

He made his professional debut in 1930 as a night club singer. Between then and the time he joined NBC in 1935 he was a jack of all trades, holding jobs as bank teller and company manager,

life guard, song plugger and automobile mechanic. During these five years he had 21 singing jobs. Dennis' first chance on NBC came


in August, 1935, when Little Jack Heller, regular tenor of the Climalene Carnival was stricken with an attack of laryngitis.




