

U. N. B. Ruggers Tie Saint John 3-3 and Nose Moncton Squad 3-0

Vastly Improved Red and Black Team Opens 1937 Season

Ken Corbett Scores Against Saint John; Burt McDermott Makes Tally in Broncho Game; Fine Heeling and Dribbling by the U. N. B. Scrum; Colby Injured

Displaying a brand of football vastly better than any shown by red and black clad teams during the past four or five years, the University of New Brunswick fifteen nosed the Moncton Broncos 3-0 in a rain drenched game yesterday afternoon at College Field.

In spite of being outweighed, the U.N.B. scrum drove the opposing pack before it again and again, doing an exceptionally good job in heeling and dribbling. Most of the college gains were made through the dribbling of the forwards.

McDermott Scores

The lone counter of the contest came about the middle of the first half, the ball travelling down the three quarter line, Bartlett to Covey to McDermott, the latter carrying the oval across the line to the right of the Moncton goal, after the three backs had put on a nice exhibition of broken field running and passing. Captain Owen Sleep's attempt to convert went wide of the posts.

U.N.B. made two abortive tries, both plays being called back by referee Johnny Patterson for forward passing. The game was rough and hard fought all the way through, but fumbles, while present, were fewer than the wet slippery condition of the field and one ball might have caused.

U.N.B. kicked off to the visitors, but recovered the ball on a heel out by the scrum. A fumble gave the Broncho's three quarter line possession of the oval, and they moved deep into the U.N.B. territory. The locals recovered possession and drove back, but the visiting scrum then dribbled to within five yards of the U.N.B. line. After losing some ground, Moncton booted the ball behind the U.N.B. goal on a penalty kick, but Sleep brought the oval out and kicked it back to midfield.

8 Man Scrum

Using an eight man scrum formation, U.N.B. turned on the heat for a 20 yard gain. From there the three quarter combination of Bartlett to Covey to McDermott scored the only try of the contest.

Good local dribbling and close checking brought the ball up to the Moncton ten yard line, but on a Moncton penalty kick it was sent back to midfield. Then, with a beautiful dribbling attack U.N.B. drove the pigskin behind the visitor's goal line, but when the pileup was disentangled, a Moncton man had the ball. On receipt of the Moncton kick, Hap Wilson made a nice 20 yard run but was downed, and the visitors carried the ball back to mid field.

A well placed kick by Al Stuart took play to the Moncton one yard line. U.N.B. scrum carried the ball over, but the ref called back the play. On the next scrum down the Moncton forwards dribbled the ball down to centre field. Play went back to the Moncton 20 yard line on a nice three quarter line run by the local collegians. After a beautiful exhibition of broken field running by Cec Covey, Al Stuart carried the ball over just to the left of the goal posts, but the referee called a forward pass, with consequent no score.

Second Half

Dribbling by U.N.B. forwards took the ball to the Moncton five yard line soon after the commencement of the second half, but the visiting scrum held, heeling out the ball. Sleep received a Moncton punt, but was downed in his tracks. After a short gain, U.N.B. was given a penalty kick at about the Moncton 20 yard line, but Sleep's kick went wide because of the difficult angle.

The local forwards then drove down field again. Dick Logie went over the Moncton goal line, on pass from Covey after a beautiful display of broken field running by the latter, but Logie was ahead of the runner and the play was called back. An abortive scoring push by the visitors carried the ball deep into home territory, where they were

Tie at Saint John

SAINT JOHN, Oct. 11—Opening the 1937 rugger season for both teams here Saturday afternoon, the Saint John Seniors and the University of New Brunswick fifteen tied three-all in an evenly matched contest at the Allison Grounds.

Bowen, local forward, smothered a fumble from the hands of Captain Owen Sleep two yards outside the Red and Black goal line to roll over for the opening try shortly before the close of the first half. Lanky Ken Corbett, third line scrum man for the Burden coached clan, picked up a loose ball on the Saint John 25 yard line and stumbled over for the equal-awarded a penalty kick. The ball hit the goal post and bounced off into Covey's hands, who ran it back 20 yards before being thrown. A slight gust of wind robbed the visitors of four points, carrying another Moncton penalty kick, tried by Bud McKnight, just to the right of the uprights.

