CONFERS WITH PREMIER
E. J. Henneberry, M.L.A., Saint John, was in the city today conferring with Premier A. A. Dystart on government matters. The nature of his mission as not announced.

DEPARTMENT BUSINESS
Hon. W. S. Anderson, chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, was in the city today on business connected with his department. It is expected that he will return to his home this evening.

NON-RESIDENT FEES
Fees for non-residents of the province for licenses as insurance agents or adjusters shall be the same as the fees imposed upon residents of this province for a similar license by the province or state in which the applicant resides.

OUT OF CITY

Said to be worth approximately \$20,000 and one of three sets in North America, the famous collection of four volumes of birds of America, from the original drawings of John James Audubon, have been returned to the provincial library after being housed at the University of New Brunswick for the past couple of years. The collection is the property of the province.

Notice is given in the current issue of the Royal Gazette of the incorporation of the City Realty, Limited, with a capital stock of \$10,000 divided into one-hundred shares of \$100 each. Frederick H. Peters, barrister, Thyrle G. Foster, electrician, and Betty A. Hurley, all of Fredericton, are named as charter members of the company. The head office will be located in Fredericton. The newly formed company will carry on a general mortgage and real estate business.

Truck and Passenger Car In Collision

A Maine car driven by Morris Perkins and a truck owned by the Maritime Electric Co. and driven by Walter Thomas, received considerable damage when they crashed head-on in Charlotte street near the railroad crossing early this afternoon. Neither driver was injured, but Wesley Allen, another employee of the company, and who was accompanying the driver was slightly scratched.

The accident occurred as the truck was coming up Charlotte street, as the driver swung out to pass a car parked on the right side of the street. The other vehicle was at the time coming down the street, and met the truck just as it passed the parked car, making the accident unavoidable.

The passenger car was badly damaged, but the truck only received minor damages.

PLANS NEARING COMPLETION RE L.O.O.F. MEETING

Formal Ball and Garden Party To Feature Social Program

Plans are about completed in connection with the annual conference of Maritimes and Newfoundland Grand Lodge, L.O.O.F., which is to open in this city on August 9th. The general committee, in charge of arrangements, headed by Karl Walker met last evening to discuss final arrangements. This was the second last meeting of the group to be held prior to the opening of the conference which is expected to be attended by more than 3,000 delegates.

In a statement given to the newspapers this morning, Mr. Walker stated that the registrations are coming in fast and that there is every indication that the number in attendance will reach the 3,000 mark. He said that extensive preparations have been made to entertain the visitors. The problem of accommodating the thousands to be present was a major consideration. Hotels, private residences, etc., have reserved space for the expected influx of visitors and all delegates will be well taken care of.

The civic reception of welcome will be marked by addresses given by prominent officials. His Worship Mayor G. Willard Kitchen will extend the civic welcome while it is expected that Premier A. A. Dystart will represent the provincial government at the reception. W. G. Clark, M.P., will be the representative of the Dominion legislative body. Others present on the platform will be E. C. Atkinson, president of the board of trade; officials of the local lodges, and representatives of the clergy. Rev. Dr. George Ross, minister of St. Andrew's Church, will be among the speakers to be heard.

Featuring the social entertainment will be a formal ball in the Armoury, and a garden party to be given by the Right Honourable, the Countess of Ashburnham. Functions will also be held in the Oddfellows Hall which will contribute much to the program of social festivities.

The Grand Lodge will meet in the city hall, while the Rebekah Assembly will convene in the Armoury building. The Encampment sessions will take place in the Odd Fellows Hall.

ORDER IN COUNCIL RE CHANGES IN JUDICATURE ACT

Regulation of Fees For Insurance Act Announced

Under the heading "Orders in Council," two announcements are contained in the current issue of the Royal Gazette relative to the Royal Society of New Brunswick, and the regulation of fees under the provisions of the Insurance Act. The former concerned that the following sub-section replaced sub-section 2 of section 18 of the Judicature Act: "Any judge sitting chambers shall dispose of all court business not of an appellate nature or appointed by rule or order to be heard by the Court of Appeal which may be brought before him whether such business be in the Chancery Division or in the King's Bench Division."

In connection with the matter relative to the Insurance Act, the following regulations were enacted: "for licenses for life insurance, or life and accident insurance, or life and accident and sickness insurance, original or annual renewal thereof, in cities, \$10.00; in incorporated towns, \$5.00; elsewhere in the Province, or where a license is expressly limited to accident and sickness insurance only, \$3.00. For licenses as insurance adjusters, original or annual renewal thereof, \$10.00.

CHATHAM DELEGATION CONFERS WITH PREMIER DYSART ON RELIEF MATTERS

No Relief Assistance Given By N. B. Government

CONDITIONS BETTER

Matters pertaining to relief were discussed by Premier A. A. Dystart, K.C., and members of a delegation representing the Town of Chatham in the provincial government leader's office here this morning. Although no official announcement was made, it is believed that the matters were in connection with the relief situation in Chatham, which was under discussion by the government last spring. It was stated by Premier Dystart that with the "cleaning-up" of the Chatham matter, the provincial government would be definitely finished with participation in relief assistance. The government officially ended its assistance last fall insofar as all municipalities in the province were concerned.

