

New Brunswick Baseball Association Approves Break with M.P.B.A.U. of C.

Moot Formation of Independent Body

Seek Support of Nova Scotia Group

SAINT JOHN, May 27.—The New Brunswick Baseball Association in annual session at Royal Hotel here last night moved that the officers for 1937 approach the executive of the Nova Scotia Baseball Association with the proposition that both bodies break with the Maritime Provinces Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.

The formation of a Maritime independent sports association with no definite affiliation with the A.A.U. of C. but a working agreement with regard to playoffs was stressed also in connection with the new move.

The question of hockey players being ruled ineligible in other sport by the A.A.U. of C. because of playing the winter pastime under the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, led to the stand being taken by the provincial baseball body.

As the matter stands, it was pointed out at the meeting, the A.A.U. of C. and its branches, on account of its split with the C.A.H.A., M.A.H.A. and other hockey bodies in Canada, will be forced to release amateur cards to players who will engage in other sports. Thus the matter of a Maritime independent sports association was proposed. A motion to this effect was passed.

Another important matter which was passed by the annual meeting was that league playoffs among juniors must be over and winners declared by Aug. 10 leaving the rest of the month open for playdowns only in this province.

It was also stressed that one of the vice-presidents of the association be

responsible for all junior baseball, especially playoffs, in order that the juniors be cleaned up in competition before the last of August, if possible.

William T. Whitlock, of St. Stephen, was re-elected president of the association. C. A. LeBlanc, of Moncton was returned as first vice-president; John Corrigan, Saint John, second vice-president, and W. B. Wisely of Minto, third vice-president. Clement O'Connor, Saint John, was elected secretary treasurer, replacing K. H. Staples of Fredericton.

The question of payment for amateur cards by the provincial association was raised as a means of cutting the expenses of provincial teams who complained of the double debt of cards for the M.P.B. and affiliation fees for the provincial association. The executive ruled that in view of the low rates for affiliation and the proportionate contribution to the Maritime branch the move would not be for the best interests of the teams concerned. Moreover, it was stated, such a move would practically eliminate the provincial association and lead to a recurrence of the problems for the solution of which the association was formed.

With regard to the question of junior registration and affiliation dates Mr. Whitlock stated that the clubs concerned will have to stick to the registration and submission of team rosters on the date required, July 1 to prevent the usual difficulties which accompany the acceptance of late entries by the provincial body.

PLAYING-MANAGER OF TIGERS HAS 50-50 CHANCE FOR COMPLETE RECOVERY

Condition of "Mickey" Cochrane "Fair"

NEW YORK, May 26.—Given only an even chance to survive, Gordon Stanley (Mickey) Cochrane, popular catcher-manager of Detroit Tigers, lay almost motionless today in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, his skull fractured in three places by the shattering impact of an accidental "bean ball" thrown by Irving (Bump) Hadley, New York Yankee pitching veteran.

Possible infection of one of the sinuses, dangerously close to the worst fracture, was the fearful threat faced by "Iron Mike" in his fight for life. Except for that, his physicians said, his chances of recovery would be bright. Sinus troubles, however, long have plagued him.

"If Cochrane can continue as he is for another 48 hours without complications setting in, he will likely make a satisfactory recovery," predicted Dr. Robert Emmet Walsh, staff physician for the Yankees, who is in charge of the case. "The fracture unfortunately connects with one of the sinuses and a possibility of infection is therefore a danger."

As far as could be determined from brief bulleting and statements issued by doctors in attendance, Cochrane spent a fairly comfortable day. Last night, he suffered a slight hemorrhage but was given a good night's rest through the use of opiates.

Hopeful of Recovery
Cochrane's closest friends were the most hopeful for his recovery. Crestfallen, and wet-eyed, the ball players on his club and newspapermen reasoned that if a will to live counted, Cochrane would win his fight.

They also recalled that "Iron Mike" had been injured under strikingly similar circumstances in 1931 when he starred with Philadelphia Athletics. As yesterday, he was "beaten" on his next appearance at the plate after hitting a home run.

FIRST ENDEAVOR SAFE, NEVER IN ANY DANGER

Undergoes Refitting at Bristol Shipyard in Preparation for Tests With New Sopwith Challenger for Cup

NEWPORT, R. I. May 26.—Harbor craft and factories tied down their whistles late yesterday when T. O. M. Sopwith's Endeavor I, after 1,000 miles of lonely sailing, sometimes in gales, reached this port from Gosport, England.

The racing sloop which will contest with her sister ship, the Endeavor II for the honor of challenging the United States' entry for the America's Cup off here next month, completed her trip as she started it—at the end of a tow line from the motor yacht Viva II. In 1934 Endeavor unsuccessfully challenged for the cup.

Nine days ago, in mid-Atlantic, the Viva and Endeavor I parted company in a heavy blow.

Captain Ned Heard, Endeavor's skipper, said today the parting was by his order.

"We cut the hawsers loose ourselves," Heard said, discussing the final separation, "it was coming on night, we had a head wind and we were having heavy going of it, so we

dropped the tow."

Heard minimized the danger to his craft and crew of 19.

He said he maintained his position for a time, after cutting the tow lines, expecting the Viva II to reappear but when she didn't he set sail for Newport.

The Endeavour II, which left Gosport at about the same time as today's arrival, now is undergoing refitting at a Bristol shipyard. Sopwith plans to race with his craft in trial runs and then select the entry that, he hopes, will win for him, and for England, the "ould mug" that evaded the grasp of "Tom" Lipton for so many years.

NEWPORT, R. I. May 26.—Endeavour I, T. O. M. Sopwith's possible America's Cup challenger, left here yesterday for a Bristol shipyard where she will be put into racing trim. Within 24 hours after she had ended her Atlantic crossing, Endeavour I was being towed up Narragansett Bay.

New York Teams Hold Their Winning Streaks

Giants Trim Red Sox 6-3 --- Phillies Triumph

NEW YORK, May 26.—New York Giants stretched their current winning streak to five straight today by defeating the Reds 6-3 in Cincinnati.

The victory pulled the New Yorkers within a game and a half of the league-leading Pittsburgh Pirates, who were rained out.

The Giants scored all their runs off "Lefty" Al Hollingsworth in the seven innings he worked. Gus Mancuso led the attack with a double and three singles.

A home run by Johnny Mize, big Cardinal first baseman, with two mates on base, supplied all the punch needed and St. Louis downed Boston Bees 6-4 in St. Louis.

Danny MacFayden held the Cards to two runs until the eighth, while his mates were pummeling Lon Warneke for eight hits and four runs, two of them homers by Al Lopez and Vincent Di Maggio.

NEW YORK May 26.—Behind Lefty Gomez's steady pitching of the year, Yankees clubbed the leaderless Detroit Tigers 7-0 here today for their sixth straight win.

Boston Red Sox and St. Louis Browns took turns slaughtering rival pitching quartets but the Sox had a four-hit edge and gained their third straight victory a home by an 11-9 margin.

Cleveland Indians exploded a four-

run bomb under the thletics in the ninth inning to come from behind for an 8-6 victory in Philadelphia and climb from fourth to second place.

Featuring the Tribe's 12-hit attack were two pinch-homers, one by Billy Sullivan with two mates aboard in the sixth and another by Bruce Campbell to start the winning ninth-inning rally.

Chicago White Sox pounded on a Senators' relief pitcher in the closing inning to snare a 5 win in Washington.
