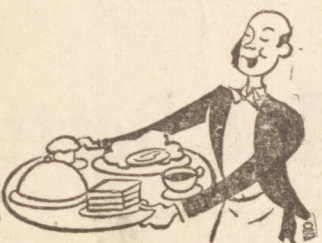

in October, it was announced in Dis-

The courses will be held as follows:
Cavalry—Complete qualifying
course at St. John's, Que.; Lieutenant
and N.C.O.'s, Oct. 4 to Nov. 13; cap-
tains, Oct. 18 to Nov. 13; majors, Oct.
25 to Nov. 13. Part II qualifying
course, all ranks, Nov. 1 to Nov. 13.

Signals—Complete qualifying course
at Camp Borden; lieutenants and N.
C. O.'s, Oct. 11 to Nov. 20; captains,

Oct. 25 to Nov. 20; majors, Nov. 1 to
Nov. 20; Part II qualifying course, all
ranks, Nov. 29 to Dec. 11.

Infantry (rifle and machine gun)—
Complete qualifying course at Hal-
fax; lieutenants and N.C.O.'s, Oct. 4
to Nov. 13; captains, Oct. 18 to Nov.
13; majors, Oct. 25 to Nov. 13. Part
II qualifying course, all ranks, Nov.
22 to Dec. 4. Technical special "K"
course (all ranks on transfer from
rifle to machine gun units) Nov. 22 to
Dec. 4.

Commanding officers have until
Sept. 24 to forward names of candi-
dates recommended for the courses.

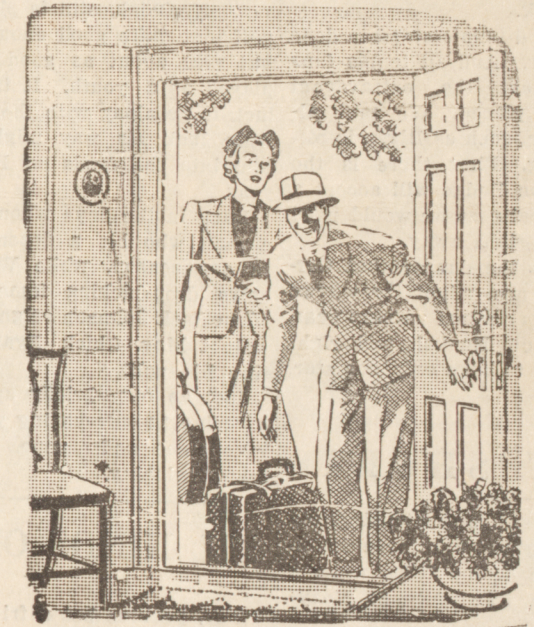
