

New Brunswick - Maine Circuit Meet Opens on F'ton Track This Afternoon

Meet Marks Revival Harness Racing In N. B.

More Than 20 Horses Entered -- Two Days' Programme

Hundreds of turf followers from all sections of the district will crowd the grandstand at the Fredericton race track here to witness the opening of the New Brunswick and Maine circuit which gets underway this afternoon. More than 20 horses, the pick of the "blue-bloods" of Maritime harness racing, will compete for the prize money in the various classes.

The track is in first class condition for the big event and there is every indication that the two-days' meet will go down in local racing annals as one of the most sensational turf exhibitions ever presented here. It is believed that the meet will mark the revival in harness racing in the Maritimes and will be but the first of several meets to be held during the remainder of the season.

Josie The Great piloted by Johnny Conroy, who starts in sixth horse position in the 2.22 trot and pace, was favored to win the race, although there was the possibility of extra heats if Miss Joe Hanover, owned by T. V. Holdaway of Houlton, is at her best, with the pole position.

Other starters in the race are Klondyke Grattan, second position; Calumet Dudds, in third place position, followed by The Paramount in fourth place, and Killarney in the fifth place. Josie the Great will race on the outside of the field, having drawn last position.

Ted Grant's Dolly Azoff of Houlton although in third place, was picked for the winner of the classified trot and pace in the field of three with Direct Mar in second place and Viking in last place position.

Hanover Currier has the pole in the 2.18 trot and pace and a likely candidate for first money although Billy Bondeer, Frank Hanover and Noontime in second, third and fourth place positions will provide a speedy field to easily upset the dope.

FARR CONFIDENT HE'LL BEAT LOUIS

Welshman Fit After Sea Voyage -- Promoter Is Impressed With Challenger.

NEW YORK, July 27—Tommy Farr, upon whose broad young shoulders ride British hopes of capturing the world heavyweight boxing championship, now guarded by Joe Louis, impressed doubting New Yorkers with his confidence and forthright manner.

His opening declaration to the flock of reporters who swooped down on him all but bowled them over. His frank Welsh face showed he meant every word when he said: "I'll beat Louis because I have never been knocked out in my life and am not afraid of anyone but God."

Then the young Welshman, who meets the Detroit Negro here August 26, gave full play to his confidence. He went on:

"Louis is a man with two legs and two arms and he is no better than a lot of others I've met. If I didn't expect to beat him I wouldn't be here. All he has to do is stick his chin out once and he'll be gone."

Michael Strauss ("Call me Mike") Jacobs, cauliflower impresario who is promoting the fight, confided he never expected to find a Briton so tough. Jacobs led a big welcoming party down the harbor to meet the Berengaria.

"This guy not only looks tough," the promoter said, "but he talks tough."

Farr, who recently took falls out if Max Baer, Tommy Loughran, Bob Olin and Bob Neusel, looked fit after the voyage. He said he had trained in the ship's gymnasium, mostly skipping rope. He weighed 208 pounds stripped and said he expected to scale that against Louis when he collides with the champ in the Yankee Stadium.

KELLY AND TURNER REACH 2ND ROUND CANADIAN MEET

OTTAWA, July 27—Hockey-playing Pete Kelly and Dr. E. O. Turner of Fredericton will carry the Maritimes' colors into the second round of the Canadian amateur golf championships.

The Charlottetown redhead, playing steady golf for nine holes and then opening up after the turn, defeated H. R. Pickens of Montreal, 3 and 1, in his first round match today. Dr. Turner went to the 19th to defeat Maurice Hodgson of Montreal, one up.

The Maritimes' other entrants, Percival Streeter of Saint John and Aubrey Steeves of Moncton N.B., went down in their opening matches Streeter losing 6 and 5 to Howard Jones of Hamilton, Ont., and Steeves just losing out on the last hole after a gallant comeback battle against J. H. Arlick of Ottawa.

The first round axe fell quickly today but there were few surprises when the unfortunates were counted. Among the day's upsets was the defeat of Ken Lawson, Victoria, who fell before young Frank Sherman, jr. of Hamilton on the 18th.

Bert Barnabee of Ottawa pulled a

surprise by disposing of Frank Corrigan, Ottawa, and Jim McLaughlin of the same city popped out Ernie Palmer of Winnipeg, while the gallery lifted eyebrows at the Westerner's sudden passing.

Mainly tournament veterans moved safely into the second round starting tomorrow.

Freddie Hass, jr., the New Orleans boy who walked away with the championship at Winnipeg last year, had a first round bye. Thirty others also drew passes into the next round. C. Ross Sommerville, London, Ont., trying for his sixth Canadian title, moved along at the expense of Bob Runge, home club player, 4 and 3.

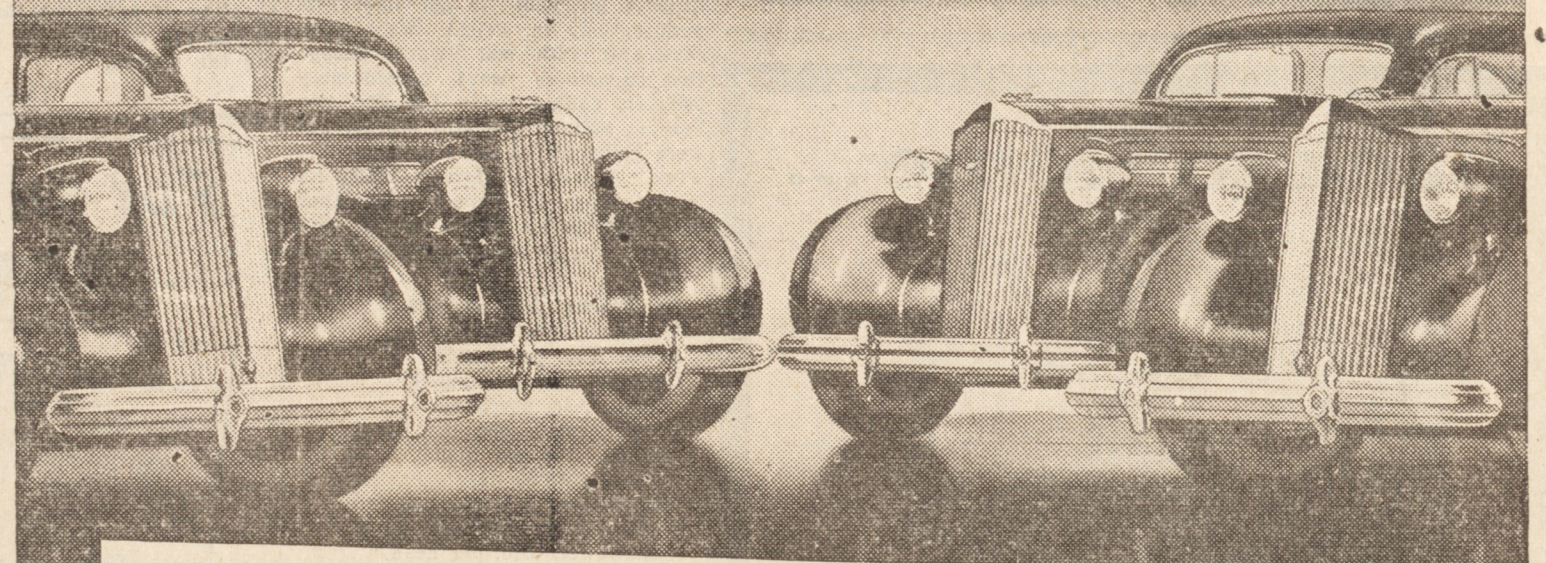
