
TODAY'S MARKET

Last week saw the last of the strawberry crop, none being on the market at Phoenix Square today. Approximately the same list of produce was on hand as last Saturday, in about the same quantity. Garden produce was generally a little lower than the last market, as was lamb and chicken. REGARDING REPORT RE IRISH ESTATE Suburban Families Are

THE

Possible Heirs To \$15,000,000

NO FURTHER WORD

No further information has been received regarding the report that the heads of six families in the suburban towns of Marysville and Devon were heirs of the 'Buchanan' estate in Ireland on which a value of \$15,000,000 and accrued income of 50 years is placed. The persons concerned were advised of the matter vesterday from Dominion authorities at Ottawa. It is understood that a Canadian now in Ireland interested himself in the Buchanan estate through his own possible connection and his researches revealed the connection of the Staffords in New Brunswick, whose people came from the British Isles. The information procured in Ireland was cabled to Ottawa.

The persons indicated as possible favorites of fortune are Norman Stafford, Frank Stafford, Samuel Staf ford, Bernard Stafford, Newton Stafford, all of Marysville, and Mrs. Geo. Savage, South Devon.

Three other families are designated also as possible heirs. They are those of two sons and one daughter of the late Norman Buchanan believ ed to be located in Gloucester county in the vicinity of Bathurst.

This list of nine families, all located in the province of New Brunswick, is believed to complete the number in these parts which could be classed as heirs of the Buchanan estate in Ireland.




