## CLARK DENNIS NEW TENOR ON FIBBER SHOW

Will Replace Perry Como, "The Singing Barber" On Program For Some Time

CHICAGO, Nov. 18—Clark Dennis, who has become one of radio's best known singers in the two and a half years he has been associated with the National Broadcasting Company, has replaced Perry Como, the singing barber, as vocal soloist on the Fibber McGee and Molly broadcasts, heard Mondays over the NBC-Red Network at 9.00 p.m., EST.

Born in West Branch, Mich., on December 19, 1911, Dennis is the son of a physician and a former opera and concert singer. Joining the a cappella choir of Flint, Mich., as a young man, Dennis soon was launched on a singing career. He made his professional debut in 1930 as a night club singer. Between then and the time he joined NBC in 1935 he was a jack of all trades, holding jobs as bank teller and company manager, life guard, song plugger and automobile mechanic. During these five years he had 21 singing jobs.

Dennis' first chance on NBC came in August, 1935, when Little Jack Heller, regular tenor of the Climaleone Carnival was stricken with an attack of laryngitis.

Tenor on many big NBC sustainers, Dennis also talks back to Don McNeill, master of ceremonies, on the NBC Breakfast Club and to Ransom Sherman, of the Club Matinee. He has also been heard on the NBC Minstrels and NBC Jamboree programs. He will be replaced on the Breakfast Club and Club Matinee by Johnnie Johnston, NBC baritone guitarist.

## "Songs at the Piano" On Air Via CBC Tomorrow

Celia Huston will sing past and present favourites from Tin Pan Alley on the CBC presentation, "Songs at the Piano," to be broadcast from the Toronto studios over the national network on Friday, November 19, at 5.00 p.m. AST. Miss Huston, who will accompany herself at the piano, will feature Duke Ellington's slow blues number "Mood Indigo."

The novelty swing hit "Bob White Watcha Gonna Swing Tonight" and "Life of the Party" from the film of the same name, will be the current top-raters to be heard on the programme.

## MAUDE ADAMS IN ROLE OF TEACHER

COLUMBIA, Mo., Nov. 18—Maude Adams, celebrated American actress, will be heard in her first radio interview and the second interview of any kind in her long career, during an exclusive broadcast over the nationwide NBC-Red Network, on Saturday, November 20, from 10.00 to 10.45 p.m. AST.

The broadcast, which will originate in the auditorium of Stephens College here, where Miss Adams is teaching dramatics, will also mark the actress' debut as a stage director. For the program will feature in addition to the interview, presentations of excerpts from "Chantecler," Edmond Rostand's social satire, in which Miss Adams scored a Broadway hit. In this radio presentation Miss Adams will try out many of her ideas about sound effect and lighting which she believes will revitalize the American theatre.

Dr. James Madison Wood, president of the college, will introduce Miss Adams, who will explain her ideas of educating people to drama rather than attempting to produce actors and actresses.

The cast for the Rostand play will be members of Miss Adams' drama classes. The actress is building her teaching program around "Chantecler," because she believes its roles lend themselves particularly well to women characters.

In addition to excerpts from Chantecler, the exclusive NBC broadcast will include classroom skits with the noted actress instructing; music by various Stephens College choral groups and orchestras and a rhythm act by a tap dance class of fifty.

## HANDEL WORK WILL OPEN SECOND CONCERT BY NBC SYMPHONY ORCH.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Works by Handel, Sibelius, Wagner, Ravel and Griffes will be presented in the second broadcast of the NBC Symphony Orchestra, under the baton of Pierre Monteux, on Saturday, November 20.

First on the program, to be heard over the National Broadcasting Company's combined Red and Blue Networks, from 11.00 to 12.30 p.m., AST, is Handel's Concert Grosso in D Major. The three solo parts will feature Mischa Mischakoff, concert master; Edwin Bachmann, leader of the second violin section, and Oswald Mazuchni, first cellist.

The Andante and Scherzo from Sibelius' First Symphony, which follow, are dramatic and epic in character. In choosing to do separate movements of a symphony, Monteux explains that he "considers a program

as a whole" and that "frequently selected movements fit into the programmatic scheme more satisfactorily than an entire symphony." Monteux first introduced this idea into Boston Symphony programs some years ago.

