CANADA BARS WAR EXPORTS

Government Prohibits Arms Shipments To Spanish Points

OTTAWA, Aug. 14—Apparently dissatisfied with the existing state of non-intervention arrangements by the European powers and unwilling to trust to them for insulation from the Spanish conflict, the Mackenzie King Government has announced its own non-intervention policy.

The prohibition of the export of war supplies to the area of conflict is to be made effective by a permit system effective July 31, the machinery of which is best described by quoting the terms of the order-in-council itself:

(1) "No person shall export any of the articles enumerated and described in the annex hereto without first having obtained a permit issued by, or on behalf of, the Minister of National Revenue.

(2) "Applicants for permits shall furnish in respect of each proposed shipment for export information in writing in the manner and form approved by the Minister of National Revenue, setting forth details as to

CALCUTTA, Aug. 14—Fifty persons were injured and 100 arrested when the march started in sympathy with the hunger strikers which are now in prison. They were ordered by the police not to fly flags and only to march ten at a time. They disregarded this advice and the police were forced to break up the parade by force.

The Red Code is "Kill Him"

CERTAIN PEOPLE in this vicinity—some of whom occupy good positions—see red and sometimes become abusive when anyone discusses Communism. They even go so far as to almost justify Communistic acts. Some of these Moscow apologists—if not disciples, here and elsewhere, have not yet offered to explain how Soviet "purges" conform with democracy, of which Russian Communism is claimed to be the quintessence.

We in the Maritimes have so far not felt the menace of Communism. But these people work slyly and they are into the colleges, the offices and the workshops before one is aware of their existence.

Some people are afraid to talk about it, or else they are too slow to recognize the danger and to be on their guard. We believe that there are Red Communists right here in New Brunswick—if not right here in Fredericton. They may be few.

Their walls ring out loudest over intimation of restraint on a revolutionary minority. They work themselves into a lather about the urgency of maintaining freedom of speech and action. Theirs was the campaign to repeal Section 98 of the Criminal Code, which restricted their hall-hiring proclivities.

The deceitfulness of the Communists and the hypocrisy of their friends need no other answer than the "pudge." A despatch from Moscow announces the "greatest concerted press campaign since eight of the highest Red Army Generals were executed."

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CAPTAIN G. E. DAY PASSES AWAY TO COPELAND BLOC

Closely Identified With River Many Years; Widely Known

SAINT JOHN, Aug. 14—The death of Captain George Edwin Day, closely identified with the Saint John River for many years, which occurred on Thursday at his home in Hampstead, Queens County, is mourned by a wide circle of friends.

Capt. Day had been ill some four months. He was 82 years of age and was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Fay, formerly of Sheffield, Sunbury County.

Capt. Day had a long and colorful career as steamboat man and started his career in 1874 at a very young age as a deck hand on the famous steamer, "Rothesay," which ran between Saint John and Fredericton. He was employed on various other steamers and after a time was made mate on the steamer, "Acadia" and later mate of the "David Weston." In 1892 he became captain of the last named vessel.

FRAUD IS CHARGED TO COPELAND BLOC

Accusation Is Made In Mayoralty Squabble In New York

NEW YORK, Aug. 14—The law committee of the New York Republican county committee said today that it discovered evidences of fraud in the Republican designating petitions submitted in behalf of Senator Royal S. Copeland, Frank J. Prial and Samuel Levy, who are seeking the nomination for mayor, comptroller and president of the city council.

In a statement, the committee suggested that Mayor F. H. LaGuardia should present the matter to District Attorney William C. Dodge for prosecution.

The withdrawal of former representative Charles G. Bond as candidate for Mayor of New York City reduced the Republican race to a struggle between Mayor Fiorello La Guardia and U. S. Senator Royal S. Copeland, Tammany endorsed Democratic who is running in both major party primaries.

MET DEATH IN ODD WAY NEAR SAINT JOHN

Was Electrocuted While Moving Well-Boring Machine Across Field

(Special to The Daily Mail) MARTINON, August 14—Four men were instantly killed here this morning when the steel "pole" of the well-boring equipment which they were moving across a meadow came in contact with a high tension wire, electrocuting the entire party.

The dead are: Hiram Perry, 43, Acamac. George Perry, 19, son of Hiram Perry.

Guy McCullough, 46, Clive Kennedy, Beaver Brook. The tragedy occurred at 9.45 o'clock a.m. The men were moving the "boring" equipment to a spot farther east in the field in which they were working. The long pole came in contact with the high-tension wire, completely electrifying the apparatus. Hiram Perry was the first one "struck"—he was clinging to the equipment when his three companions tried to release him. As soon as they came in contact with Perry's body they met instant death.

When the news of the tragedy was made known at Saint John, the district coroner commenced an immediate investigation of the circumstances surrounding the accident. An inquest will commence on Monday morning, it was stated.

MOTOR CARS KILL 108 IN SIX MONTHS

1,995 Injured in 3,239 Car Accidents In Quebec

QUEBEC, Aug. 14—A total of 108 persons was killed and 1,995 were injured throughout the Province of Quebec during the first six months of 1937, an official interim report issued by the Provincial Bureau of Revenue and Statistics, for all accidents causing personal injuries and damages to property amounting to \$50 or more, showed today.