Hon. W. S. Anderson, chairman of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission, attended the conference. The Chatham delegates arrived this morning and at the time of going to press this afternoon the conference had not concluded.

The problem of relief administration in the province is less serious than it was at this time last year, government officials stated today. Most of the communities reported improved employment conditions, a factor which subsequently results in improvement insofar as relief costs are concerned. The opinion was expressed by officials that with the continued improvement of economic conditions the problem of relief will be a minor one.

ANGLING BEST IN BATH DISTRICT

Seventeen Salmon Were Caught by Fishermen In One Day's Sport

While sultry weather and warm water have prevailed on the St. John river near Fredericton of late, good catches of salmon and grise have been made further up the river between Hartland and the Mouth of the Tobique. The forty-five miles of river in that section is fed by numerous small streams, such as the Becaquimac, the Monquart and River du Chute, which keeps down the temperature of the water and put the fish in the mood to rise to a fly. Right on the bank of the river at Hartland is a large boiling spring, from which the town obtains its water supply, and as the Becaquimac stream falls into the main river just above that point, the pool is an ideal resting place for fish. Good catches have been made here and one day last week nine salmon and grise were taken on a single rod. From near the mouth of the Monquart, on Saturday last a party of anglers took a total of seventeen fish. Fair catches are also reported from pools at River du Chute and at points farther up the river.

A good rain fall in the near future would greatly improve angling conditions at the various pools along the St. John river between Hart's Island, and Mouth of the Tobique and would cause an influx of non-resident sportsmen, a number of whom have made reservations and await a favorable message from the guides.

CAMERA PARTY ARRIVES HERE

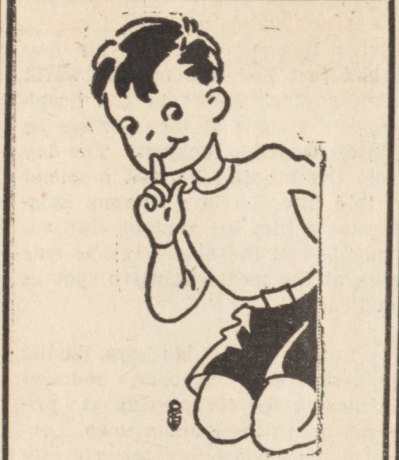
Will Proceed to Grand Falls --- Tentative Itinerary

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FIRE SITUATION IN N. B. FORESTS FAVORABLE TODAY

No New Outbreaks Are Reported by Chief Forester

With the exception of a couple of minor blazes in Northumberland County, and a brush fire near St. Stephen, the forest fire situation in the province is favorable today. The slight drop in temperature combined with the cloudy skies will detract from the present hazardous condition, was the belief expressed by fire officials today.

Speaking to newspaper men this morning, G. L. Miller, chief forester for New Brunswick, stated that the fire at Box Brook, Northumberland county was well under control and there were no further reports of outbreaks. Carelessness on the part of woods travellers was said to be the cause of the majority of the fires. Mr. Miller gave instructions for a careful watch of fires starting from lightning, which has been the chief menace to timber for the past few days, besides the dry condition from lack of rain.

Fire which broke out as the result of lightning on Portage River, a tributary of northwest Miramichi, yesterday burned over about eight miles of granted land. Another on Box Brook, a tributary of the Tabusintac river in Northumberland county, could not be seen and reports indicate that the fire was out. The fire in back of Ludlow, in the same county, was patrolled by three men today.

Look-outs reported all fires were soon under control, causing little damage and not spreading to any great proportions before being checked by fairly large crews which were reduced this morning.

IN COURT TOMORROW
The three taxi drivers, who have been summoned to court by the Fredericton Detachment, R.C.M.P. for violation of the Motor Carrier Act will appear tomorrow morning at 11.00 o'clock. It is alleged that the drivers have been carrying passengers between Fredericton and Devon without license from the board, and at the same price charged by the franchised bus company. Another case will be heard, that charging Ned O'Leary with theft of a sum of money from Walter Veniot. The case was remanded from last week.

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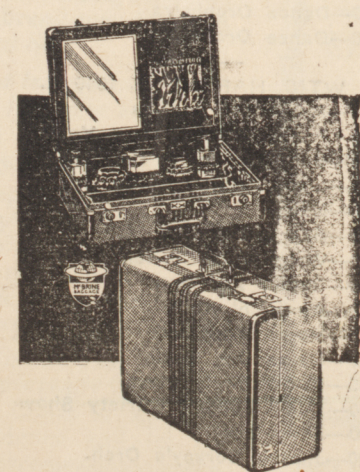
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
