Dafoe, celebrated physician of the Dionne Quintuplets returns to WABC-CBS for a new three weekly series beginning October 4th, from 4:45 to 5:00 P. M. (EST) on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The Quins' program will be the only sponsored international series on the air, with Dr. Dafoe broadcasting from his hospital study in Callander, Ontario while an orchestra and vocalists round out each show from WABC in New York.

The program will open in New York with a daily news of the Quintuplets. It will then be switched to the Dafoe study in Callander, where the Quins' personal physician will talk informally of children and his own famous patients. Following Dr. Dafoe's chat, the broadcast will return to New York.

Lern and Fink, on behalf of Lysol, will again sponsor the series. Under their sponsorship, Dr. Dafoe was heard regularly on the air for the first time last year. During that time, in recognition of his "outstanding service to children", he was awarded "The Parents Magazine Medal."