Of the 3,239 accidents, 1,731 caused deaths or bodily injuries while 1,508 caused damages to property only. The accidents per month were: January, 488; February, 402; March, 379; April, 463; May, 694; and June, 813. Quebec City, during the first half of this year, recorded 149 automobile accidents. Of the larger municipalities, Verdun, with 29, had the fewest accidents, while Montreal headed the list with a total of 2,103.

The localities at which the 3,239 accidents occurred were: Railway crossings, 21; bridges, 33; private entrances, 43; hills, 99; curves, 125; intersections, 1,320, and other places, 1,594.

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EIGHT HUNDRED FOREIGNERS SHOT AT SHANGHAI

SHANGHAI, Aug. 14—Large number of foreigners numbering about 450 were killed in the International Settlement today when the Chinese planes attempted to bomb Japanese warships and three bombs dropped on the International Settlement. Eight hundred were reported injured. Two British owned warehouses were burned today and one of the Chinese bombing planes were brought down while attempting to bomb a Japanese warship. British and French blue jackets have been rushed to the scene of action. Japanese officials say that Japanese navy was forced to take the necessary measures owing to the provocation to the Chinese.

Western Visitor Says New Party Will Be Formed In Alberta

The Liberals and Conservatives May Unite To Beat Aberhart Administration

AFRAID OF NEW PARTIES

The Conservatives Disorganized Throughout the Dominion of Canada and Morale Gone

BRITAIN LEADS, SAYS ENGLISH LORD AT TORONTO

Has Recovered from Defeat in Diplomacy During Abyssinian War, Lord Eustace States.

LAKE COUCHICHEN, Ont., Aug. 14—Today the British Government is stronger in its own country than any Government since the war, Lord Eustace Percy, British Parliamentarian, told the Canadian Institute on Economics and Politics at Geneva Park late today.

After professing himself as "no admirer of British diplomacy from 1931 to 1935," Lord Percy referred to "the Abyssinian fiasco in which the British Government had suffered a great diplomatic defeat." Since then he declared, the British had regained their prestige.

"Its Spanish policy has the great bulk both of English and European sentiment behind it," said the speaker. "The Government has regained more than all others its former leadership in Europe. England and France are closer than at any time since 1929. It has even succeeded in bringing Germany and Italy back into regular international consultation."

"Perhaps this can best be explained by the hardening temper of our people in the face of what they have at last recognized as a threat of world revolution."

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Britain Defeats Germans On Athletic Track

LONDON, Aug. 14—Great Britain won the athletic track meet at the White City stadium today. They defeated Germany 69 to 67 winning the one hundred yard, two hundred and twenty yard, the quarter mile, one mile and the three mile races and also the one mile relay race. Germany won the rest of the events. A new British record of discus throwing was established at fifty-two feet.

BETTER DAYS PREDICTED FOR CANADIAN INDUSTRY

TORONTO, Aug. 14—Although the rate of recovery has slackened in recent months, virtually all Canadian indexes have continued to show wide gains over the levels of a year ago, says Standard Statistics Company of New York in an analysis of Canadian prospects.

"In spite of this slackening, prospects are favorable for the continuation of the present trend toward increased industrial development," the review adds. "For the time being, moreover, Canadian industry is relatively free from the labor difficulties which have disturbed American business."

Discussing political situation in that province, Mr. Whiteman states that the Conservative forces are scattered and are discouraged on account of disorganization. He expresses the opinion that this is the condition of the Conservative party across Canada from coast to coast.

He states that the old party lines of Liberal and Conservative are pretty well shot to pieces in the province of Alberta and that neither party is likely to come back as strongly as they were in the olden days. The Conservative party seems to lack organization, morale and young leadership. The older men of the party have dropped out and the younger men do not seem to take the interest in politics that their fathers did. He claims that the day when men stuck to party politics either Liberal or Conservative, has passed away, and that the younger generation will not support either party because just their fathers were the supporters of these parties. Mr. Whiteman believes that if the Liberals and Conservatives in Alberta do not get together under the present conditions and form a coalition party that they will throw the field wide open for other groups and parties, Socialist, Fascist and Communists. It may be he says that the old parties are too hidebound to reform their lines and to meet conditions which arise with the changing times. If they cannot do this they cannot complain if their place is taken by younger and more up-to-date parties.

Speaking of the Conservative party in the Dominion this gentleman who has travelled from coast to coast, states that at the present time the Conservative party throughout the country is shot to pieces. He believes that this is due to the fact that during the past seven or eight years the party allowed Conservative Leader Bennett too much power in handling the National Organization. The National office of the party was permitted to close up shortly after the election in 1930 and the office was not opened up again until within a few months before the 1935 election.

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SPANISH GOVT. STILL BLOWING UP RAILWAY TRAINS

(Special to The Daily Mail) VALENCIA, Aug. 14—The Spanish Government claim that there are still several places open in the insurgent ranks and they claim that their bombing planes blew up an insurgent train and from North of Spain.
