QUEBEC, June 14.—Beaver hunting in the Province of Quebec is banned until January 1, 1942, starting today, according to an order-in-council just signed.

The ban also applies to Indians who were given the privilege heretofore of hunting beaver in certain districts. Another order-in-council forbids hunting of partridge in all sections of the province for an indefinite period.

WARDEN SEIZES BOTTLED WORM USED AS BAIT

Ruling On Legality is Being Sought

OTTAWA, June 14—The dream of anglers, in the shape of a new type of "hookless" bait which was used by men still-fishing for pike and pickerel on the Nation River near Plantagenet, 40 miles east of Ottawa, was seized by Game Warden Wayne Robinson yesterday. The new bait will be sent to Toronto for a ruling as to whether it is legal in Ontario waters.

The bait consists of a worm placed alive in a clear one-ounce glass bottle filled with water and having a glass stopper. Under the surface the worm is magnified and it wriggles in a most natural and alluring fashion. Hungry pike and pickerel strike at the bait and, more often than not, swallow worm, bottle and all. The fish is then easily pulled out and the bait removed and used again for the next victim.

Ontario fishing regulations make no mention of the "bottle bait."

TORONTO, June 14—"Bottle bait," newest wrinkle in still fishing, will receive the consideration of Ontario's Department of Game and Fisheries when a sample arrives.

"It's a new one on me," said D. J. Taylor, Minister of the department, when "bottle bait" was described to him. Mr. Taylor laughed loudly at the prospect of studying the bait used by anglers near Ottawa.

"Offhand, it looks like a good story to tell our fishing friends south of the border. It might bring them up here. But, of course, we'd have to exaggerate and advise them to bring quart bottles," he said.

ITALY COLLECTS FROM SWEEPS

ROME, June 14.—Gambling in all its multiple forms is actively sponsored by the Italian government.

In addition to a weekly lottery based on winning combinations of numbers, to major lotteries attract the attention of Italians once a year; the automobile race of Tripoli and the horse race at Merano. Both lotteries are similar to the Irish sweepstakes. Spinwheels of fate produce a determined number of tickets corresponding to automobiles in the first race and horses in the second. Prizes amount to various million lire in both events.

The weekly lottery is called "Regio Lotto." It is entirely in the hands of the state. Every Saturday 90 numbers—from 1 to 90—are drawn in eight major cities of the peninsula. The first five numbers taken from the urn are the winners. A winning number entitles the possessor of the ticket to 52 times the amount played. But there are combinations. Two winning numbers pay 250 times the stake. Three winning numbers, 4250 and a "quaterna," or four winning numbers, 60,000 times the stake.

Use "Dream Book"

About 5,000,000 Italians, poor and rich, save pennies during the week and play the "Lotto." Poor people pawn wedding rings and furniture to play. They all possess the dream book "Libro dei sogni" for their guidance in choosing the numbers. The dream book is like a dictionary with numbers corresponding to persons and things and lottery fans believe in it implicitly. When a person dreams of something he looks it up in the dream book and bets on the corresponding number. The Pope's number is 58, blood corresponds to 17 and fear to 90.

Official figures issued by the ministry of finance revealed that during 1936 alone the state made a net profit of about \$23,000,000 on the "Lotto."

Card games are particularly popular in small Italian villages. Games played are strange and unknown in other countries. A pack of Italian cards consists of only 40 cards, there are no eights, nines and tens. There are no numbers on the cards and the designs are strange middle-age figures.

Stud Poker (Unknown)

Five cities, largely frequented by foreign tourists, possess roulette tables. They are Venice, Abbazia, Taormina, San Remo and Campione, on the Swiss frontier famous for its "sky-limit" stakes. Residents of towns where there are gambling casinos are not allowed to play.

Dice are not popular in Italy. Poker dice are found only in bars of swanky hotels. Professional gamblers have learned to shoot craps during the last two years.

Horse races and greyhound races are popular in Rome and Milan. Greyhound racing is considered a "de-luxe" sport in Italy. The first races held in Rome several years ago were inaugurated by Crown Prince Humbert.

Gambling is steadily growing in Italy and the authorities have avoided curbing it because the government gets a good share of the proceeds.

