Sweepstake Tickets

THE people of this community and every other community are being given a chance to buy a ticket on the Irish Sweepstakes. The price of these tickets is \$2.50 and for several years scores of people in Fredericton have been sending their money away to the Old Country in the hope of winning fortunes.

It is estimated that prior to the holding of the Irish Hospital Sweepstakes sixty millions of dollars worth of tickets are sold. About forty million, it is estimated, is paid for fake or forged tickets. Of the remainder salesmen take unto themselves eight or nine million and the rest goes into the stake.

A United States sport writer who has a flair for figures has gone into this sweepstake business exhaustively. He says that whenever one buys a sweepstake ticket on a horse race to be run in England it is a two to one chance that the ticket is a counterfeit.

If your ticket is one of these that is genuine and sold by an honest person and gets into the big drum then you have 1 chance in 400,000 of winning the first prize and 1 chance out of 2,000 of winning a lesser prize.

When sweepstake tickets are printed in England and Ireland they are padded in books of ten and sent far and wide. The man who receives a book may sell them or he may pass the book to someone else. And if he sells them he may make returns to sweepstake headquarters--or he may not.

The only one who knows that his stub has been turned-in and that he has a chance for a draw is when a formal receipt comes from the Old Country. Otherwise, he has been fleeced. If you have been buying tickets check-up on this phase.

ITALIAN EDITOR DISLIKES NEWS IN BRITISH PAPERS

(Special to The Daily Mail) ROME, July 24--Virginio Gayda who is generally supposed to be in close touch with Mussolini and to express the opinions of his leader voices a strong complaint against the "lurid" stories in the British papers. RUIN IS FEARED FOR MANITOBA BY TREASURER

WINNIPEG, July 24--Enlarged fields for taxation or drastic curtailment of Manitoba's responsibilities for providing social services will have to be undertaken quickly if complete financial collapse is to be averted, Hon. Stuart Garson, Provincial Treasurer, told a service club here today.

He said scaling down of interest rates alone would not solve the problem. Extension of taxation powers or assumption by the Dominion Government of social services now carried by the Province was necessary to save Manitoba from ruin. The Manitoba Government was looking to the Royal Commission on taxation problems as the life preserver to save the Western Provinces, the Provincial Treasurer said.
