York and Sunbury Historical Society

The York and Sunbury Historical Society at its annual meeting last evening learned through the report of the president Rev. Dr. F. A. Wightman that the Society had decreased over one hundred per cent. in membership in the last couple of years, and that the membership which had started out a few years ago with considerably over a hundred members had now dwindled to forty-six. The report also stated that the different committees had been very inactive during the year and that practically no research or similar work had been done. The Museum Committee which was recently taken in hand by R. P. Gorham has made more progress than any branch of the Society. Mr. Gorham with his usual thoroughness has started a systematic arrangement of the Society's Museum.

In his report to the Society, Mr. Gorham stated that there were over three thousand exhibits in the Society and that the cash value of these exhibits was between two and three thousand dollars. Most of the members of the Society feel that this is a very low valuation and that possibly the value of the exhibits will reach well over three thousand dollars. The principal exhibits in the Society are there on loan. These include a large collection by members of the Good family and also the Bourque collection of Acadian objects dealing with the history of early Acadia. This collection which is said to be the most valuable of its kind in the Maritime provinces was collected by A. E. Bourque of the Public Utilities Commission and loaned to the Society by him. It is under the control of Mrs. J. L. Neville who is a member of the Bourque family.

The report of the treasurer, Sterling Brannen showed that the Society had taken in \$465.81 during the year and had expended \$238.80, leaving a balance on hand of \$227.01. The money received by the Society during the year included a three hundred dollar grant from the Provincial Government.

The election of officers for the ensuing year resulted as follows: President, Rev. Dr. F. A. Wightman; Vice President, W. J. West; Second Vice President, Major F. A. Good; Recording secretary, Whitman A. Haines; Corresponding Secretary-Treasurer, Sterling Brannen; Historian, Mrs. J. B. Maxwell. The following were the directors elected: J. L. Neville, C. W. Clark, R. P. Gorham, Mrs. A. E. Mathewson, Rev. D. R. Chown, Dr. G. I. Nugent, W. A. Wasson, Sheffield; W. W. Hubbard, Burton, and Mrs. Susan Squires. Mr. Neville declined to act on the directorate and a member will be elected at the next monthly meeting to take his place.

On motion of W. J. West, W. G. Clark, M. P., was elected honorary president of the Society and the Rt. Hon. the Countess of Ashburnham was elected patroness. Neither Mr. Clark nor Lady Ashburnham are members of the Executive as their election under the new constitution is purely honorary.
