AMECHE TRIES  
M. C. ROLE IN  
NEW PROGRAM

HOLLYWOOD, April 8—An actor, an American-born symphonic conductor and radio's only ventriloquist—Don Ameche, Werner Janssen and Edgar Bergen—will unite their talents in a new all-star show replacing Do You Want To Be An Actor? and starting over the NBC-Red network Sunday, May 9, at 8 p.m., EDT. The new series, like the present, will be sponsored by the makers of Chase & Sanborn Coffee.

Ameche, who will be master of ceremonies, is a veteran NBC actor who recently has won new laurels on the screen. His success was almost instantaneous after an NBC audition in Chicago that led him to leading roles in the First Nighter, presenting plays from the mythical "Little Theater Off Times Square."

Janssen was the first native New Yorker ever to conduct the New York Philharmonic-Symphony Orchestra, although he had been guest conductor at concerts of leading European symphony orchestras. He also has conducted the symphony orchestras of Cleveland and Rochester.

Edgar Bergen has been widely described as the outstanding sensation of the current radio season. He was an unknown in radio until Rudy Vallee presented him on December 17 last. Bergen and his high-hat dummy, "Charlie McCarthy," have been headlines in the Vallee NBC show ever since.

Guest stars each will share time with Ameche, Janssen and Bergen.

JANE SEYMOUR

CHICAGO, April 8—Anne Seymour, leading lady of Campana's Grand Hotel on NBC since October, 1933, has been assigned the title role in the new Story of Mary Martin series, which Proctor & Gamble, makers of Ivory Soap, are presenting on both the NBC-Red and NBC-Blue networks.

Descendants of a dramatic "royal family" extending back to 1740, Miss Seymour was born in New York September 11, 1909. She lived there except during theatrical engagements, until she came to NBC's Chicago studios. She played on Broadway with Ethel Barrymore in "School for Scandal" and in many other plays including "Mr. Moneybags," "The Husband Hunt" and "At the Bottom." Even now she returns to the stage during the summer months.

The Story of Mary Martin, written by Jane Cruseberry, features Robert Griffin in the leading male role. Under the new setup, the popular serial will be heard Mondays through Fridays over the NBC-Red network at 12:15 p.m., EST, with a repeat show on the NBC-Blue network at 5 p.m., EST.

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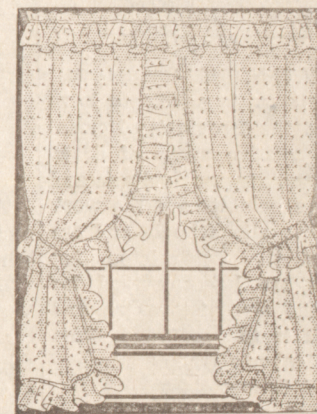

Hand-won turf in the rural areas of the Saorstad amounted to nearly 3,000,000 tons last year, but much of it was used inefficiently and in stoves or ranges not especially suited for its use. The value of the turf produced amounted to approximately £3,000,000. The industry of the hand-winning of turf is relatively greater in the Irish Free State than in any other country, mainly as a result of the absence of alternative forms of fuel, and the extensive supplies available.

IRISH FREE  
STATE PEAT  
DEVELOPMENT

Provision is made for an expenditure of £104,242 for peat fuel development in the Irish Free State during the coming year, writes A. J. Tingley, Assistant Trade Commissioner in Dublin, in the forthcoming issue of the Commercial Intelligence Journal.

With practically no coal and very little wood available in the Irish Free State, peat has long been the fuel

The fuel produced was of high caloric value, clean and easy to handle, and is said to be suitable for all the uses to which coal is normally put in the Free State. The Government is apparently fully prepared to assist the Peat Fuel Co. Ltd. in further experimentation and research during the coming year, and if the results justify the expenditure the Government will probably take over the company and convert this potential source of wealth into a large national commercial proposition.
