## SUPREME COURT ADJOURNED TILL SEPTEMBER 24

### One Case Heard This Morning—Two More Reported Settled

Only one case was argued before the appeals division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court this morning. Two cases were reported settled out of court, and another was set over to the next meeting of the court. The giving of the court was adjourned until Friday, Sept. 24.

The case argued was that of Eplphame Bellefleur vs. Henry Akerley. F. D. Tweedie, Woodstock, representing the defendant moved to set aside a verdict for the plaintiff and to enter a verdict for the defendant, or for a reduction of damages.

The appeal of Leyland Motors, Ltd. vs. the Simonds Highway Board and others, in which W. M. Ryan, K.C., M.P., for the defendant, was supporting an appeal from an order by Mr. Justice Fairweather, was reported settled, as was the matter of the estate of Mary Jane Kerr, in which W. H. Davidson, Newcastle, for John Robert Miller and others, was supporting an appeal from a judgment by Chief Justice Baxter.

The case of Dow Bishop vs. Chas. Coster was set over till the next meeting of the court.

## DISGRACEFUL SHOW ON MID- WAY AT FAIR

### Immoral Performance Given By Four Women In Back Tent

### Back Room Indecency

### Opinion Is That These Shows Should Be In- spected

Four dilapidated Venuses, fan dance artists without the fans, dancing stark naked in the shabby back room of a tent at the Fredericton Exhibition last night before a crowd of lascivious men proved to be a far greater drawing card than the fine arts and crafts or flower exhibits, or the antics of the performing monkeys or Sammy, the Human Corkscrew.

Billed as burlesque artists, fan dancers, strip-tease entertainers and hula hula dancers, the girls stood on the platform before the tent, clothed in kimonos, a living advertisement of lewd entertainment to entice the coins out of the pockets of the patrons of the fair.

"Fifteen cents, gents, is all that is charged to see these four beautiful young ladies put on the most daring dance that has ever come to this exhibition," or words to that effect, came from the mouth of the dandified barker. In surged the men who were unaccompanied by ladies, and the show was ready to begin.

For half an hour the girls danced, each time with more abandon and less raiment. Finally a thin bony blonde came on the stage wearing a scanty loin-cloth and even scantier brassiere. The music stopped, off came brassiere, amid the cheers of the men, but the sprightly Aphrodite disappeared out the wings of the stage as she began to unloosen the pearl buttons of the only piece of textile that remained between her and complete abandonment of all modesty.

The lights came on, and a husky blonde appeared on the stage; "that's all for here, boys. But in a few minutes there will be another show in the back room, where we'll begin taking off things where we just left off. The price of admission is twenty-five cents. Step right up if you want a ticket."

The back room performance was absolutely disgraceful and lewd. The opinion was expressed that such doubtful shows should not be allowed at an exhibition which is supposed to be educational in its nature. These shows should be inspected and guaranteed before being allowed on the midway of any Exhibition.

## 79 CASES CARED FOR BY V.O.N. DURING AUGUST

### 450 Nursing Visits Were Made. It Was Revealed At Monthly Meeting Last Night

Seventy-nine cases, 14 of them being maternity, were cared for by the Victorian Order of Nurses in August, it was revealed at the monthly meeting of the V.O.N. Board held last night. Four hundred and fifty nursing visits, about two thirds of them free, were made during the month of August. V.O.N. nurses assisted in ten surgical operations. Aid. Ivan McKnight presided at last night's meeting.

### Two More Cases Of Infantile At Saint John

Two new cases of infantile paralysis reported at Saint John yesterday afternoon after press time brought the total of cases of the disease for the province up to 56. No new cases have been reported anywhere in New Brunswick since then.

Both cases yesterday afternoon were of the mild type, and the patients have been treated with anti-paralysis serum. To date 30 of the province's 56 cases have been discovered at Saint John. No further deaths have been reported.

