mission on economic relations between Provinces and Dominion is functioning the usual conference will be omitted this year.

Mr. Mackenzie King has been silent on this Royal Commission since his return. When he left for England early in May he stated he would likely have the personnel complete when he returned. It was assumed he would obtain some leading British economist to head the inquiry. Apparently there has been great difficulty in assembling the necessary talent to act as members of this important body.

Questions relative to reform or amendments to the constitution, a live issue since the present Government took office, will probably also wait upon the activities of the Royal Commission. It would now seem that the report of this Commission will not be available in time for consideration at the next session of Parliament.

Commission Reports

Reports of the Royal Commission on Textiles, the Royal Commission on Grain Marketing, both headed by Mr. Justice W. F. Turgeon, and the Royal Commission investigating Canada's penal system, should all be ready for the next session, and will probably all be subject of legislation. The Grain and Penitentiary Commissions, the latter headed by Mr. Justice Joseph Archaibeault, are both making studies abroad at the present time.

Mr. Mackenzie King will meet his colleagues in council tomorrow afternoon and the Cabinet will probably be in daily sessions until Friday.

Troops and aerial bombs were used. Meantime Lieutenant-General Kyoski Katsuki, head of the Kwangtung Army force and supreme Japanese commander for North China notified General Sung Chieh-yuan the "deceitful and provocative" attitude of North China authorities had driven the Japanese army to "direct and independent action."

The warning came as Japanese launched a determined attack against Peiping and after Sung, head of the 29th Chinese Army and of the Hopen-Chahar political council, had rejected a Japanese ultimatum to withdraw his troops.

TODAY'S MARKET

An open season in New Brunswick for ruffed grouse and spruce partridge from October 1st to October 31st, has been authorized by the government, according to an announcement in today's issue of the Royal Gazette. The bag limit allows the shooting of not more than six birds in one day or not more than 20 during the season.

The midweek market at Phoenix Square today was a little smaller than usual, due to the number of farmers hurrying to get their remaining hay in. Prices were quite consistent with last week, except that cucumbers were considerably cheaper, selling today for 35c. per dozen. Salmon are still scarce, but were going at the same price as last week. Vegetable Marrow made its first appearance, while berries other than raspberries were not on the market. The prevailing prices were:

MILK PRICES

The government regulations regarding the prices of milk in accordance with the provisions of the New Dairy Products Commission were announced in today's issue of the Royal Gazette. It was stated in the announcement that the price at which any storekeeper may purchase milk or cream, for resale from any producer, shall not be less than the wholesale price determined and designated by the Commission. The retail price as determined by the Commission for any area, except as may be otherwise provided by special order of the Commission, shall be the minimum price at which milk or cream may be sold to the consumers.

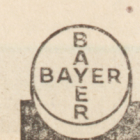

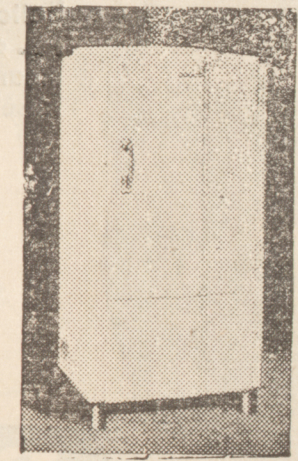
