a part to get a break in pictures, and
Schmidt put it on the cuff, incident-
ally inaugurating Menjou's career as
"best-dressed-man" in pictures.
Menjou says it's true. But he does
not have to bother about the best-
dressed thing any more. He picks
and chooses when it comes to parts,

and wants no two roles alike. Took
his latest, they say, mainly because
he gets to play a trombone!

posal, although making no definite ef-
fort to force the issue, are opposed
to the action of the opposing forces.
The question is the subject of wide-
spread discussion and the outcome
of the matter is being awaited with
interest by the citizens.

When the council received a petition
favoring the adoption of daylight sav-
ing time this summer, the proposal
was approved, and June 26 was the
date set for it to become effective.
Later, when another petition oppos-
ing the fast time was presented, the
council rescinded its first motion and
handed the matter over to the special
committee.

A suggestion had been made that
a plebiscite should be held to decide
the matter, but it was felt by some
that the season was too far advanced
by the time a decision could be re-
ached in this manner, and in view of
the fact that the council already had
rescinded its motion to make day-
light saving time effective, it was
thought that the matter should be left
at that.