Bad Pass Costly

The U.N.B. pack then carried the ball back to within a few yards of a score, but the visitors held and drove the locals back up the field. Breaking away from scrum, with the ball tucked under his arm and an almost free field before him, Eric Lutes, U.N.B. attempted a pass to the three-quarter line, tossing away a nice scoring chance as the ball fell to the ground. Play went back and forth with no outstanding features

YANKEES DROP FOURTH GAME 7 TO 3, U. N. B. CONCEDES N. B. NET FINALS TO MT. A. SQUAD

Gomez Hero of Fifth Contest, Bringing In Winning Run; Hoag and Di Maggio Both Clout Homers; Batting Spree in Second Brings the Giants Victory on Saturday

POLO GROUNDS, New York, Oct. 11—The New York Yankees climaxed another record-smashing chapter in their book at baseball accomplishments yesterday by overpowering the Giants in a booming finish to the second successive all-New York world series.

To the accompaniment of their biggest burst of long-range fire in the series, the Yankees blasted out a 4-2 victory on a raindrenched diamond in the fifth and final game while 'Lefty' Gomez repulsed repeated counter attacks by the Giants after Mel Ott's homer tied the score in the third inning.

The Giants won their only game of the best-of-seven series Saturday, a 7-3 victory behind the screwball pitching of Carl Hubbell, their ace southpaw who was driven from the mound in the opening series tiff.

"Lefty" Hero of Finale

Gomez, the eccentric southpaw, was the hero of the decisive game as the Yankees tallied all their guns off the portside delivery of gangling Cliff Melton, Giant freshman, who failed for the second time in the series. Five of the Yankees hits went for extra bases, including a double, two triples and two home runs, but Gomez enjoyed the distinction of batting home the winning run with a single as he repeated his opening game triumph over the Giants.

The Giants went down to defeat fighting. They outhit the Yankees, 10-6, but except for Ott's circuit clout into the right field stands in the third inning, with Dick Bartell on base, the National Leaguers were unable to produce a scoring punch.

Home runs by Hoag into the right field stands in the second and by Joe DiMaggio in the third put the Yankees out in front.

Jim Colby, who replaced Don McKinnon at fullback during the first half, was carried from the field near the end of the period after being kicked by a Saint John player when attempting to clear the ball in a scrimmage play on U.N.B. five yard line. He suffered a painful facer injury and was taken to the Y.M.C.A. for treatment before returning to Fredericton.

Converts Fail

The convert attempted by Stan Young for the Seniors was ruled out when visiting forwards interfered with the kick deflecting the ball before it topped the bar. Owen Sleep's beautiful lift from the left corner of the field following Corbett's try was also disallowed when the goal judge overruled both referee and linesmen.

Both teams played a ragged game in the opening half, resorting to kicking and dribbling, with the visitors displaying a marked superiority in dribbling. The lighter Fredericton scrum also played a smoother game and the majority of the 'heel outs' went in the general direction of the visiting backfield men.

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Next Year's Yankee Squad In Need Of Several Repairs

New Cogwheel at Second to Replace Lazzeri; Joe Gordon Named; Possible Changes in Hurlers

It's a long way to next April, but even that far ahead American Leaguers can see the Yanks winning another pennant. The Yank powerhouse, good enough to swamp opposition for the past two years, will return almost intact and, if anything, will be stronger.

He's a lucky mechanic who has the material to replace broken parts. That's Joe McCarthy. His Yank machine needs a new part at second base to replace Tony Lazzeri, who expects to retire.

The new part that McCarthy expects will fit in with the Yank machine is Joe Gordon, 23 year old second baseman from Newark. The Yanks brought Gordon from the Coast League during the summer of 1936. He played out the season on the Coast and reported to the Yank spring training camp. He made a hit immediately, proving a remarkable fielder and a long distance hitter.

He played with Newark all last season and was one of the stars on what is called the best minor league

team ever put together. He was among the first five in home runs, runs scored and was surprisingly well up in the last of runs batted in.

McCarthy will stand pat with the rest of the team, with the exception of the pitching staff. The infield will be Gehrig, Rolfe and Crosetti in addition to Gordon, and the outfield, DiMaggio, Selkirk and Hoag with Powell and Henrich in reserve. Dickey, Glenn and Jorgens will undoubtedly fill the three catching berths.

Gomez, Ruffing and Pearson are three certain starters on the pitching staff and comprise one of the strongest three man squads in either league. Murphy is sure to be carried as a relief hurler but the rest of the staff is in doubt.

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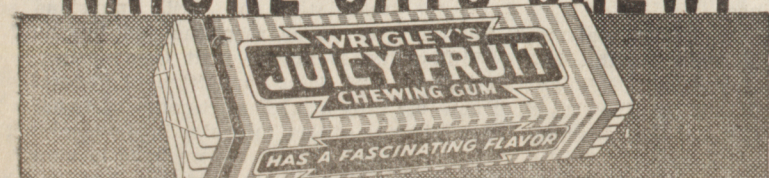
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