The fanciful "Pleasure Dome of Kubla Khan," by Charles Griffes, which Monteux has placed between the Sibelius movements and the Prelude to Wagner's "Lohengrin," was given its world premiere by Monteux in Boston in 1919. He was one of the first conductors to discover the genius of this gifted American composer who died in 1920.

Climaxing this list of German, Finnish and American works will be the scintillating "Daphnis and Chloe" Ballet Suite by the conductor's fellow-Frenchman, Maurice Ravel.

## PACKARD HOUR A D D S O'KEEFE FIRST OF YEAR

NEW YORK, Nov. 18—Walter O'Keefe, NBC comedian, who announced lugubriously on Town Hall Tonight that Fred Allen would succeed him on the program just in time for me to be listed as Number One on the Unemployment Census, isn't worrying any more. He's just got a permanent job. Beginning Tuesday, January 4, 1938, Walter will join the Hollywood Mardi Gras series over the NBC-Red Network to co-star with Lanny Ross and Charles Butterworth.

The new contract for O'Keefe comes as a reward for his outstanding success while pinch-hitting for Allen, who resumes his own role as star of the Town Hall programs Wednesday, November 17. The former Broadway star, who sails with Mrs. O'Keefe the same night for a vacation in Europe, will announce further plans for his participation on the Mardi Gras series upon his return.

In joining the Tuesday night program, Walter will be reunited with an old friend and schoolmate, Charles "Dean-pan" Butterworth, with whom he attended Notre Dame in the days of Knute Rockne's early glory. O'Keefe's addition will not cause any changes in the present permanent cast that includes, besides Ross and Butterworth, Jane Rhodes, rhythm singer, and Raymond Paige with his orchestra and chorus.

The new member-elect of the Ross Butterworth team calls Hartford, Conn., home. He went from there to Notre Dame, where he and Butterworth discussed ambitions for the theatre, then turned to newspaper work. Shortly thereafter he suffered an infantile paralysis attack. During the long months of recuperation Walter turned his hand to writing comedy lyrics and sketches. Upon recovery he headed for Broadway and broke in through night club work, with Texas Guinan at Barney Galant's.

## Kathleen Stokes to Give Recital On the CBC Friday Night

A fifteen-minute organ recital by Kathleen Stokes will be presented over the CBC national network on Friday, November 19, at 8.45 p.m. AST. Miss Stokes, known from coast to coast for her many fine performances on the organ, will present "All Through the Night," "Just a Weary in' For You," "By the Light of the Silvery Moon," and Strauss' famous waltz, "The Blue Danube."

## Gets Transparent Galoshes

LONDON, Nov. 17—Queen Mary has ordered a pair of transparent galoshes to wear over her shoes at open-air functions during the winter. The galoshes were her own idea. They will keep her feet dry when she has to stand about on damp ground or walk over wet grass while wearing smart shoes at ceremonial functions.

TORONTO, November 18—E. A. Corbett, Director of the Canadian Association for Adult Education, will be the speaker on the CBC series, Canadian Portraits, to be heard over the national network on Thursday, November 18 at 11.30 p.m. AST. Mr. Corbett will tell the story of Michael Clark, one of Canada's most skillful parliamentarians, who died at Olds, Alberta, in 1926.

Michael Clark was born in Belford, Northumberland, England, in 1861, and was educated at Edinburgh University. He practised medicine and surgery at Newcastle-on-Tyne, and came to Canada at the turn of the century to engage in farming and ranching at Red Deer, Alberta. He was a Liberal member of the House of Commons from 1908 to 1921 and played an important part as a Liberal Unionist in the elections of 1917. Three years later he was defeated and retired to private life in his beloved West. He was one of the greatest orators of the period and was known across the Dominion as "Red Michael."

The radio biographer of this unusual man has intimate knowledge of the west and its personalities for he was for some years director of Extension, University of Alberta. Mr. Corbett is a governor of the Dominion Drama Festival and founder of the Banff School of Fine Arts.

## QUINTS SOON TO MEET LIFE

Cannot Become Scientific Guinea Pigs, Says Doctor Dafoe