A SAFETY CODE FOR CHILDREN

WISE OLD HENS OF NORTH KNOW WHEN IT'S SUNDAY

TORONTO, June 15—"Egg circles" may be unfamiliar to most churches, but they played an important part in raising funds for the Baptist mission at Kipling, in Northern Ontario.

Rev. A. J. Fugelsang, who ministers in that district, told the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, at First Avenue Baptist Church, yesterday, that the impoverished members of the congregation decided to sell all the eggs laid on Sundays and give the funds to their church.

"Some people managed to give \$27 a year by this system," he said, "but the hens got wise to this scheme and quit laying on Sunday."

The undaunted people agreed then to plant an extra row of potatoes for the church. They sold potatoes, and last fall the church repaid its loan to the Home Mission Board.

ALGEBRA MEDAL IS VAIN AS FOIL TO EMOTION

Manitoba Woman Raps Church, Education and Women's Institutes.

WINNIPEG, June 15—Miss Mildred McMurray, Legal Supervisor of the Manitoba Government Child Welfare Department, told Manitoba Women's Institute members here that the Church was failing in its duty toward young people.

"The Church is not giving these young people what they need," she said. "We have long blamed the Church for not holding youth, but when we find those who share its activity straying wide of the moral way, we must recognize it is not providing the right emotional and spiritual guidance." Miss McMurray criticized the school system, which, she said, stuffed children's heads with knowledge and gave them no training in social adjustment.

"A gold medal in algebra does not equip a girl or boy to face life's emotional problems," she asserted.

Women's Institutes came within the scope of Miss McMurray's criticisms, and she suggested women could do better educational work in their own communities than they were doing.

200 FRENCH WOMEN ARE IN MYSTERY TANTRUM

Strange Malady Likened to Mass Hysteria Suddenly Throws Factory Workers Into Frenzy.

PARIS, June 15—Two hundred women employees of a factory in Thumeries, near Lille, were reported today to have been seized suddenly with fainting and hysteria attacks.

Doctors were unable to explain the incident, except as an incomprehensible collective psychopathological attack.

The mass seizure began after one woman fell unconscious. Others rushed to her aid, but as soon as they reached her they began to shriek and whirl about as though dizzy. Some fainted, others rolled on the floor.

Pandemonium broke out in the factory when other women began going into convulsions. They apparently were affected by seeing their companions.

Some women attacked others, tearing off clothing, raking faces with fingernails and keeping up a continuous shrieking.

Factory doctors raced in, suspecting gas. They ordered the plant evacuated immediately. Men workers were called to get out those women unaffected.

The symptoms spread among the women even after their removal, when they saw others writhing as they were carried out on stretchers.

Doctors sampled the factory air and found it normal.

Blood tests were given to the victims immediately but they showed no signs of gas or other intoxicants.

Doctors declared the symptoms and after-effects were typically nervous. They believed it was due to collective hysteria.

The women recovered gradually, except for four younger ones who complained of severe pains.

PROVINCIAL EGG LAYING CONTEST

The thirty-second week of the 17th New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest, conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, was concluded on June 12th, with a production of 1,164 eggs and 1185.6 points. This is an average production of 61.5 per cent.

Barred Rock hen No. 7 owned by the Dominion Experimental Station; Fredericton, is in second place to date with a production of 155 eggs and 180.9 points.

Single Comb White Leghorn hen No. 4 owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, is in third position with 152 eggs and 177.9 points.



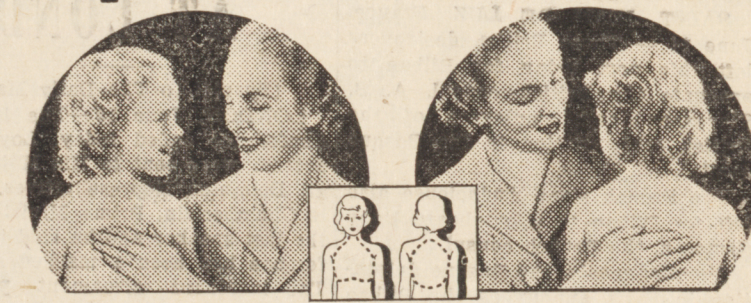