Authorities of the Department of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations were reticent when queried today as to whether there would be a further postponement of the opening of the public schools of the province. As matters now stand, unless there is a further postponement, the schools will reopen on next Monday. The opinion has been expressed that due to the continued cold weather, the outbreak of the disease is dying out, and that unless there is a further outbreak of the disease the children will go back to their books and classrooms as scheduled.

## CHILDREN IN EXHIBITION LAST NIGHT

### Manage to Get in to Stay In Spite of Health Ban Forbidding Them

### Racing Today

### Good Program Present- ed Yesterday Before Large Attendance

Handicapped by poor weather since it opened Saturday night, the Fredericton Exhibition yesterday had the first attendance of any size in three days as the citizens of this and surrounding communities flocked to the big fair. A feature of yesterday's show was the large attendance of children, who entered the grounds by hook or crook in spite of the ban placed on their attendance by an order of the New Brunswick Department of Health and Labor in an effort to fight the spread of infantile paralysis.

According to a statement made this morning by provincial health authorities, it is the responsibility of the management of the Fredericton Exhibition to see that children under the age of 16 are kept out of the grounds. If they steal their way into the show, it is up to the exhibition authorities to remove them, for otherwise the order of the Department of Health and Labor is not only evaded, but disobeyed. The case of the Saint John Exhibition, where particular care was taken to have youngsters ejected who had bootlegged their way in, was cited.

The first day of the racing, postponed since yesterday because of the rain, is scheduled for this afternoon.

Yesterday afternoon the grandstand attractions in front of the pavilions were attended by a large crowd. Six acts of vaudeville and a concert, by the "A" Company band of the Carleton and York Regiment were presented. The performance was repeated last night.

Ayrshire cattle judging was completed yesterday, and today in the livestock division the Holsteins and horses will be judged. Yesterday was also carried on in all other divisions, including poultry, agricultural, horticulture, apiculture, maple products, women's and children's work, household science, fine arts and other classes.

## WEEK-END RAINS A LAST MINUTE AID TO THIRSTY CROPS

### Roots and Pastures Re- lieved But Grains are Beyond Aid

### Ripened Too Early

### Bumper Apple Crop Was Not Harmed By Prolonged Lack of Rain

"Last minute relief to the parched crops of this province"; the rain of the week-end period has been described by New Brunswick farmers who faced a disastrous crop shortage by reason of the extended period of burning dry weather.

After weeks in which no more rain than the occasional small thunder-shower brought aid to their suffering crops, farmers all over the province sighed with relief when the downpour which began Saturday morning soaked the fields and brought back to verdant life, many of the plants which were yellowed of thirst.

The grain crop is beyond relief however, it was stated this morning. Although the early grain crops showed good returns, the late grains in most sections will show no more than a 50 to 75% yield. The burning sun took its toll in ripening the grains long before they had matured. Oats especially suffered, since the grain, lacking moisture cannot fill out, and therefore the far below average Buckwheat suffered more greatly in proportion than did the oats. The drought and heat struck the fields when the crop was just entering its bloom, with the result that a heavy blight loss has been felt.

The potato crop has also been seriously affected, and it is believed that a much smaller per acre yield will be the result. In many cases the vines died before they had served their purpose, causing a partial starvation of the tubers.

The root crops to a great extent will be saved by the welcome rain, while the apple crop has not been seriously injured. On the contrary, a bumper apple crop is expected, with an increase of between 15,000 and 20,000 barrels over the 1936 harvest.

### FINED FOR DUCK HUNTING

Harold Bunker and Hazen Grass of this city were fined \$10 and costs when they appeared before Magistrate Harold Kimball, of Oromocto, this week, and were convicted of hunting ducks out-of-season. The offence falls under the Migratory Birds Act, and is strictly enforced by the R.C.M.P.

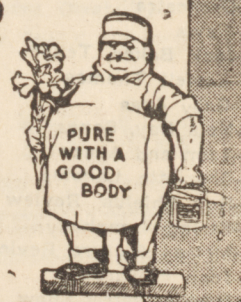
